## Edgewater Chamber approved alcohol plan knowing of history

**Alderman mum on discrepancies**

After backing down in June to community opposition to a proposed new liquor store at Granville and Broadway, the 48th Ward office is once again involved in another battle over a proposed liquor license.

July 1 saw the first hybrid ward meeting in the 48th Ward blending in live people attending with Zoom people watching from afar. The first topic to arise concerned the zoning change needed for the proposed grocery store with packaged liquor sales in the building located at the northeast corner of Berwyn Ave. and Winthrop Ave.

While deigning not to answer

questions about the correct address or about the liquor plans with the grocery store, Ald. Leni Manaa-Hoppenworth instead asked for questions to be submitted in writing on her website.

Her communications manager, Audrey Champelli, did say that the address posted on the Public Notice was “probably correct.” The alderman’s chief of staff, Nicole Granacki, remained silent.

What is certain is that the 5305-09 N. Berwyn address is immediately adjacent to Cedar Playlot Park, a Chicago Park District property located at 5311 N. Winthrop Ave.

The discrepancy arose as Manaa-Hoppenworth posted development plans requiring rezoning necessary to permit liquor sales to an address listed at 1068 W.

Berwyn Ave. She identified the purpose as to convert a first floor vacant tavern into a “bodega” intent on selling packaged liquor.

The address Manaa-Hoppenworth cited is close to the former Ollie’s Lounge at 1064 W. Berwyn Ave. From 1977 until her passing in 2017, Ms. Ollie Latiker owned and operated the lounge while living upstairs. She was a leading figure in the community. Prior to 1977, it was a tavern known as The Urge.

However, the posted Public Notice at the building identifies the development address as 5305-09 N. Winthrop Ave. This address previously was home to Thompson Studio Art where Michael Stuart Thompson created his

## ‘Reformers’ want to end most police traffic stops. Here’s what that could mean for you — and for armed criminals

With the ShotSpotter gunfire detection system soon to be removed from Chicago’s streets, so-called “reform” activists are turning their attention to another tool police find useful: traffic stops.

Cook County State’s Attorney Kim Foxx said in May that her office is developing a policy not to prosecute gun, theft, and drug charges stemming from certain traffic stops. Foxx said her staff would refuse to file charges in most cases if evidence was found during a traffic stop for missing license plates, expired registrations, and other minor infractions. She called the anticipated change “a public safety enhancement effort.”

“Armed with data, armed with the knowledge that these stops have not significantly or in any way reduced violence in our city, [my office] decided that it was time to look at this issue and see if we could model a best practice that we’ve seen in other jurisdictions,” Foxx told the Sun-Times.

One person who thinks Foxx is on the wrong road with her traffic stop idea is retired Riverside Police Chief Tom Weitzel.

“I have stated my entire career that if you want to change the law, then go to Springfield and lobby for an actual change in the criminal statutes,” Weitzel said. “She is just trying to use her ‘prosecutorial discretion.’ It is like the President of the United States us-

## Will lack of parking kill The Mabel?

**The Mabel in Edgewater seeks full residential rezoning**

What once was a historic signature commercial building at Ridge Ave. and Clark St. in Edgewater will soon evolve to become entirely residential. The Mabel, 5920 N. Ridge Ave., was once the world headquarters of Maybelline Cosmetics, but now the building owners are pursuing a zoning change to allow first floor residential use.

Deleterious to the needs of the building’s first floor commercial spaces is the complete lack of any off-street or street-side commercial parking. What little parking that was available to the building was lost in favor of a privileged bike path on Clark St.

(Not all bike paths are “privi-

leged” bike paths. A privileged bike path is one that takes a public accommodation - such as a street lane - that is paid for by taxpayers, and cordons it off behind concrete barriers and other

obstacles for the exclusive use of one privileged class of user.)

The building was recently rehabbed, with 52 residential units

## Two restaurants seek community help after car crashes wreck interiors

Two well-liked and long-living Clark St. restaurants are now seeking help from the community after crashed cars landed in their dining rooms.

Last week the interiors of Alexander’s Restaurant, 6158 N. Clark St., and Anna Maria Pasteria, 4400 N. Clark St., were severely damaged due to cars traveling down Clark St. crashing into the buildings.

Anna Maria Pasteria sustained heavy damage when an out-of-

control driver crashed into the restaurant, luckily about an hour after closing time. There were no injuries, and the restaurant is closed for the foreseeable future.

At about 9:45 p.m. June 30, a 27-year-old man was driving north on Clark St. when he reportedly ran a red light, hit a car going west on Montrose Ave. and crashed through the restaurants front window.

The Ravenswood Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a Go-

FundMe to help the restaurant staff of six people who find themselves with no income through no fault of their own, and to help owner Anna Spinelli with out-of-pocket expenses while the red tape is being sorted out.

A mix of modern and traditional Italian cuisine, Anna Maria Pasteria has long been a local favorite. Sisters Anna and Maria, originally from the Basilicata re-

## Community meeting July 23 on proposed new Sheridan Rd. ETOD

A proposal has come forward to build a new Equity Transit Oriented Development [ETOD] at 7738 N. Sheridan Rd.

The proposal calls for 52-new units, but only nine off-street parking spots.

The 49th Ward office will be hosting a community meeting to discuss a proposed zoning change for the property, 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. Tuesday, July 23. The meeting will also be broadcast via Zoom.

Before the onslaught of ETOD and TOD developments, a project like this would have had to create one off street parking spot for each new housing unit.

This location along the far Northeast Rogers Park lakefront is one of the most parking starved areas of the community.

The applicant is seeking a zoning change from RT-4 to B2-5 to allow for the construction of a

new 6-story, 52 unit, ETOD development on the site of a vacant lot. There will be no retail component to this development.

In 2020, the City published its ETOD Policy Plan, which established equity as a guiding framework for TOD initiatives moving forward.

ETOD claims to enable all people regardless of income, race, ethnicity, age, gender, immigration status or ability to experience dense, mixed-use, pedestrian-oriented development near transit hubs. ETOD elevates and prioritizes investments and policies that close the socioeconomic gaps between neighborhoods that are predominately people of color and those that are majority white.

# Could Washington learn something from past Chicago politicians?

Did you watch the last presidential debate?

I hope so. That's the only way you qualify as a true disgruntled follower of the campaign, and an American political critic in the vein of Donna Brazile, Bob Woodward, Maya Harris, Linda Chavez, Valerie Jarrett, Rich Lowry, Ari Shapiro, Eric Cantor, Bay Buchanan and Sean Spicer.

You may spot your favorite political pundit among that crowd of professional political talkers. Yes, they are all on the "A-list" of Washington DC party invitations. They are political "influencers."

