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New developer has deal to buy northern half of stalled Lincoln Yards

JDL is under contract to buy the 27 acres lost by Sterling Bay

A Chicago firm known for big residential developments has struck a preliminary deal to buy about half of the Lincoln Yards land on the city's North Side, according to reporting by Ryan Ori in CoStar, adding a new financial backer to the stalled development along the Chicago River at Cortland St.

JDL Development, led by Jim Letchinger, is under contract to buy the approximately 27-acre northern portion of the site along the riverfront border of Lincoln Park and Bucktown. JDL is purchasing it from lender Bank OZK, according to Ori.

JDL is a major developer of

apartment and condominium towers in Chicago.

The bank recently took back that portion of the 55-acre development from Sterling Bay, after they fell into financial troubles.

For years they had tried to create a \$6 billion mix of residential, retail, office, entertainment district on the industrial land that once held Finkl Steel.

In a Securities and Exchange Commission filing on Tuesday, the bank said it entered into a contract on May 2 to sell the land that it has valued on its books at \$84 million, without identifying the buyer. Bank OZK has reportedly given JDL 60 days to explore the purchase before funds must be paid to put the property under contract, according to Crain's Chicago.

Ald. Scott Waguespack [32nd], told Crain's that he has held preliminary conversations with Letchinger, saying that JDL realizes "the market won't bear what Sterling Bay was trying to do."

In 2019, Sterling Bay won zoning approval under former-Mayor Rahm Emanuel for 14.5 million square feet of construction, with towers as high as 595 feet on land along the river between North and Webster avenues.

The only Lincoln Yards structure that Sterling Bay has completed is a vacant, eight-story life science research building at the southern end of the site at 1229 W. Concord Place. That building is not part of the land that was seized by Bank OZK, although

What is Fern Hill's \$300K community benefits agreement with Old Town?

Hopkins endorses Fern Hill agreement, but some in community want more than promises

As plans for Fern Hill's high-rise project at North Ave. and La-Salle St. move forward, news of a \$300,000 community contribution from the developer to the Old Town Merchants and Residents Association [OTMRA] has drawn both praise and scrutiny from Old Town area residents.

The money is being called a "community donation," and was first made public on April 15, when OTMRA uploaded a signed agreement with Fern Hill to its website.

Ald. Brian Hopkins [2nd], confirmed the deal and emphasized that the funds are meant to support neighborhood rat abatement. "The fund is for rodent control, it's a community contribution to the effort to reduce the rat population," he said in a recent interview.

However, while the donation has been widely cited in interviews and emails, it is not included in the final signed legal agreement, the "Community Memorandum of Understanding" dated April 14.

The agreement does contain the terms "\$300,000 Community

Donation into an escrow fund " but not "rat abatement."

What the agreement does include are detailed behavioral, construction, and use restrictions on the Fern Hill development.

Ald. Brian Hopkins [2nd], confirmed the deal and emphasized that the funds are meant to support neighborhood rat abatement. "The fund is for rodent control, it's a community contribution to the effort to reduce the rat population," he said in a recent interview.

Among them:

- "The Property shall not be operated as a short-term vacation rental building..." (Section 3, page 2, Final Signed OTMRA-Fern Hill Declaration, Apr. 14)

- "Disruptive construction activities... shall not occur on Sundays at any time during construction. Between May 15 and Sept. 15, disruptive construction shall also not occur on Saturdays."(Section

2-3, page 1)

The agreement also gives the alderman enforcement power. "[The] Alderman shall have authority to impose a \$5,000 fee per day for violations of the agreement's terms." (Section 3, page 2)

And to facilitate oversight and communication, the "Developer shall participate in quarterly community meetings with the Alderman and community stakeholders."(Section 4, page 2)

While the agreement allows the alderman and/or OLMRA to impose \$5,000 per-day fines, enforcement remains optional. Residents have the burden of evidence, and there is no specific complaint method, audit system, or guarantee that infractions would be followed. Quarterly meetings offer discourse, but not always action.

In his interview, Hopkins pointed to additional benefits not tied to the formal agreement, including infrastructure improvements.

"There's an additional... \$1 million [for] traffic improvements in the area and those funds will go to the Chicago Dept. of Transportation," he said. He also mentioned Fern Hill's obligation to fill the

Lincoln Park man robbed neighborhood convenience store four times in a week, taking wine each time

A Lincoln Park man has been jailed pending trial after prosecutors accused him of robbing his neighborhood convenience store of wine four times in a week. Charles Korman, 29, lived about a block from the 7-Eleven at 2619 N. Clark until his recent move to the Cook County Jail.

Prosecutors said he robbed the store of five bottles of wine on April 1 and five more on April 2.

On April 3, he allegedly claimed to have a gun and threatened to shoot the cashier as he stole six more bottles of Dark Horse wine. The cashier told police he saw a gun-shaped object in the robber's waistline.

Three days later, Korman allegedly returned, again threatened to shoot the cashier, and took between 15 and 20 bottles of Dark Horse wine, which he stuffed into a backpack. A CPD report said he lifted his sweatshirt to expose a

revolver in his waistband.

Cops patrolling the neighborhood arrested him near his home in the 600 block of W. Wright-

wood after noticing he looked like the robber, who wore the same outfit during each robbery: a green sweatshirt, green winter cap, black face mask, and one black glove.

Police said he had a 5-inch knife and a carbon dioxide-powered pellet gun in his waistband when the officers took him into custody.

In addition to four counts of robbery, Korman was initially charged with two counts of misdemeanor retail theft for allegedly stealing six bottles of wine from the store on March 30 and five more on April 5. Those charges are no longer being pursued.

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What Italian Chicagoan has brought more notoriety and fame to Chicago than anyone else?

Recent attacks and a not-so-concealed animosity against Chicago's Italian community permitted many elected officials to take swipes at them that normally they would have avoided at all costs.

The shameful removal of the Christopher Columbus statues from Grant Park and Arrigo Park were the icing on the cake. These travesties were not only politically incorrect, the attacks on Columbus were historically inaccurate. But then, it's exhilarating for some Chicagoans to taunt and attack Italians.

Chicago politicians never seemed to be afraid of Italian voters at the polls. Was that just Irish cockiness? Or was it WASP ballot box privilege rearing its head? There weren't many Aldermen of Italian heritage in the City Council when I worked there.

But I can't imagine him coping very well in 2025 with the broken promises and the weak leadership of current politicians. Marzullo wasn't squeamish. He wasn't afraid of making things work well. He kept his eye on the financial picture of Chicago. And for Marzullo, his neighborhood came first. His people, whatever their origins, came first. He was bold. A hardliner. A devoted Democrat. And most of all a Chicagoan who treasured the beauty, commerce, freedom and opportunity that this city provided.

We bring this up now because the city is making plans to let Christopher Columbus out of woke history prison. He was sent there by bigoted, academically-challenged "non-thinkers" who tried and convicted the 15th century sailor and explorer without a fair trial.

Well for my money that honor belongs to one man. The one whose favorite Chicago ice cream parlor was Margie's Candies at Western and Milwaukee avenues: Alphonse Capone.

Big Al, as he was known, wasn't the fictional invention of Desilu Productions. He was a real-life Chicagoan from the South Side, 7244 S. Prairie. Born in Brooklyn, NY in 1899, he died in Florida in 1947, after his release from prison, still a young man, but sick with Syphilis.

Capone was a Prohibition mobster. A man who made his Chicago gangsters world famous. Before anyone ever saw an episode of "The Untouchables."

Capone's Chicago demonstrated a new version of assimilation in the everyday life of Chicago neighborhoods, and deserves a statue. Instead of rejecting it, we should own it. He's already forever tied to Chicago, let's run with it.

Is that any worse than the secret mayhem brought about by the foolishness and incomprehension of our current mayor? Has there been any movement or resolution on the homeless camping in our parks? There will be no calls for his statue to grace our parks, unless it's set up in a tent under a viaduct.

Why must Chicago citizens endure this mindless assault on our functioning as an American city? Is there any chance shops will open once more on Michigan Ave.? Maybe a statue of him standing in traffic with a baby strapped to his back, and cardboard sign begging for money.

No, we suggest the creation and placement of some strategic statuary of Alphonse Capone, Lincoln-like, across the city. It will encourage Chicagoans in bringing about success in our efforts to quench our present urban thirsts.

Hopefully it won't scare the woke too much.

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Data shows property tax bills have spiked for 240,000 Cook County homeowners

New data dashboard shows need for relief

Almost a quarter of a million Cook County homeowners have recently seen their property tax bills spike by 25% or more in a single year, according to new data released by the Cook County Assessor's Office [CCAO].

The typical homeowner with a spike saw their tax bill go up by \$1,700. In total, these 240,000 homeowners paid close to \$500 million more in property taxes as a result of the increases.

The data is available at www.cookcountyassessor.com/historical-analysis-property-tax-spikes-2021-2023.

This data quantifies what so many families have already experienced: being suddenly saddled with much larger tax bills. Homeowners budget responsibly based on predicted increases, but the larger property tax system doesn't provide predictability.

We need property tax relief that will serve as a crucial safeguard for homeowners in this untenable situation, protecting them from unsustainable tax spikes.

The CCAO's new data dashboard is a historical analysis of property tax bill spikes between Tax Year 2021 and Tax Year 2023. It includes data from tax bills mailed out in the summer of 2024, when the typical homeowner in Cook County's south and west suburbs saw a tax bill increase of nearly 20%. The dashboard also shows tax bill spikes by different geographies, including Cook County townships, municipalities, state legislative districts, and Chicago wards.

The data dashboard also allows users to adjust the three parameters that define a tax spike. These are:

- The percentage increase of a tax bill spike (default 25%)
- The minimum increase of a tax bill spike (default \$500)
- The maximum market value of a property experiencing a spike (default \$1,000,000)

"Circuit Breaker" program would provide relief

The CCAO has worked on state legislation to create a property tax relief initiative for homeowners. This "circuit breaker" program would provide relief to qualifying homeowners with a 25% bill spike. Credits given to homeowners would cover up to half of the tax bill increase.

The Circuit Breaker Property Tax Relief Act was filed in the Illinois Senate as SB 1978 by Sen. Patrick Joyce [40th] and in the House as HB3808 by Rep. Justin Slaughter [27th].

Last week, we published an editorial in the Chicago Tribune, written together with Mayor Nathaniel G. Booker of Maywood and Mayor Joseph Woods of Park Forest, calling for the state legislature to pass the circuit breaker.

"While it's up to legislators to balance the many competing priorities we have, we believe that we need to start putting the details on paper at some point on a program

that is a necessary safeguard for our residents," the group wrote. "That's how we figure out a solution to a problem that seems intractable."

South suburbs saw most property tax pain

While tax spikes of at least 25% occurred across Cook County, many south suburban municipalities have seen especially high increases in their bills.

In Country Club Hills, for example, more than half of homeowners have seen a tax spike of 25% or more. For these homeowners, the median tax bill increase was \$2,700.

In 2022, the median residential tax bill in Country Club Hills was about \$5,000, according to data from the Cook County Treasurer's Office.

For homeowners with tax bill spikes in Thornton Township, which includes all or parts of Calumet City, Harvey, South Holland, and several other municipalities, they paid a total of \$42.2 million more in property taxes due to these increases. That was the second-highest raw total of any township in Cook County, though Thornton Township makes up less than 1.5% of all assessed value in Cook County.

Chicago Spring Half Marathon this Sunday

bound lane from Randolph to Monroe (3a.m.-noon); Columbus southbound lane from Randolph to Monroe (3 a.m.-9 a.m.); All lanes Columbus Dr. from Monroe to Jackson (3 a.m.-9 a.m.); All lanes Columbus Dr. from Jackson to Roosevelt (6 a.m.-9 a.m.); Both exit ramps from Lake Shore Dr. to Randolph (6:30a.m.-noon), and Eastbound lane of intermediate Randolph from Lake Shore Dr. to Columbus (6:30 a.m.-noon).