With some grounding in reality, their words and ideas often make sense. All have earned their bread and butter through some fiscal aspect of American politics. Their political office, or their column, their time at the White House, their insider's New York Times best seller, their Ivy League faculty status, rarified blog, some PBS appearances or membership on the strategy teams attempting to shape American foreign policy or economic plans. Or efforts to just sell newspapers. Bob Woodward even chased down Nixon's lawlessness at the birth of Watergate with Carl Bernstein tagging

along.

Of course sometimes they are too smart for their own britches.

You see, if you didn't watch or listen to the debate, how will you be able to honestly repeat your high volume-criticism of presidential policies and personalities?

Otherwise you are just one more uninformed, ill-educated, complaining American political lightweight. Regurgitating, I suspect, the script of the loony liberal left or the psychotic strategy of the right-wing.

I've actually known some profoundly influential American political philosophers and thinkers. Political "doers." People of reasoned intelligence and balanced emotional integrity. People of expansive capacities to place political theories in balance. Examining the full scope of American needs and necessities. People who have real experience.

During my two decades at Chicago City Hall I learned a lot about politics on the third floor. Stuff I couldn't find in books, how deals are done on the fifth floor.

The kind of intuitive understanding that was always a distinguishing trait of Chicago politics, and its elected leaders. It flowed from the characters of Aldermen Hinkey Dink Kenna and Bathhouse John Coughlin, Dorsey Crowe, Tom Keane, Paddy Bauler, Vito Marzullo, Bill Dawson, Matthew Danaher, John S. Boyle, Frank Corr, Joseph Rostenkowski, Casimir Laskowski and Roman Pucinski, to name but a few.

It wasn't a complicated formula. Pure practical equations of human life. The living politics of everyday living. Until recently, no

one in America did it better than Chicago politicians and Chicago citizens.

Here on the expanse of the Prairie, Chicagoans, historically, faced a similar expansive political experience. Wide. Flat. Geographically rich terrain that lifted high everything Chicagoans pursued.

Ironically at the very center of the nation where all the waterways, planes and trains met. The middle of America geographically and psychologically. Nature itself was a constant companion, along with the openness that carried its own special sense of the American ideal. No wonder transportation on the water, on the rails, on the cattle trails to the stock yards were such transformative and innovative experiences.

Our openness was even the reason our architecture worked and rose so high.

Chicago lacked the tight-fitting stranglehold that so many overcrowded Eastern cities experienced. Cities all older than Chicago. Less measured than Chicago. For Chicago was a city that kept reinventing itself, always finding new ways to expand and grow. It's why immigrants felt welcome, less impoverished. There was room for everyone. And employment for all.

So it is quite natural that the political organizations that evolved within Chicago's successful development would be reflective of the savvy endeavors of everyday Chicago life. It's why we see such acute, astute political professionals evolve from the soul of Chicago. You don't have to look very long to see what kind of politico fits so well into Chicago's hands-on psyche.

Look at our first mayor, William Butler Ogden, and the powerhouse, later, that was Long John Wentworth. Not to mention "Foxy Eddie" Cullerton, the ancestor of the expansive Cullerton Family. He entered the political scene in the era right after the American Civil War. Possessed of wide experience as an Irish immigrant, but living through that experience helping others like himself sort out what it meant to be in America. And have the stunning luck to be in Chicago.

This was home to Mayor Levy Boone, whom President Abraham Lincoln, himself, pardoned for some Civil War gaffe. Mayor Joseph Medill elected on the "Fire Proof Ticket," whose progeny served in the U.S. Senate and married into the historic McCormick Family. Medill became mayor in the aftermath of the Great Fire of 1871. Chicago's worst disaster and most fortuitous moment in our history. The Fire changed us forever. Physically. Psychologically. Politically.

Post-Fire mayors like Monroe Heath, Thomas Hoynes and Carter Harrison III demonstrated that Chicago had evolved with a fresh, new, political self-awareness. A profound moment as the city was then only 40 years old. But it was the fastest growing city in the world. Every 10 years Chicago's population doubled. (Today it shrinks.)

Mayor Harrison was assassinated in 1893 on the eve of the closing of the World's Columbian

Exposition. A whole new genre of politico would succeed in that office through the next century. Men of sharp political wits. Reasoned political notions and dedication to the needs of Chicagoans.

This catapulted many into the national political spotlight. Their influence spilled far beyond the borders of Chicago. Men like Mayor Ed Kelly would exercise enormous national political leverage. Especially with President Franklin Delano Roosevelt who served an unprecedented four terms. Three and four directly linked to Mayor Kelly's political leadership.

Imagine anyone but Roosevelt as president during the rough days of World War II.

I am reminded, having watched the recent debate, that President Roosevelt had been confined to life in a wheel chair from Polio. Yet his being lifted in and out of his chair and carried in the arms of the Secret Service was never photographed in the press.

His rapidly aging condition was seldom criticized or publicly scrutinized or the cause of hand-ringing. Even his death in office was handled with kindness and sympathetic discretion. Without any of the needless intrusive spying, photo ambushes, insensitive innuendo or displays of agism so much in vogue today. All a part of today's media's useless distorted displays of half-truths, political errors and flagrant maneuvering with political falsehoods and journalistic lies.

Ultimately it is America that is cheated by the poor quality of our disgraceful national inability to prepare ourselves to choose political leaders by their strengths. Not weaknesses. Journalists act with a true lack of balanced moral judgment. The media condemned by its own shabby actions and lack of honest patriotism.

Will you watch the next presidential debate in September? I think I've reached my limit.

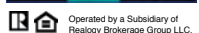

# 104 people shot, 19 fatally, during Independence Day weekend in Chicago

Mayor Brandon Johnson and CPD Supt. Larry Snelling met with reporters Monday to address widespread violence that resulted in at least 104 people being shot over the holiday weekend. Of those who were shot, 19 have died as of Monday.

Since 2014, only the 2021 Independence Day weekend has seen more shooting victims than the just-concluded holiday, according to records independently maintained by HeyJackass.com.

CPD reported four mass shootings, defined as four or more peo-

ple shot during a single incident, this last weekend.

The first occurred around 6:15 a.m. July 4 in the 7100 block of S. Woodlawn. A group of gunmen got out of two vehicles and opened fire on a home, police said, killing two women and a boy who were inside. Two other boys, ages 5 and 7, were critically injured. The Cook County Medical Examiner identified the deceased boy as 8-year-old Bryson Orr.

At a press conference shortly after the shooting, Deputy Mayor of Community Safety Garien Gatewood ducked a question about what he would say to people who

don't think the administration's public safety plan is working.