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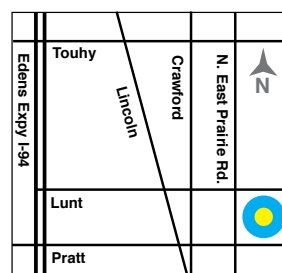


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Taxes spike, will Springfield help with relief?

The two certainties in the universe are death and higher property taxes. The latter is the current reality for nearly a quarter million Chicago and Cook County homeowners.

According to new data released by the Cook County Assessor's office, property tax bills of nearly 240,000 homeowners "spiked" by a whopping 25% or more in a single year.

The typical Cook County homeowner saw their real estate tax bill jump by an average of \$1,700. In total, some 236,841 paid close to \$500 million more in property taxes as a result of the increases, and local government's failure to control spending.

Several North Side Chicago lakefront townships were hit hard

by the tax spike between 2021 and 2023, according to the following Assessor data:

- North Chicago Twp: Some 531 homeowners in the upscale neighborhoods of Lincoln Park and Old Town saw their property taxes catapult an average of \$2,508.

- Lakeview Twp: A total of 3,968 lakefront property owners in Lake View and Edgewater saw their bills rise an average of \$1,774.

- Jefferson Park Twp: A whopping 21,234 Northwest Side homeowners saw their bills rise an average of \$1,773.

- West Twp. Some 12,910 property owners in such popular neighborhoods as Bucktown, Logan Square and Wicker Park witnessed tax bills rising an average of \$1,740.

- Rogers Park Twp: Approximately 3,877 homeowners saw tax bills rise an average of \$1,162.

The Assessor's new data dashboard is a historical analysis of property tax-bill spikes between the tax year 2021 and the tax year 2023. It includes data from second-installment tax bills mailed out in the summer of 2024. That year, the typical homeowner in Cook County's south and west suburbs saw a tax-bill increase of 20%.

"This data quantifies what so many families have already experienced—being suddenly saddled with much larger tax bills," said Cook County Assessor Fritz Kaegi. "Homeowners typically budget responsibly based on predicted increases, but the larger property tax system doesn't provide predictability."

Tax spikes also contribute to forcing landlords of income properties to raise apartments rents, analysts say. As a result of tax spikes, rents are rising faster in posh neighborhoods such as Lincoln Park and Old Town.

- Lincoln Park: The owner of a Victorian 6-flat recently leased a one-bedroom apartment for \$2,765, up 31.6% from \$2,100 in 2024. The base rent in 2025 was \$2,575, plus a \$75 utility pass-through fee, a pet rent of \$50

per animal, and a storage locker charge of \$65. That's a 46.5% rent increase, most of which will go to pay for a 2024 projected real estate tax bill of \$27,620.

- Old Town: The owner of a Victorian 4-flat leased a two-bedroom, two-bath apartment for \$3,620, up 27% from \$2,850 in 2024. The base rent for 2025 was \$3,495, plus a \$75 utility pass-through fee, a pet rent of \$50 per animal. The lion's share of the rent increase will go to pay for a

2024 projected real estate tax bill of \$26,816.

'Circuit breaker' coming?

The Assessor is working on new state legislation to create a property tax-relief initiative for homeowners.

Scooter rider accuses city of negligence leading to his injury

Bennett Hawkins has filed a lawsuit against the City of Chicago, alleging negligence in maintaining public streets that led to his injury. The complaint was filed on April 14, in the Circuit Court of Cook County, naming the City of Chicago as the defendant.

According to the lawsuit, on April 19, 2024, Hawkins was riding his scooter on Michigan Ave. near Randolph St. when he encountered an unfinished and hazardous street condition. The complaint claims that this condition resulted from negligent repair work by the City of Chicago and its employees. As a result of these alleged negligent acts, Hawkins struck an uncovered pipe hole and was ejected from his scooter, sustaining both external and internal injuries.

The plaintiff asserts that these

injuries have significantly impacted his ability to perform daily activities and caused him substantial pain and suffering.

The plaintiff's attorneys argue that it was the duty of the City of Chicago to ensure safe conditions for all lawful users of public streets. They accuse the city of failing to meet reasonable standards in street maintenance and repair, thereby creating a dangerous environment for pedestrians and motorists alike. The lawsuit highlights specific failures such as leaving repairs incomplete and not adhering to expected municipal standards for public safety.

In the crowded urban landscape, where small electric vehicles – primarily scooters and bicycles – have transformed short distance travel, researchers are reporting a major national surge in accidents tied to "micromobility."

Micromobility, the use of small vehicles for one or two passengers, has surged 50-fold over the last decade, especially in dense urban areas like Chicago, with the introduction of electric-powered motors and ride-sharing platforms. The scooters and e-bicycles can travel up to 30 miles an hour and allow riders to cover more distance with less effort.

E-bicycle injuries doubled every year from 2017 to 2023, while e-scooter injuries rose by 45% each year. Injured e-riders tended to be slightly older and wore helmets less often than conventional riders. And e-scooter riders were more likely to sustain internal injuries than conventional scooter riders, while upper extremity injuries were more common among non-EV riders.

The League of American Bicyclists estimated there were around 60,000 e-scooter injuries in 2024. But increasingly the vehicles are proving to be dangerous, especially in the hands of novices.

Hawkins is seeking a judgment exceeding \$50,000 from the court to cover medical expenses incurred due to his injuries, as well as compensation for lost time and ongoing physical and mental anguish. He requests that the court hold the City of Chicago accountable for their alleged negligence in maintaining a safe public infrastructure.

Representing Hawkins is attorney Mark Connolly from Connolly Injury Law. The case is with Judge Mariyana T. Spyropoulos.

Lincoln Square Mall open again after extended closure

On May 12, after nearly three weeks of being closed, the commercial mall on the 4700 block of N. Lincoln Ave. reopened to car and truck traffic, giving the blocks' merchants a sigh of relief.