When Johnson appointed Gatewood to the newly created position last year, the city said Gatewood would "lead cross-government efforts to eradicate the root causes of crime and violence, and advance a comprehensive, healing-centered approach to public safety."

Johnson issued a statement about the shooting that evening: "On behalf of the City of Chicago, we express our deepest condolences to the families and the Grand Crossing community mourning the lives lost in

the shooting that took place this morning. We will continue coordinating with our partners at the Chicago Police Dept., 5th Ward Ald. Desmon Yancy, and victim services partners to support this community on a path of healing from this tragic incident."

Three more mass shootings followed, but they went unaddressed by Johnson:

- Eight people were injured on the Near West Side early Friday morning when at least two gunmen got into a shootout.

- Another shootout left six people injured in the 100 block of S. Menard around 1:44 a.m. Friday,

police said. Once again, all of the victims survived. They were all between 15 and 25 years old.

- At about 3:26 a.m. Sunday, four people were shot in the 3700 block of S. State when a gunfight erupted between a group on the street and a man in a passing truck, according to CPD.

Through Friday 1,269 people had been non-fatally shot in Chicago this year, up from 1,225 at the same point last year. However, fewer shooting victims had died and homicides were down from 337 to 305.

## Chicago homeowners should study escalating tax bills

Tens of thousands of Chicago homeowners recently received some bad news in the mail—the second installment of their 2023 real-estate tax bills from Cook County Treasurer Maria Pappas. The 2023 property taxes are due Aug. 1.

For a wake-up call, analysts say you should especially eye-ball the skyrocketing tax allocation for the Chicago Board of Education—politically supported heavily by Mayor Brandon Johnson. That part of your tax bill jumped up to 8% between 2022 and 2023. That's the biggest bite coming out of your wallet.

"Every homeowner should review their exemptions outlined on the second installment of their real estate tax bill because they can reduce their bill by hundreds of dollars if they have the proper exemptions applied," advised Mi-

chael Griffin, a Chicago real estate tax appeal attorney.

"Homeowners are encouraged to review the bottom left corner of the tax bill to confirm their exemption deductions," said Cook County Assessor Fritz Kaegi.

Most homeowners who occupy their residences are eligible for the "Homeowner Exemption," which saves an average of about \$700. Senior homeowners over the age of 65 are likely eligible for additional property tax savings with the "Senior Exemption."

Seniors and Veterans may also be eligible for further exemptions such as the Low-Income Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze, or "Senior Freeze" and "Veterans with Disabilities Exemptions," Kaegi said.

If a homeowner believes they are eligible for an exemption, they can apply for their missing property tax savings by completing a Certificate of Error (COE). This form provides homeowners with an opportunity to redeem missing exemptions for four years over the 2023, 2022, 2021, 2020, 2019 and 2018 tax years, Kaegi said.

Homeowners are encouraged to submit an online application immediately or make an appointment with the Assessor to apply

for missing exemptions. Accepted photo IDs and documents required to apply are listed on the Assessor's website.

That enlightening advice was followed to the letter for one senior property owner in Lincoln Park, who applied online in 2022 for a Homeowner Exemption, a Senior Exemption, and the Senior Freeze Exemption.

The property owner qualified for all three exemptions, but the result was less than satisfying. Despite providing all of the necessary documentation, he struck out on all three with the online application.

Ironically, the property owner had a Homestead Exemption and Senior Exemption in 2021, however they simply disappeared from the second installment of the 2023 bill. A homeowner is not required to apply for these two exemptions every year. He has contacted the Assessor to investigate the computer glitch that

may have caused the problem.

Here is the terse homeowner response he received via mail from the assessor:

- We are pleased to inform you that the Cook County Assessor's Office has issued a Certificate

of Error which may affect your property taxes.

- Please note that the issuance of the Certificate of Error is only the first step in the process. The Certificate of Error becomes final only after the Assessor's Office and the Circuit Court approve it.

- You will receive written notice on final approval or denial of your Certificate of Error. If the Certificate of Error receives final approval, your tax bill will be adjusted accordingly.

- If the final approval of the Certificate of Error entitles you to a refund, the Cook County Tre-

# Recent Lurie Children's Hospital data breach ransomware attack impacts 791,000 people

Ann & Robert H. Lurie Children's Hospital of Chicago is informing hundreds of thousands of individuals that their personal and health information has been compromised as a result of a ransomware attack.

The children's hospital took many of its systems offline in late January in response to a cyber-attack. The incident resulted in limited access to medical records, disruptions to a patient portal, and hampered communications.

An investigation revealed that cybercriminals had access to Lurie Children's systems between Jan. 26 and Jan. 31.

A wide range of information was compromised, including name, address, date of birth, dates of service, driver's license number, Social Security number, email address, phone number, health claims information, medical condition or diagnosis, medical record number, medical treatment, and prescription infor-

mation.

The children's hospital did not specifically say that it was targeted by a ransomware group, but it did say in a data breach notification on its website that it refused to pay a ransom.

"Experts have advised that making a payment to cybercriminals does not guarantee the deletion or retrieval of data that has been taken. Once our investigation team identified an amount of data that was impacted by the cybercriminals, we worked closely with law enforcement to retrieve that data," Lurie Children's said.

Indeed, the Rhysida ransomware group, which took credit for the attack on Lurie Children's, has claimed on its website that the data stolen from the hospital has been sold, which indicates that a ransom has not been paid. The cybercriminals claim to have stolen 600 GB of data from the organization.

The Rhysida ransomware group emerged in May 2023 and it has targeted organizations in various sectors, including government, IT,

manufacturing, healthcare, and education. The US government issued an advisory for Rhysida in Nov. 2023. The black hat hackers not only steal data from victims but also encrypt files stored on compromised systems.

A notice published by the Maine Attorney General's office on June 26 reveals that the incident has affected more than 791,000 people.

Lurie Children's has established a toll-free call center to address questions about notification, the cybersecurity attack and their response. "Those who have questions about the notification, any notification letter you may have received, or whether your information was impacted, you can contact the call center at 888-401-0575, Monday-Friday between 8 am and 8 pm, U.S. central time," said Lurie in their statement.

Impacted individuals are being notified and offered 24 months of identity and fraud protection services at no cost.

surer will send you a refund, or an application for a refund.

Without exemptions, the real-estate tax bill on his owner-occupied small income property jumped nearly \$1,400 to a whopping \$27,628. The owner also noticed that more than half of the bill was allocated for the Chicago Board of Education.

#### How tax exemptions work

"The property-tax bill is determined by four factors: the assessment, the equalization factor, or 'multiplier,' the tax rate, and the exemptions," explained Griffin.