The loss of customer parking, lack of egress for commercial delivery trucks, and blocked roadways were strangling the popular commercial district.

"The city's construction crews have been making steady progress around the Lincoln/Leland intersection and will be reopening the 4700 block of Lincoln Ave. to vehicles [on May 12]. My sincere thanks to everyone who had supported our local businesses amidst the ongoing construction," said Ald. Matt Martin [47th].

Originally scheduled to be closed for only 10 days, the ongoing construction associated with the modernization of the CTA's Brown Line station plaza at Leland resulted in emergency electrical work that had to be completed before the block could reopen to car and truck traffic.

According to John Schoen, a ComEd spokesperson, his company had already completed the emergency work at the end of April.

In discussions with this newspaper, numerous merchants on the block had said the closure had been especially difficult for their businesses. The unexpected extension included Mother's Day, one of their busiest retail shopping days of the year.

The Lincoln Square Mall was created in 1978 by diverting northbound Lincoln Ave. at Leland Ave. to create the mall. Private property was taken by the city in eminent domain to add three new commercial parking lots, hoping to revitalize the community and allowing it to compete with suburban shopping districts.

Now one of those parking lots has been shut down for CTA Brown Line construction, and a second parking lot was gifted to an out of town developer for an apartment project. Then three weeks ago, the retail community also lost their parking along Lincoln Ave.

On Monday, this reporter saw that Lincoln Ave. was again open, and that every parking spot on the mall was filled.

But not everyone was disappointed with the extended closure. Chief among them was Rony Islam, a bike activist who has lived in Lincoln Square for the past two years and is a board member of the non-profit Heart of Lincoln Square [HOLS], a group co-founded by Ald. Martin.

Rony Islam, who is employed by a San Francisco-based private equity firm, is a co-founder of Bike Grid Now, a nebulous group which organizes illegal mass bicycle rides to clog up roads during rush hour traffic.

"I don't want to speak on behalf of the board for the neighbors' association, but they have had a survey that has been asking people how they've been feeling about the closure. I think the data reported, and a lot of the local press, has shown that people are very supportive of further pedestrianization," of the Lincoln Square mall, said Islam during a May 6 interview with radio station WBEZ 91.5 FM.

"And I think it shows really a huge amount of pent up demand for these kinds of car-free spaces where people can feel safe, to walk around, to shop, to eat, to hang out with their friends, to meet new neighbors. So I think it's just really indica-

tive of that demand," said Islam.

Islam made numerous media appearances throughout the closure in which he claimed widespread support for the permanent closure of the 4700 block of N. Lincoln Ave. to vehicle traffic. Islam told WBEZ that along with his friends, he had decided to seize the opportunity and had built 16 benches to leave out to "activate the spaces."

In addition to being a board member of HOLS, Islam has started SlowStreets.org. The group advocates for the elimination of cars and trucks.

"We want to reclaim streets for people through events and education," according to information posted on the still-pending non-profit's SafeStreets website.

Islam, who is employed by a San Francisco-based private equity firm, is a co-founder of Bike Grid Now, a nebulous group which organizes illegal mass bicycle rides to clog up roads during rush hour traffic. During these rides, participants disobey all traffic signals. Their intent is to tie up traffic to make driving any vehicle as

miserable as possible.

Because many local city officials rely on political support from biking special interest groups, traffic violations are never issued during these illegal bike rides.

Two men, juvenile charged with robbing Red Line passenger of electric scooter in Uptown

Two men and a teenage boy face robbery charges after they allegedly attacked a CTA passenger and took his electric scooter in Uptown. Officials said one of the accused men had just started probation for possessing a machine gun two weeks before the robbery occurred.

The 21-year-old victim was riding the Red Line northbound near Wilson on April 29 when Reason Gill and Michael Harris, both 18, and a 15-year-old boy asked him how much he wanted for his electric scooter, prosecutors said.

When he declined the invitation to sell it, the group pushed him to the ground, and Harris punched him and took the scooter, according to the allegations.

One of the thieves told the man to "Come and get the scooter if you want it." Due to a language barrier, the victim thought the group was willing to give it back. Instead, they knocked him to the ground and beat him again, prosecutors said. At one point, Gill allegedly chased the victim with a barricade.

The victim started walking toward his Edgewater home but soon crossed paths with a passing Chicago police car. He flagged them down and reported the robbery to the officers, who soon had Gill, Harris, and the teenager in custody. The police returned the scooter to the victim.

Gill was placed on juvenile probation for machine gun possession on April 15, Judge James Murphy noted as he ordered him detained pending trial on a charge of aggravated robbery.

Murphy also detained Harris, who faces additional charges for allegedly spitting on a security guard and biting a nurse while undergoing an evaluation at Advocate Illinois Masonic Medical Center.

243 fake designer watches worth over \$6 million seized

Last week U.S. Customs and Border Protection [CBP] officers from the Anti-Terrorism Contraband Enforcement Team stationed at a Cargo Examination Station at O'Hare Airport inspected and then seized a shipment which contained designer brand watches.

The shipment arrived from China on May 4 and was ultimately seized for bearing counterfeit version of the names and logos of the following designer brands: Audermars Piguet, Breitling, Bvlgari, Cartier, Omega, Paneria, Patek Phillipe, Richard Mille, Rolex, Tag Heuer, and Vacheron.

A total of 243 different watches were seized. The shipment had an ultimate destination to an address in Bensenville.

The items were deemed to be counterfeit by the agency's trade experts, and if genuine, would have had a combined Manufacturer's Suggested Retail Price over \$6.64 million. In April, CBP seized another shipment of \$9.22 million in counterfeit watches.

"The distribution of counterfeit goods defraud U.S. consumers and

has a significant adverse impact on businesses by robbing our country of jobs and tax revenues," said LaFonda D. Sutton-Burke, Director of Chicago Field Operations. "Our officers intercepted this [shipment] before these fake items were [put up for sale] and reached consumers."

Consumers can protect themselves from buying fakes by purchasing them directly from the trademark holder or from authorized retailers, and by knowing what price the product should be selling for. If the item is priced well below a reasonable value, it could be counterfeit. If a price seems too good to be true, then it is.

Commonly, these goods are sold in underground outlets and on third party e-commerce websites. Counterfeit commodities fund smugglers and members of organized crime. Consumers often believe they are buying a genuine product but soon realize the item is substandard.

CBP targets and seizes imports of counterfeit and pirated goods and enforces exclusion orders on patent-infringing and other IPR violative goods.

Man gets 16 years for River North road rage murder

On May 7 a judge sentenced a man to 16 years for fatally stabbing another driver during a road rage altercation in River North two summers ago. Alan Saenz Perez, 28, cut a deal with prosecutors in which he pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of second-degree murder for the death of 36-year-old Jeremy Walker on Aug. 23, 2022.

Prosecutors have said Walker was closely following Perez in traffic as Perez drove with his wife and brother in the car around 6:45 p.m. Walker yelled an insult at Perez, then cut him off at the intersection of Dearborn and Ohio, prosecutors said. Perez honked at Walker, who got out of his car and approached Perez's vehicle.

Perez allegedly grabbed a knife and stepped out of his own car. Witnesses said they saw Perez run up to Walker and try to stab him, but Walker briefly fended Perez off. At one point, Perez broke free and stabbed Walker in the neck, causing him to bleed profusely.

Walker returned to his car and drove a couple of blocks to seek help from a Chicago police officer on Michigan Ave. Prosecutors said that he was never armed, and investigators did not find any weapons in his car.

Meanwhile, Perez allegedly drove away from the scene without calling for help. Police tracked Perez down through his car's license plate number, and cops found his car outside his home.

Prosecutors claimed Perez initially "fled" to Indiana after the incident but turned himself in to Chicago police two days after the stabbing. He had never been arrested before.

Judge Domenica Stephenson handled the case and meted out sentencing. Perez will serve half of the prison term, less 1,037 credit days earned while in jail, before being eligible for release.

Man who fatally shot another man in self-defense gets sent to prison for illegally possessing gun

A man who freely admitted that he shot and killed another man in Rogers Park has been sentenced to four years in prison for illegally possessing the firearm he used in the shooting.

Prosecutors never charged Kamari Robinson, 26, with killing 30-year-old Kenneth Sandy because they believed he acted in self-defense. But they did charge the three-time convicted felon with illegally possessing a firearm.

Around 2 p.m. Nov. 16, 2023, Sandy and Robinson got into an argument in the 1600 block of W. Howard, steps

from the Howard CTA station, officials said. The argument turned physical, and Robinson reportedly shot Sandy dead as a nearby surveillance camera recorded the incident.

When Chicago cops arrived, Robinson walked up to an officer and admitted he shot Sandy, but claimed it was in self-defense, according to his arrest report. He allegedly told officers he gave the gun to his sister after the shooting.

Sandy died less than 30 minutes later. Police said he suffered two gunshot wounds to the left side of his chest and another to his arm. An officer noted in the report that prosecutors "rejected" murder charges "due to self-defense." Robinson is only charged with unlawful use of a weapon by a felon.

Robinson has now pleaded guilty to being a felon in possession of a firearm. Judge Aleksandra Gillespie handed him the four-year sentence, of which he must serve 50%. His sentence will be reduced by 530 days for the time he spent wearing an ankle monitor since being arrested.

Public records show Robinson's previous felony convictions were for aggravated battery, hate crime, and possessing a controlled substance, all in 2017.

Carjacker busted by federal chopper crew gets 15 year prison sentence

A man has been slapped with a 15-year prison sentence for carjacking a Lincoln Park resident in Oct. 2023. Noah Sidney, 20, picked a bad night to do it: A federal law enforcement helicopter was in the air, working with Chicago cops and state troopers on an anti-carjacking mission.

The carjacking occurred shortly before 7 p.m. as a 31-year-old man unloaded groceries from his Audi Q3 in the 2200 block of N. Seminary. Police said Sidney walked up to the victim, displayed a pistol, and forced him to turn over his keys, wallet, and phone. The victim complied, and Sidney drove away with his car.

But a multi-jurisdictional law enforcement task force was working in Chicago that night, including a high-tech helicopter operated by U.S. Customs and Border Protection.

After the victim told Chicago cops that two AirTags were in his hijacked car, the police started tracking the devices and shared their location with the helicopter, a CPD report said. The helicopter located the Audi a few minutes later and began radioing "step-by-step location updates" to ground units, according to the report.

When the Audi parked in the 4700 block of S. Martin Luther King Dr., an Illinois State Police trooper moved in and chased Sidney down, the report continued.

"Major assist on this one from IL State Police, who used their pursuit capability to follow these fleeing, violent armed robbers down the Dan Ryan," Ald. Brian Hopkins [2nd] tweeted after cops arrested Sidney.

The police returned the Audi to its owner.

On May 6, Sidney pleaded guilty to aggravated vehicular hijacking with a weapon in exchange for the 15-year sentence from Judge Angela Munari-Petrone. He must serve half of

It's prison time for man who robbed a bank 3 days after being acquitted of bank robbery

Three days after a federal jury found Mohamed Worku not guilty of robbing a Little Village bank, he got arrested for robbing another bank. Once again, he took the case to a jury trial. But he lost this time. Now, he's heading off to serve a 21-month federal prison sentence and will likely be deported when he gets out, according to court filings.

In Dec. 2021, Worku handed a note to a bank teller saying, "Give me the money Please Thank you." The teller gave him \$492 and he walked out.

But he beat the case at trial, arguing that he never threatened the teller or anyone else. He simply asked for money (he even said "please!") and the teller gave it to him. Without a threat, there can be no robbery.