The Homeowner's exemption recently was increased to \$10,000 from \$7,000, and the Senior Exemption was hiked to \$8,000 from \$5,000. Those exemption amounts are deducted from the tax bill.

Also, more seniors can qualify for the Senior Freeze because the Illinois Legislature recently increased the maximum annual income to receive the freeze to less than \$65,000 from less than \$55,000.

Other exemptions are designated for: Persons with Disabilities, Veterans with Disabilities, Returning Veterans, Long-time Homeowners, Home Improvement, and Religious Institutions.

Predicting a hefty future property tax increase really centers on two wild cards—the tax rate and the state equalization factor, which can't be challenged by taxpayers.

The equalization factor, or "multiplier," is established each year for Cook County to bring property tax assessments in line with other parts of Illinois. The factor is determined by the Illinois Dept. of Revenue.

The 2023 tax rate in Chicago rose to 6.995% per \$100 of assessed valuation from 6.697% a year earlier. And, the 2023 state equalization factor, designed to make assessments uniform statewide, rose to 3.0163% per \$100 of assessed valuation from 2.9237% a year earlier.

The main engine that drives up property-tax bills is the amount of money spent by local government. For example, homeowners who read their 2023 tax bills will see the continued increased spending for schools and police, firefighter and teacher pensions.

Griffin advises that Property owners who think they are over-assessed should appeal now.

# Advocate CEO getting large pay raises

Ever since their merger in Dec. 2022, Advocate Health co-chief executive Eugene Woods has seen his pay increase dramatically. Advocate, while headquartered in Charlotte, NC, owns and operates Advocate Illinois Masonic Hospital in Lakeview.

Woods received a 23.9% jump in total compensation for 2023 to \$17.35 million. That included a 1.9% raise in base salary to \$3.8 million, as well as a 148% surge in incentive pay to \$7.2 million, according to reports in the Winston Salem Journal.

2023 represented Woods' first full year in the Advocate co-chief executive role following the merger of Atrium Health of Charlotte and Advocate Aurora of Chicago. Advocate has since become the nation's third-largest healthcare system with 68 hospitals and 155,000 employees in six states.

Woods is slated to become sole chief executive of Advocate later this month upon the retirement of co-chief executive Jim Skogsbegh.

At \$17.35 million, Woods ranked seventh overall in the Journal's 2023 executive compensation chart. His compensation was tops among all 54 executives included in the study.

Hospital management pay has become a hot-button issue in recent years, particularly as healthcare systems have cut or outsourced jobs in response to regulatory changes. Advocate justified the high pay, telling the Journal that as a nonprofit health system, "we don't have the luxury of providing stock options and other typical corporate perks."

And Woods' total compensation likely continues to rise, he could be ranked among the top-10 in the healthcare industry as soon as this year. Atrium has embraced Woods' compensation, saying it is justified given the complexity of managing a large hospital system. But critics of the current in-

dustry consolidation say hospital systems use their nonprofit status for tax advantages and public-relations purposes, while compensation committees have sought to justify corporate-level wages and benefits to top executives.

A 2021 study by Forbes Magazine found that these non-profit hospitals add billions of dollars annually to their bottom line, lavishly compensate their CEOs, and spend millions of dollars, which are generated by patient fees, lobbying government to defend the status quo. The magazine investigated the top 82 U.S. non-profit hospitals, quantifying government payments and financial assets, and specifically looked at large nonprofits organized as charities under IRS Section 501(c)3 with the mission of delivering affordable healthcare to their communities.

Many of the institutions are household names like Mayo Clinic in Rochester, MN; Cleveland

Clinic, in Cleveland, OH; and Partners HealthCare in Massachusetts. Collectively, \$297.5 million in cash compensation flowed to the top paid executive at each of the 82 hospitals in 2021. Forbes found payouts as high as \$10 million, \$18 million and even \$21.6 million per CEO or other top-paid employee.

Advocate Health is headquartered in Charlotte, while maintaining a strong presence in the

Chicago and Milwaukee areas. (Aurora Health was the largest Wisconsin-based health system until it merged with the Chicago-based Advocate in 2018. The group has since dropped the "Aurora" portion of their name.)

Executive compensation has continued to rise since that 2018 merger. The federal Form 990 for Advocate Aurora shows that in 2021 there were 16 staff members whose total compensation ranged from from \$1.34 million to \$7.7 million that year. All together the top 16 staff collected \$36.75 million.

In 2020 there were 15 top staff, whose compensation ranged from \$1.34 million to \$6.8 million, and together collected a total of \$33 million.

System wide, they serve nearly 6-million patients annually and they are currently the fifth-largest nonprofit integrated health system in the nation, with revenues of more than \$27 billion.

## Carjacking, robbery spree

Chicago police are warning residents about a rash of carjacking armed robberies in Jefferson Park, Albany Park, Lakeview and Ravenswood.

In each of these incidents, three to five male Black male offenders pull up in a vehicle wearing dark colored clothing and black ski masks, then exit a vehicle and approach the victims while brandishing handguns/long guns and demand the victim's property and their vehicle.

After taking the victim's property and forcefully removing them from their vehicle, some of the masked offenders return to their vehicle while the other offenders enter the victim's vehicle and flee.

The vehicles taken in the hijackings were used in the subsequent criminal incidents. In one of these incidents, an offender pistol whipped the victim during the course of the robbery and in another, the victim was battered.

Incidents include one on the 2800 block of W. Berteau Ave. on June 29, at 1:26 a.m.; 3100 block of W. Sunnyside Ave. on June 29, 1:30 a.m.; 3700 block of N. Clark St. on June 29, at 2:45 a.m.; 4600 block of N. Rockwell St. on June 30, at 3:15 a.m.; 5100 block of W. Dakin St. on June 30, at 4:34 a.m., and on the 5200 block of W. Fullerton Ave. on June 30, 4:45 a.m.

## 12-time convicted burglar broke into Edgewater apartment while on pretrial release for two Ravenswood burglaries

Officials say Sherwin Degraffenreid has been convicted of burglary 12 times during his 65 years on planet Earth. Now, they say he committed yet another burglary while on pretrial release for two additional burglary cases.

Last August, prosecutors said Degraffenreid broke into a photography studio in the 4000 block of N. Ravenswood and stole seven cameras and a tablet worth \$6,100.

While Chicago cops were processing him and his belongings at the station, they found three Macbooks and other items belonging to another tenant in the same building,

according to a CPD report.

Degraffenreid, who is still awaiting trial in those cases, is now facing accusations of burglarizing an Edgewater woman's apartment. The woman, 21, saw a man leaving her apartment in the 6300 block of N. Lakewood around 2:20 p.m. May 16, according to police.