Three days later, Worku walked into Citibank, 2001 N. Halsted, in Lincoln Park, and handed the teller a note. "Please Give me the money I'll pay it back soon banker's Gife to me in advance," the note read, according to a federal complaint.

The teller handed him \$2,068. Wearing a surgical mask, neon green gloves, and a neon green winter cap, the bandit headed out the door. Less than an hour later, Chicago cops spotted Worku near Lincoln and Armitage,

the sentence before being eligible for release.

Cops snare two teenage robbers after woman is mugged near Goose Island

Two boys, ages 15 and 16, are facing felony robbery charges after they mugged a woman near Goose Island, police said.

The 30-year-old victim was in the 900 block of W. Chicago Ave. when three offenders grabbed her, pushed her into the street, and took her phone around 9:20 p.m. Tuesday, May 6, according to Chicago police.

Responding officers spotted three people matching the suspects' descriptions and they arrested two of them in an alley near Ogden and Milwaukee avenues. The third robber, described as a White male wearing black clothing, escaped through the alley.

A CPD spokesperson said both of the detained teenagers have been charged with robbery.

AWOL gun offender sought after woman shot in Rogers Park

Chicago police are looking for a man who's AWOL from a felony gun case after a woman was shot in Rogers Park on May 5.

The 26-year-old victim was traveling in a car when a man she knows fired shots toward her in the 7700 block of N. Paulina around 10:40 p.m., according to CPD. She continued driving to get away from the area and officers located her at a gas station at 101 Ridge Ave., just across the border in Evanston. She had a gunshot wound to her thigh. CPD said she was in good condition.

Officers at the scene said the gunman has been harassing the woman for a while and they know who he is. Court records show prosecutors asked a judge to detain the man after they charged him with illegal possession of a firearm in August. However,

matching the robber's description. The complaint said he had a green hat and gloves sticking out of his coat pockets and a blue surgical mask in his pants pocket.

During an interview with investigators, Worku allegedly pointed out that he didn't have a gun but he "was gonna buy me one" and "there was gonna be a shootout."

Speaking of police officers, he allegedly said, "First m*****r who ride up on me talking about how I fit the description, dead."

This time, federal prosecutors charged him with bank robbery and, just to cover their bases, bank theft. The jury convicted him on both counts.

Federal prosecutors said Worku has four adult convictions for narcotics and "multiple" juvenile adjudications, including two for robbery.

"Even though [the] defendant was acquitted of the [2021] bank robbery charge, the fact that he had been charged and incarcerated for very similar conduct in the recent past should have impressed upon him the gravity of stealing money from banks," the prosecutors argued in a sentencing memorandum.

Judge Caroline Glennon-Goodman rejected the detention petition and sent him home.

Records also show he stopped showing up for court in November and there is an active warrant for his arrest.

The woman is the 11th person shot in Rogers Park this year, putting 2025 exactly on pace with last year's shootings. There were 12 people shot by this time in 2023 and 10 as of this date in 2022.

Man gets 15 years for robbing four downtown Subway sandwich shops

A man has been sentenced to 15 years in prison after pleading guilty to robbing a string of Subway sandwich shops in downtown Chicago and in Melrose Park.

Nicholas Wardford, 32, has pleaded guilty to five cases so far and still has one more pending, which should be resolved soon.

On July 15, 2023, Wardford grabbed a drink from a refrigerator at the Subway at 1232 S. Canal and went to the register. Prosecutors said he pulled out a gun, pistol-whipped the cashier, and took money from the register.

Three days later, he selected a drink at the 604 S. Wabash location and then robbed the cashier at gunpoint when they opened the register to give him change, according to a Chicago police report.

And on July 29, prosecutors said, Wardford robbed a Subway restaurant at 8345 W. North Ave. in Melrose Park. Cops in Forest Park arrested him later that day after he was seen with a firearm at a 7-Eleven store,

Peter Asher coming to Old Town School of Folk Music

British musical legend Peter Asher, who first found success more than 60 years ago as part of Peter and Gordon, will be returning to perform Friday, May 16 at the Old Town School of Folk Music [OTSFM], 4544 N. Lincoln Ave.

Asher will be performing *A Musical Memoir of the 60s and Beyond* at 8 p.m. on the main stage, the Gary and Laura Maurer Concert Hall.

Not only will Asher performing the hits from his days as a member of Peter and Gordon (including several songs specifically written for the duo by The Beatles' John Lennon and Paul McCartney), he will also engage the audience with stories about his days as part of the British Invasion and later, as one of the recording industry's most in-demand record producers for acts as diverse as Linda Ronstadt, J.D. Souther, James Taylor and 10,000 Maniacs.

"The show is about half conversation and half performance. Some of it will be explaining what went on back then and some of it is performing the hits of Peter and Gordon. Those tours are just the two of us and a keyboard player. This time, it is a full band, which includes an incredible fiddle player. I have worked out a lot of stuff with them," said Asher.

Although Peter and Gordon's recording career was relatively brief (1964-1968), they were part of the British Invasion, the time period when America's pop charts were dominated by the Beatles. Their first number one hit was *A World Without Love*, a song given to the duo by the Beatles' Paul McCartney and John Lennon. The duo had a string of follow-up hits during that time period. During that time period, McCartney was dating Asher's sister, Jane Asher, who was a well-known host on British television.

"I welcome questions from the audience, during the show. Far from calling it heckling, the questions are welcome. One of the nice things about playing cool, smaller places like the Old Town School, is that you can take a digression and a diversion from

your narrative and get away with it! I am fortunate. I can provide pictures on the screen behind me in the right order and talk about pretty much whatever I want to talk about during that time," said Asher.

Peter Asher cites OTSFM co-founder Big Bill Broonzy as one of his major influences. In the early 1960s, Broonzy had extensively toured Great Britain and became highly influential to aspiring British musicians.

"Certain blues artists in particular, Big Bill Broonzy and Sister Rosetta Tharpe, in particular, were legendary in England, due to their tours of Europe. In America, they were more like footnotes. While everyone in America knew about John Lee Hooker, not everyone knew in America knew about Big Bill Broonzy. Over in England, we all knew American music, including the Chicago blues. Before the Beatles, they had never played British music. They only played American music. Everything they did was based on their love of American music," said Asher.