The report said that when presented with a photo lineup, the woman identified Degraffenreid as the burglar. Last month, investigators caught up with Degraffenreid while he was driving in the 1100 block of S. California. They said they found a bag of burglary tools in his car, including screwdrivers and gloves.

He is currently being detained on a fresh robbery charge to accompany the pending cases from last August. Judge David Kelly pointed to his 12 previous felony convictions as one reason Degraffenreid should remain in jail.

## Uptown man opened fire on a busy street corner while on an ankle monitor for another gun case

On July 3, prosecutors said that a man on electronic monitoring for a felony gun case opened fire on a car near a busy Uptown intersection last month.

No injuries were reported in the shooting, which was caught on video.

Judge Caroline Glennon-Goodman detained Donald Williams, 27, as a safety risk and a flight risk during that court hearing.

Surveillance videos showed Williams, also known as "TFG Don Don," walking near Argyle and Kenmore shortly before the shooting at 9:58 a.m. June 23, a Chicago police report said.

Williams was seen holding a gun in the video and "recklessly firing" the weapon at a black Nissan parked in the 4900 block of N. Kenmore, according to the report. Police said the vehicle was occupied, but they did not know who was inside. Investigators found 10 shell casings at the scene.

The report said additional video footage showed Williams running from the scene and entering a residential complex connected to the building where he lives.

CPD detectives contacted the Cook County Sheriff's Office electronic monitoring division to get the location history from Williams' ankle monitor. According to police, the data showed Williams was at the shooting scene at the time of the shooting. It also showed that his ankle monitor followed the path the gunman took after the shooting, the report said.

Chicago cops joined sheriff's deputies to arrest Williams on July 2. He is charged with unlawful use of a weapon by a felon and aggravated discharge of a firearm toward an occupied vehicle.

He is the 17th person accused of shooting, killing, or trying to shoot or kill someone in Chicago this year while on pretrial release.

Williams was on electronic monitoring for a gun case that originated with a traffic stop early on Dec. 7,

2021. He was the front seat passenger of a vehicle that an Illinois State Police trooper stopped for traffic violations, according to court records.

After he stepped out of the vehicle, officers found a loaded firearm on the seat where he had been sitting, police said. The cops said they found a second loaded firearm in the center console, along with a large amount of cash and marijuana. Williams' attorney has been fighting the case on Fourth amendment grounds.

## Gunmen rob two women in North Center

Two 23-year-old women were robbed at gunpoint, one suffering a head injury, in North Center on June 30.

They were near the corner of Cullom and Damen when two men pulled up around 3:10 a.m., according to a witness. Both men got out and robbed the women, taking a purse, phones, and keys.

A witness heard two gunshots during the robbery, but police did not find any shell casings at the scene. One of the women fell during the robbery and was treated for a head injury. She either received the injury when she fell or was grazed by a bullet, according to an officer who was on the scene.

Police found property belonging to the second victim in a bike lane in the 4500 block of N. Lincoln a couple of hours after the holdup.

CPD searched the area for the robbers but came up empty-handed. Officers were told the suspects were Black men in their late 20s, with one being thin, about 5'-10" tall, and having a goatee.

## Migrant bit Chicago cop twice during arrest, while on pretrial release for biting another cop

A Venezuelan migrant bit a Chicago police officer twice as cops tried to arrest him in the Loop on June 24, officials say. Yonaiker De Jesus Arevalo Ortiz was already on felony pretrial release for allegedly biting another cop who arrested him less than three weeks earlier.

Video of the latest arrest quickly went viral, showing Arevalo Ortiz yelling at bystanders and bracing his foot against the patrol car doorframe. The footage shows him fighting with officers as they try to get him into the back of the squad outside the Standard Club shelter, 330 S. Plymouth, around 6 p.m. June 24.

A crowd gathered around the officers and tensions grew. The cops declared a "10-1" police emergency for backup, and one officer held off the crowd by wielding his Taser.

According to the CPD report, the officers stopped Arevalo Ortiz because they were told that he was wanted for criminal damage to property at the Univ. of Illinois at Chicago.

Arevalo Ortiz immediately tried to break away from the officers and bit one of the cops on the wrist as they escorted him to the squad car, the report said. As the struggle continued near the squad, Arevalo Ortiz bit the same officer on the forehead, according to the report.

Backup officers responding to emergency calls for help eventually stuffed Arevalo Ortiz into a larger prisoner transport vehicle and hauled him off to jail.

Aggravated battery of a peace officer is not a detainable offense in Illinois unless the officer suffers "great bodily harm" or there are other factors

involved. So, prosecutors and Judge David Kelly didn't have an option to keep him in custody on the charges filed against him.

However, Kelly was able to detain Arevalo Ortiz for violating pretrial release on another aggravated battery of a peace officer case.

In that incident, two women told police that Arevalo Ortiz threatened them in the 300 block of S. Wabash on June 8.

"I will come back with my guys and we have guns," he allegedly told the women, ages 26 and 22.

The CPD officers drove around the neighborhood with the women, and they spotted Ortiz about a block away.

Arevalo Ortiz allegedly pulled away from officers who tried to detain him. He punched one officer in the mouth and bit the cop's hand, according to a CPD report. A second officer was also injured during the struggle.

He was charged with two counts of aggravated battery of a peace officer, two counts of assault, two counts of resisting, and obstruction of identification. None of those charges are detainable in Illinois.

Arevalo Ortiz remains in the county jail for violating pretrial release.

## 21-time convicted felon shoplifted at Macy's, prosecutors charge him with another felony

Prosecutors say a 21-time convicted felon was caught shoplifting at the Macy's on State St. last week, putting him in line for another possible felony conviction.

Raneae Tart, 68, of Lakeview, slipped a \$140 bottle of cologne into a black bag and headed out toward State Street around 4 p.m. June 28, according to a Chicago police report. Store security guards stopped him at the doors.

In court the next day, Assistant State's Attorney Jake Mallory reported that Tart had been convicted of 21 felonies in his lifetime. We found 14 of them in Cook County court records.

In addition to convictions for aggravated robbery and sexual abuse of a victim younger than 13 in 2001, Tart was convicted of theft-related felonies in 1992, 1996, 1997, 1998, 2007, 2009, 2011, 2013, 2015, and twice in 2019, the court records show.

The felony convictions, along with about 100 misdemeanor cases having a variety of outcomes, are listed under a host of names, including Ronee Tart, Roanee Tart, Ron Tart, Ron Arts, Ron Tarty, Ronald Tarp, Ron Tatt, Ron Tani, Ron Tate, Run Tate, Raneae Tate, Ron Cox, Rance Tart, Ronna Tart, Raymond Tart, Anthony Tart, Anthony Arts, Anthony Raneae, Ronee Arts, Ron Williams, Ronna Williams, Ronae Williams, Ronel Washington, Rodney Jackson, and Leonard Green.