Asher's show includes film footage and photos from his considerable personal archive. While Asher and his friends loved American music, one British performer was a major influence, British comedian George Formby. Not only was Formby known for his comedic performances, he also was adept on the ukulele. As an homage to Formby (as well as his late friend, George Harrison) Asher performs the 1966 hit *Lady Godiva* on ukulele.

"George [Harrison] loved using the ukulele. So did I. George Formby was our idol. Formby was amazing, rhythmically and melodically. He was the master of his instrument. I also wouldn't presume to know how to play the Hawaiian side of the instrument. I can't play like Formby, either. I'm a very basic ukulele player. On stage, I play *Lady Godiva* with it, because it is a musical hall kind of flavored song," said Asher.

Most of the Lennon-McCartney songs recorded by Peter and Gordon were never recorded by the Beatles. The duo's subsequent Lennon-McCartney songs

included "Nobody I Know" and "I Don't Want to See You Again" and were hits on both sides of the Atlantic.

Peter Asher cites Old Town School of Folk Music co-founder Big Bill Broonzy as one of his major influences.

"World Without Love" had been an early unfinished Lennon/McCartney song that had been rejected by The Beatles. When Asher and Waller were offered a recording contract, the duo found they needed an original song to record.

"The song was a leftover. The Beatles had decided not to record it. Fortunately, I was there, and I asked if we could adopt the song and record it. Paul said yes. The song was still incomplete. I needed to get him to finish the bridge. Just prior to going to the recording studio, I asked him to finish it and he wrote it in eight minutes, on guitar," said Asher in an earlier interview with Inside Publications.

"World Without Love" has been recognized by The Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in Cleveland as one of the 500 songs that shaped rock and roll.

The duo also had a hit with McCartney's "Woman" a song

released under a pseudonym because McCartney had wanted to find out if was his music or his fame that had sold records.

In 1965, they recorded Del Shannon's "I Go to Pieces," a song the Michigan-born singer had decided not to record. In 1961, Del Shannon's self-penned song "Runaway" had been a number one hit. Fortunately, Peter and Gordon were touring in Australia on the same bill as Del Shannon and they found out the song was available.

"He had decided that it wasn't a good song for him to record and he had been trying to find it a home. I overheard a failed pitch Del Shannon had made to the UK's The Searchers. I immediately asked if Gordon and I could record it and he agreed. We worked on the song continuously. We asked him not to give it to anyone else and he agreed," said Asher.

The duo's instincts were correct. After its release, "I Go to Pieces" was another Top 10 hit. After he stopped touring with Waller, he started a career in music management working for The Beatles at their record label, Apple. Later, he became a highly-regarded record producer.

Idaho stop?

I learned to drive in California. Slowing down so that you could stop on a dime if necessary was something I learned was called a “boulevard stop” or a “California stop.” I have been known to do this while driving a car, as well as while riding a bicycle, as long as there are no ticket-happy cops around.

Letter-writer Mark Robbins [April 30] whines about having to put both feet on the ground at a full stop, as if he hasn’t ridden the kinds of bikes I have. I too don’t like to have to come to a full stop, but I don’t complain about having to obey the laws. The physics of bicycling are marvelous. Once I stop, I quickly end up in the “ready” position: one foot on the pavement, the other on the top pedal on the other side. One foot holds the bike upright. I can hold this position as long as the traffic controls and traffic require. Normal bicycling in Illinois is not like Bike the Drive.

Rules of the Road has explicit

instructions on how road users, including bicycles, shall use their right of way at an intersection controlled by stop signs in all directions. Road users take turns going through the intersection in a specified order. One doesn’t have to come to a full stop to yield, according to the Rules, the right of way. That’s a physical reality, not in our law books yet.

There’s no practical need to legalize this almost-stop at stop signs by bicycles. Chicago Police already treat all moving and mechanical violations by bicyclists as “secondary offenses” - only to be enforced after an actual collision. Visit Clark and Catalpa and watch all the moving violations all day long by bicyclists, none enforced, even when a squad car is close by.

If the Chicago Police were required to actually enforce the rules pertaining to bicycle equipment and operation on public streets, they could still use their discretion to let a bicyclist “get

Man shot outside River North nightclub

A man was shot during a fight outside a River North nightclub May 11.
Witnesses said a large group of people were fighting in the 100 block of W. Ontario when a man in the crowd threatened to shoot around 4:02 a.m.
CPD said the victim, 25, was involved in an argument with a man when the situation escalated and the two began to physically fight. The offender ultimately pulled out a gun and fired shots, striking the victim in the buttocks.
Witnesses identified a man in the area as the shooter and police de-

tained the man around 4:25 a.m., with some saying he put a gun into a black SUV that left the area. Officers detained the man for questioning, but CPD subsequently said no one is in custody.

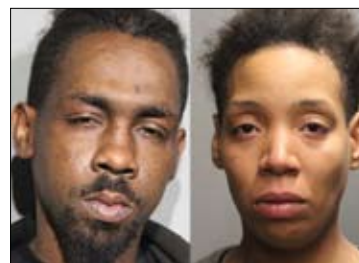
Meanwhile, EMS took the victim to Northwestern Memorial Hospital in good condition, police said.

Sunday's victim is the ninth person shot on the Near North Side this year. That includes a man who was shot by Chicago Police after he allegedly threatened officers with a knife. At this point last year, the Near North Side had seen eight people shot, including a Chicago Police Officer.

Dad opened fire with a gun in each hand, took cover behind minivan containing his eight kids

In shocking allegations, prosecutors say a man opened fire on a Rogers Park street, firing a gun with each hand, and then tossed both loaded weapons into a nearby minivan where his eight young children were sitting. And, prosecutors say, the kids' mom tossed a loaded shotgun into the vehicle, too.