Tart, now charged with felony retail theft in connection with the Macy's allegations, was released from custody by Judge Shauna Boliker.

## Sunglass Hut robber got away with merchandise worth \$13,750

A nine-time convicted felon, on parole for robbing an AT&T store, is accused of taking merchandise worth more than \$13,000 during the robbery of a Sunglass Hut in the Loop. Brian Willis, 35, is also accused of stealing nearly \$2,000 worth of liquor from a Walgreens in Streeterville.

Willis received a four-year sentence for the Nov. 2019 robbery at the AT&T store, 1819 West Division, records show. He has been on parole since Dec. 2022.

On May 11, prosecutors say, Willis and two other people stole liquor worth \$1,909 from Walgreens, 342 E. Illinois. Chicago police officers saw Willis in the area and thought he matched one of the suspect descriptions, so they tried to stop him.

Officials said he ran, tossing bottles of liquor along the way. The cops found him hiding inside a van in a parking garage. Also in the van was apparently stolen merchandise with price tags attached, including Sox, Cubs, and Bears jerseys and two pairs of sunglasses.

The following day, Judge Charles Beach released him from custody with a nighttime curfew on charges of felony retail theft and misdemeanor theft of lost or mislaid property.

However, those sunglasses in the van may have helped police link him to another case—the robbery of Sunglass Hut at Block 37 on April 22.

In that case, two men stuffed \$13,750 worth of merchandise into bags and threatened to kill the store manager if she got too close, according to prosecutors.

Working on a hunch, detectives included Willis' picture in a photo lineup and asked the store manager if she recognized any of the men. She identified Willis as one of the robbers, according to the police. Investigators arrested Willis last week when he showed up for a court hearing in the Walgreens case.

Prosecutors charged him with robbery in the Sunglass Hut case. Judge Shauna Boliker detained him at the state's request.

Other than his 2019 robbery, Illinois Dept. of Corrections records show Willis received prison time for injuring police while resisting arrest and driving on a revoked license in 2019; aggravated battery of a merchant in 2016; retail theft in 2014, 2010, 2009, and 2008; and aggravated DUI in 2010.

## Knife attack leaves man injured on Red Line

A man was attacked by a knife-wielding assailant on a CTA Red Line train in Rogers Park July 1, police said. It happened just before 11 p.m. near the Loyola station, 1200 W. Loyola.

CPD said a 36-year-old man was riding the train when the assailant approached him with a knife and attacked him for no apparent reason.

The victim suffered cuts to his right cheek and nose. Police said he was in good condition at St. Francis Hospital.

Officials did not release a description of the attacker.

## Gunman shoots man outside migrant shelter near the Salt Shed

A man is recovering after being shot July 1 outside the migrant shelter across from the Salt Shed.

Police said the 28-year-old was on the sidewalk in the 1300 block of N. Elston when the gunman pulled up in a vehicle around 6:35 p.m. One bullet struck the victim in the abdomen. He got into a car and went to a hospital before the police arrived. He is in good condition, according to CPD.

Witnesses said the gunman, wearing gloves and a mask, fired shots from a light blue, older-model car near the shelter parking lot.

Police did not say if the victim was a migrant, but an officer who responded to the scene said it was a possibility.

The shooting occurred almost exactly a week after a migrant was attacked, robbed, and carjacked by up to 10 other migrants outside the shelter. That victim refused to pursue felony charges against the attackers.

Police said the offenders threatened the 37-year-old man and another man who was with him before leaving the scene around 10 p.m. June 24. Some of the offenders took the older victim's silver 2008 Ford Focus.

**Most arrests at any one-day event since at least 2013: 53 arrested during Pride Parade afterparty**

Police recovered four guns and arrested 53 people, including nine juveniles, in the hours after the June 30 Chicago Pride Parade, officials said. That total is the most arrests at a one-day event in Chicago since this reporter began keeping records in 2013.

Ald. Bennett Lawson [44th] issued a statement July 1 saying he was pleased with the parade itself, but "extremely disappointed to see partying and disruptive actions in our neighborhood into the early morning hours."

Two of the guns police recovered were carried by one man, according to prosecutors. Chicory Williams, 18, was in the 3100 block of N. Clark around 7:45 p.m. when CPD officers saw him holding an L-shaped object in his front waistband, according to his arrest report.

The report said that an officer who grabbed Williams' backpack to keep him from running away immediately felt another hard L-shaped object inside the bag.

Officers recovered a loaded 40-caliber handgun with an extended magazine from the backpack, and a loaded 9-mm handgun fell from his waistband as police detained him, officials said. Prosecutors also charged him with possessing about 20 grams of cannabis.

Judge Carline Glennon-Goodman detained Williams as a safety risk on July 1.

Authorities claim they found another gun on a man with a history of felony convictions, including violent crimes. Cops were "attempting to disperse a large crowd smoking suspect cannabis and drinking suspect alcohol on the public way" in the 3300 block of N. Clark when they saw a heavy L-shaped object in Marvin Thompson's satchel, a CPD report said.

Thompson, 28, tried to run and struggled mightily with officers, who

punched him in the face several times to get him under control, according to his arrest report. The officers said he tried to pass the bag off to another person while they were arresting him, but they managed to recover the weapon, a 45-caliber handgun.

Thomson is charged with Class X felony armed habitual criminal, aggravated unlawful use of a weapon by a felon, and misdemeanor resisting. Judge Glennon-Goodman detained him, too.

Mario Gill, 26, of Hazel Crest, was arrested in the 3200 block of N. Clark shortly before 6 p.m. after police allegedly saw the butt of a handgun sticking out of his satchel. Officers recovered a loaded 9-mm handgun from the bag, according to Gill's arrest report. He has a license to own guns but is not authorized to carry concealed weapons, the report said. Judge Susana Ortiz released him from custody on July 1.

The CPD reported that they also charged a 15-year-old boy with possessing a firearm during the post-parade revelry. That would bring the total number of guns recovered to five.

Among other felony arrests: Selena Seawood, 20, is accused of attacking Yolanda Talley, the chief of CPD's Bureau of Internal Affairs, in the 1000 block of W. School early July 1.

According to a CPD arrest report, Talley flagged down other officers and reported that Seawood became irate when told to put down a beverage she was drinking on the street. She walked toward Talley "in a threatening manner," grabbed the chief's hair, and "attempted to drag her to the ground," the report said.

She is charged with two counts of aggravated battery of a peace officer. Talley reportedly suffered a "small laceration on her right middle finger." Judge Ortiz released Seawood on Monday afternoon.

Chyna Stevenson, 23, is charged with aggravated battery of a peace officer for allegedly throwing a bottle of Espolòn Tequila in the 3300 block of N. Halsted, striking a police officer in the face. Judge Ortiz released her with a nighttime curfew.

Robin Hill, 20, yelled at cops and pushed metal barricades into the street at Halsted and Roscoe around 9:07 p.m., police said. When an officer moved the barricades back, Hill "reared her head back gathering sa-

liva and spat in the direction" of the cop. Her spit allegedly landed on his arm.

Jarvis Rice, 32, ignored police orders to stop obstructing traffic with his Lime scooter in the 3100 block of N. Sheffield around 8 p.m., a CPD report said. The cops warned him to leave, especially since he had a bottle of Hennessy sticking out of his back pocket, according to the report. But he didn't, so the cops arrested him.

According to his arrest report, cops found 23 sealed packs of Newport cigarettes, five open packs of Newport cigarettes, 31 baggies of pot, and an expandable baton. He's charged with unlawful use of a weapon by a felon and manufacture-delivery of cannabis. He was released from custody by Judge Ortiz.

**Woman accused of shooting at two in River North was accused of a similar crime in January, but prosecutors rejected felony charges**

A woman accused of shooting a gun at two people after an argument on a River North street corner last week was arrested under very similar circumstances earlier this year, but prosecutors refused to charge her with a felony back then. She wasn't so fortunate this time.

Amira Wilson, who has worked as an outsourced janitor at the Chicago Police Department's Deering 9th District station, was detained this week by Judge Caroline Glennon-Goodman.

Back in January, a 31-year-old woman told police that she got into an argument with Wilson while waiting for an Uber outside Shark's Fish and Chicken, 2640 E. 75th St. The woman, who was with her 13-year-old daughter, said she knew Wilson because Wilson was dating her ex-boyfriend, a CPD report said.

According to the report, the woman said the argument escalated until Wilson pulled out a gun and fired shots toward her and her daughter. No injuries were reported.

Police arrested Wilson, 36, on April

**Lakeview 'psychic' swindled woman out of \$72,000 by promising to remove a curse**

A woman now living in Phoenix has been charged with felony theft, accused of swindling a client out of \$72,000 through a fortune-telling scam operated from storefronts near Boystown. Perhaps, as the old joke goes, she should have seen it coming.

Jennifer Williams, 50, has pleaded not guilty in the case.

Prosecutors say Williams, working as an "alleged psychic fortune teller," tricked a 21-year-old Edgewater woman into believing that she was under a curse. Williams convinced the

woman to remove the curse by giving Williams large sums of cash that Williams was supposed to "cleanse and return to the victim," according to court filings.

The woman gave Williams a total of \$72,200 for "cleansing," but Williams never gave it back, according to the allegations.

Prosecutors listed two addresses where the scam allegedly occurred, one in the 3000 block of N. Broadway and the other in the 3100 block of N. Broadway. Both storefronts have long featured neon signs promoting psychic services.

3, but prosecutors refused to approve felony charges due to a "lack of corroborating evidence," the CPD report said. So, Wilson was only charged with two counts of misdemeanor assault. Records show that the prosecutor dropped the entire case in May after the victim failed to show up in court. Just six weeks after prosecutors spiked the case, cops arrested Wilson again for allegedly firing shots at two people in River North on July 1. Once again, no injuries were reported.

A Moody Bible Institute Dept. of Public Safety officer called out shots fired upon hearing gunfire near LaSalle and Chicago Ave. shortly after 1 a.m., according to a newly filed CPD report. The officers began searching the area.

Meanwhile, a concealed carry license holder told police that he saw Wilson pull out a gun and fire toward two women she had been arguing with in a nearby crosswalk. The concealed carry holder pulled out his own gun and followed Wilson into an alley, the report said.

The Moody Bible officer intercepted them in the 700 block of N. Clark. According to the report, Wilson immediately threw her hands into the air to surrender when she saw the

Moody Bible officer.

The Moody officer detained Wilson until CPD officers arrived. Police recovered at least one shell casing and learned that a city surveillance camera recorded portions of the incident.

This time, prosecutors approved two felony charges against Wilson: endangering others by recklessly discharging a firearm and unlawful use of a weapon.

I engaged my buddies on the staff there to hear some of their stories of their recent night at the Lyric Opera House when the awards were given. There was a definite buzz at dinner along Kedzie Blvd. So many helpers identified menus favorites.

Of course, as a frequent patron, I had to order the Focaccia that comes baked right from the oven covered in an avalanche of roasted onions and garden herbs. I was still eating that when six stunning Mussels in a cold aioli citrus sauce, tiny garden peas and some crunchy pea pods arrived. This dish was serious. Unlike anything

I'd ever eaten. No wonder Lula's was Chicago only James Beard awardee this year.

After all, these highly flavor-filled early courses, my roasted Bronzino arrives. A generous side of the luxurious fish, served on a bed of lightly creamed cabbage. Whole roasted small onions and assorted vegetables with the fish's crunchy skin painted with a deeply rich herbal basting sauce. The platter was generous, adventurous, understated, proud of its pedigree nonchalance. It was a five-star plate quietly taken for granted. Expected even.

Quickly Lula Cafe's menu becomes the subject of much conversational food talk. There was nothing left for me but to order the Pecorino Cake, rich, creamy, filled with flirtatious flavor. Total sophistication. Replete with some succulent tart cherries and a green aioli ice cream. A true challenge to the taste buds, the aged Pecorino Romano stole the show.

So my advice is to get to Lula's and study the menu. Ask a fellow foodie what they're eating. And know few other Chicago restaurants could produce such poetic food so well shaped and created amid the quiet gentleness of owner/Chef **Jason Hammel**.

## Unearthing the mysteries of the Green Mill Lounge

The Edgewater Historical Society is hosting a presentation unearthing the mysteries of the Green Mill Lounge 1 p.m. Saturday, July 13, at the Edgewater Branch, Chicago Public Library Betty A. Barclay Community Room 6000 N. Broadway.

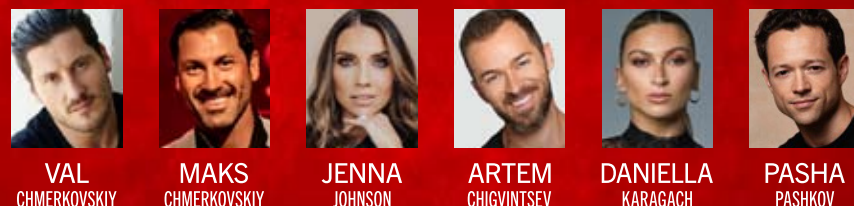
Robert Loerzel will lead the discussion. He has been delving deeply into the early years of the Green Mill – and related things, like the development of the Uptown neighborhood – in a history posted on his website, [robertloerzel.com](http://robertloerzel.com).