Zantarrion Ferguson, 33, and Daphanie Johnson, 32, are each

charged with unlawful possession of a weapon and eight counts of child endangerment. Judge James Murphy detained both of them.

It all started around 3:30 p.m. April 27 when officers in the Rogers Park 24th District allegedly saw Ferguson firing two guns at three men in the 7600 block of N. Ashland.

Firing a Glock pistol with his left hand and a mini-AK-47 in his right hand, Ferguson shot at the group and used the Toyota minivan holding his eight children for cover, a Chicago police report said.

After unloading on the unidentified men, Ferguson tossed both guns, which were still loaded, into the minivan with the kids, according to prosecutors. They said Johnson, the registered owner of the minivan, tossed a loaded shotgun in with the kids while Ferguson was shooting, too.

The CPD report referred to Johnson as Ferguson's wife and said all of the children were his. The kids, who all have Ferguson or Johnson as their last names, ranged in age from eight months to 12 years.

Johnson allegedly told officers something to the effect of, "I did it to protect my family," claiming someone had shot at her.

long-vacant grocery store location, “Fern Hill has a requirement to find a new grocery tenant for the former Treasure Island space... They have a three and a half year time limit to do so.”

Who that new tenant may be is unknown, and no lease has been made public for 1639 N. Wells St. Nor is the fate known - and temporary location ID'd - of a Walgreens store, whose building will be demolished to make way for the new high-rise.

Yet, trust remains fragile in the community. An Oct. 2024 letter from OTMRA to Ald. Hopkins emphasized lingering community concerns. “Overall, OTMRA is hearing that Nick Anderson and Fern Hill have not established any level of trust with the community.”

Marcy Huttas, Executive Director of OTMRA, noted in emails that the contribution arose directly from neighborhood feedback. “It was our negotiating committee... that suggested the community benefits, based on input we have heard throughout this process,” she said. “Discussion for the \$300,000 ‘Community Donation’... has been focused on rat abatement and rat sterilization. The OTMRA board would ultimately vote on the use of the funds for the benefit of the community.”

Framing the donation as a grassroots idea obscures the power imbalance between a multimillion-dollar developer and a neighborhood group dependent on membership, fundraising and Special Service Area [SSA] funds.

The notion that the community “suggested” the contribution conveniently sidesteps the reality that Fern Hill benefits financially from the rezoning they received, while avoiding a formal commitment to offset those gains.

While the final agreement enforces design limits and community check-ins, it leaves the much-discussed \$300,000 fund as a matter of public expectation—but may not be a binding contract.

The agreement was signed by Huttas and OTMRA Board President Pam Farley. And in April, Ald. Hopkins said he ended up approving the project because of the significant backing among other Old Town neighbors, including last-minute support coming from the OTMRA.

Last week Ald. Hopkins insisted that oversight mechanisms are already in place. “It’s a legally binding agreement... overseen by a board of directors on the SSA. So those funds are restricted and can’t be used for anything else but rodent control,” he said.

Still, the agreement contains no mention of third-party audits or public reporting mechanisms on how the funds will be spent.

While the community benefit is narrowly defined, some residents remain skeptical. A summer 2024 OTMRA membership survey showed that 64.81% of members opposed the Fern Hill project, citing density, traffic, and lack of trust in the developer... only 14.81% indicated support for the project.

Their Oct. 2024 letter summarized the results, while noting the lack of trust in the community.

The agreement does include some enforcement teeth. According to Ald. Hopkins, “The alderman actually has the authority to review any evidence sent to us of violations... and issue a \$5,000 fee per day of violation.” He also pointed to other community safeguards such as a ban on short-term rentals and disruptive Sunday construction, and a quarterly panel be-

tween the developer, the alderman’s office, and local representatives to address ongoing concerns.

But for some of the project’s critics, the donation may still feel transactional. The OTMRA and their SSA#48 will in fact benefit from the additional property tax funds they will collect annually from the new high-rise development. In 2024, SSA#48 service tax funds amount totaled \$579,167 through an additional 0.450% fee added to property within the SSA zone.

What’s less clear is whether the \$300,000—and the development itself—can ultimately repair the trust gap between Fern Hill and the neighborhood.

Developers offering “soft” benefits—donations, oversight panels, aesthetic tweaks—in exchange for rezoning approvals that increase land value. But without hard guarantees, these benefits are often symbolic. What is the price of public trust?

they are also a lender on that building.

Sterling Bay turned over the property to the bank via a deed in lieu of foreclosure, a form of voluntary surrender, with the bank writing down the value of the debt from the original \$128 million mortgage loan. But Sterling Bay is still in trouble. According to the master plan they agreed to for the site, they have commitments to pay

for hundreds of millions of infrastructure projects in the area, including new roads and bridges. The developer has met virtually none of those commitments.

As part of the agreement with the city, Sterling Bay would later be reimbursed for infrastructure costs by Tax Increment Financing money generated by Lincoln Yards’ real estate. But to collect those taxes, they must have buildings filled with income generating tenants.

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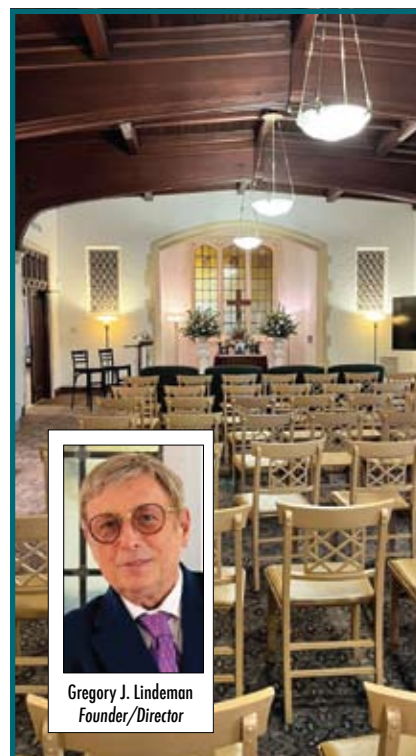
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