Located at 4802 N. Broadway, the spot originated as Pop Morse’s Roadhouse in 1907, a bar and beer garden catering to mourners spilling from the nearby Grace-land and Saint Boniface cemeteries. In 1910, the establishment became the Green Mill Gardens under the ownership of real estate developer Tom Chamales, who wanted to allude to Paris’s Moulin Rouge (Red Mill) but avoid association with a nearby red light district.

The bar’s green and gold flashing neon sign on the facade is one of the most recognized storefront signs on the North Side. For over a century the bar was a safe space for gangsters, neighbors, tourists and infamous musicians, including partial owner Al Capone. There are tunnels that run below the establishment that were used to smuggle alcohol and Chicago Mob Outfit members in and out of the bar during the Prohibition period.

In the 1960s, after changing hands several times, the Green Mill became a part of the down-and-out, bedraggled Uptown neighborhood. unique art.

The proposed grocery store is described as being 1,655 square feet which are approximately the dimensions of 40.7 feet by 40.7 feet. It's unknown if the proposed grocery store with alcohol would control the entire the first floor of only the former art studio at 5305-09 N. Berwyn.

The attorney listed on the Public Notice, Daniel Egan, was contacted and confirmed the address for the commercial development was at 5305-09 N. Berwyn Ave. Egan stated the project development team for developer Building #1 Property Management, LLC would be in contact.

As far back as Feb. 9, Rob Braga, president of Building #1 Realty Services, spoke at length with the board of Edgewater Chamber of Commerce [ECC] about development plans at his building.

In the Feb. 16 letter from the ECC to Ald. Manaa-Hoppenworth, the board of directors voted in support "of 1068 W. Berwyn's application to acquire a packaged goods license for a new corner market and convenience at their property, to allow

for the sale of beer and wine."

The letter, furnished by executive director Garrett Karp, went on to say, "Our organization believes an independent convenience store at this location, as well as improvements to the building facade, residential units, and exterior lighting, are all incredibly positive developments for the surrounding neighborhood."

However, the board specifically noted that due to the property's close proximity to Cedar Playlot Park and to two large grocery stores (Jewel and Mariano's) - both with extensive hard liquor inventories - and long-term efforts to limit problematic late-night hard liquor sales in the neighborhood, that they would only support proposed beer and wine sales and not hard

liquor sales at that location.

The reference to problems in the immediate area stem from delinquents in the area who were confronted by then Ald. Harry Osterman, business owner Ollie Latiker, neighbors and police who were largely successful in cleaning up the area. The honorary street sign at Berwyn and Winthrop still says "Ms. Ollie's Way."

ing executive orders to get around passing legislation through Congress."

Out of curiosity, we've been keeping an eye out for felony cases that would apparently not be filed if Foxx's plan goes through. Here are a few:

- Cops pulled an Uber driver over in the 200 block of W. 71st St. around 4 p.m. June 19 because the backseat passengers weren't wearing seatbelts, a CPD report said. One of those passengers, Keith Whitaker, 19, had a loaded handgun with a 50-round ammunition magazine attached inside a backpack, prosecutors said. Why did he have the gun? According to the state's detention petition, Whitaker told the police he "intended to use the firearm to scare some individuals with whom he and his family had been having trouble." Judge Susana Ortiz denied the detention petition and released Whitaker on an ankle monitor.

- Aaron Collins, 32, was on bail for a pending murder case when Chicago cops pulled him over for not having a front license plate on his car on June 25, officials said. During a narcotics search of the vehicle, police officers allegedly found a loaded handgun under the driver's seat cushion where Collins was seated. Judge Ankur Srivastava detained him as a safety risk, noting that he is awaiting trial on charges

of murder, home invasion with a firearm, and attempted robbery in connection with a 2016 case out of Dolton.

- CPD officers stopped Timmie Palmer, 40, in the 6800 block of S. Ada July 3 for allegedly having an expired registration. By the time the traffic stop was over, Palmer was facing much more serious charges. The police said they found a loaded handgun under his steering wheel. Palmer is on pretrial release for two gun cases, including one in which he is accused of shooting someone, prosecutors said. Judge Mary Marubio detained him for posing a safety risk and for violating pretrial release conditions.

- Police pulled over Byron Roberson, 24, near Ida B. Wells and State St. in the Loop on June 24 for not wearing a seatbelt, a CPD report said. Roberson became irate during the stop and struck an open squad car door with his knee, causing the door to injure an officer's hand, according to the report. During an inventory search of Roberson's trunk, police allegedly found a box containing an unloaded Glock handgun, a Smith & Wesson handgun, firearm magazines of various calibers, a 3D printer, a 3D-printed firearm lower frame, two 3D-printed rifle upper receivers, tools, and mail addressed to Roberson. Judge David Kelly released him to await trial.

on the upper floors, while the first floor was zoned for commercial use, which was maintained until recently. Sadly, the ground-floor storefronts in the building have sat vacant for years.

Now those former commercial storefronts will become 17 new residential units, situated around a new central courtyard, with no parking available for any of the tenants of the 69 unit building.

That new courtyard was once where Maybelline vendor trucks parked to bring in raw materials, and where other trucks parked to load up to take cosmetic products out into the marketplace.

The six first floor units facing Clark St. will now be fenced off from the street and sidewalk. A sole 3,000 square-foot retail space will remain at the corner of the building for current tenant B&W Gym who will receive a new marquee entrance and awning.

The Clark and Ridge intersection is now mostly a pass-through area where few people stop to shop. Most people who are passing through the area are headed to points further west and north. So the trouble filling the retail space at The Mabel is certainly not due exclusively to its lack of parking, but it sure didn't help.

Commercial parking that turns over quickly is a critical infrastructure need for most all commercial districts and enterprises. Today Clark St. - and several other

Chicago commercial corridors - are suffering from the intentional loss of commercial street parking in favor of privileged bike paths, and it's hurting many small independent retailers.

**Edgewater's Mabel Williams**

In 1968 Maybelline left Chicago moving to Memphis, then to Little Rock, AR, until its acquisition by L'Oréal in 1996. Its headquarters was then moved to New York City in 1996 and its factory to Brooklyn in 2000. In 1990, Schering-Plough sold Maybelline to a New York investment firm, Wasserstein Perella & Co.
