## Privileged bike lanes coming to Clark St.

Clark St. from Irving Park Rd. north to W. Montrose will be resurfaced this fall, and it looks like the city plans to extend the privileged bike lanes into this area as well. Construction is tentatively scheduled to begin on Oct. 20, pending clearance from and coordination with existing utilities and weather.

The work will include ADA sidewalk improvements, curb and gutter removal and replacement

as needed for ADA and drainage compliance, pavement patching, milling and paving the existing asphalt pavement, and the protected bike lanes.

The city's Clark St. Crossroads plan has proposed removing half the commercial street parking on Clark St. to install privileged concrete bike lanes as far north at Foster Ave. The privileged bike lanes have already been installed on Clark St. north of Catalpa St.

## Man charged with Edgewater battery

W. Thorndale. He was identified as the offender who, less than 30 minutes earlier, took merchandise from a retail business in the 6000 block of N. Broadway. The offender then battered a 49-year-old male with a cane before producing a sharp object and striking a 47-year-old female, causing a laceration to her forearm. The offender was placed into custody and charged accordingly.

## Man shot in Uptown, neighborhood's seventh shooting victim this month

A 38-year-old man is recovering after someone shot him in Uptown on Oct. 13 according to Chicago police.

He was standing near the sidewalk in the 4400 block of N. Sheridan when someone opened fire at 8:06 p.m. Cops found him in the Dollar Tree store parking lot with gunshot wounds to both legs. Five shell casings were seen in the street.

Police said he is in good condition at Advocate Illinois Masonic Medical Center.

The victim is the seventh person shot in Uptown this month.

On Oct. 7, four people were wounded by two men who opened fire on a group of people at Winthrop and Argyle around 12:35

p.m., according to police. The same gunmen are believed to have shot at, but missed, a teenager in the 900 block of W. Wilson just a few minutes earlier.

In both incidents, the suspects were described as Black men wearing black and yellow hoodies who traveled in a Toyota RAV4.

On Oct. 2, a 15-year-old boy and a 44-year-old man were shot in the 1000 block of W. Argyle. Police said the gunman emerged from an alley and began shooting around 11:12 a.m.

Nineteen people have been shot in Uptown this year, up from 15 at this point in 2022. There were 16 by this date in 2021 and 13 in 2020.

Chicago police officers were

## Benedictine Sisters of Chicago announce plans to sell entire 14-acre campus in West Ridge

For 118 years, a Roman Catholic religious order, the Benedictine Sisters of Chicago, has called the West Ridge neighborhood home. But on the morning of Oct. 9, its Prioress, Sr. Mary Susan Remsgar, sent out an email to supporters in which she announced her order is planning to sell its entire 14-acre campus, which includes the Cruz campus of Acero Charter schools, 7416 N. Ridge Blvd.

“Our consultants are preparing an offering memorandum for the entire property, and we expect to put it out to the market this fall. It is our deepest desire to identify a responsible buyer/developer who will be a good steward of

the property that has been such a gift to us, our oblates, students, friends, and neighbors,” wrote Remsgar.

Since 1906, the nuns have resided at their West Ridge Monastery at 7430 N. Ridge Blvd. and for more than a 100 years, they operated St. Scholastica Academy, an all-girls school whose alumni included the late Jane Byrne, Chicago's mayor from 1979 to 1983, and former Illinois First Lady Patti Blagojevich.

At the time of its closure, St. Scholastica Academy had an enrollment of 147 students. Decades earlier, it had been more than a 1,000 students.

The monastery campus holds carefully-manicured grounds,

that included a grape arbor, formal gardens and a labyrinth. The monastery's chapel includes murals painted in the Beuronese-style in 1938 by Josef Steinhage, a German-born artist hired by the Benedictine Sisters of Chicago.

The artist had studied at the Maria Laach Abbey in Germany's Rhineland-Palatinate and had been brought over by the order to specifically work on its chapel.

Beuronese-style murals have an almost-photographic quality. Steinhage's murals were refurbished in the 1990s by Joseph Ramirez and Sean Culver.

Interestingly, the paints Steinhage had used were still at St.

## Native lawn test plots in Uptown now open to public

*Year-long project restored elements of historic 1930s landscape plan to the lakefront park*

The Chicago Park District announces the opening of the new Uptown Coastal Natural Area that features a selection of biodiverse native lawn alternatives being tested for use across the Park District.

The site is located just west of Lake Shore Dr. at about 4600 north, between Lawrence Ave. and Wilson Dr. This new natural habitat is also part of a native lawn study happening at a handful of parks that may help support a climate-resiliency.

The six-acre restoration project transformed the former turf lawn into a thriving space for people and wildlife. The project called for the replanting of Illinois native prairie and savanna wildflowers, grasses, and shrubs.

The project reintroduced elements of the original 1930s design by renowned landscape architect Alfred Caldwell, which called for a “naturalistic effect” that relied on native trees, shrubs, and flowers in a layered and informally arranged manner.

The northern section of the park contains a selection of bio-

diverse native lawn alternatives being tested for use across the city. These test plots compare different species of native grass-like plants and methods of installation to analyze how well they establish. Signage in the natural area educates visitors on these options and how they could explore them in their own homes.

“Our parks contribute greatly

to our city's sustainability, health and wellness, and the vibrancy of neighborhoods,” said CPD CEO Rosa Escareño. “This new natural area brings our total to 134 across the city, and adds to the number of native plantings that help reduce stormwater runoff, improve air quality and mitigate

# Art museums have become experts at obfuscating the truth

In case you don't read the Portland, OR daily newspapers, I thought I'd provide you with a sample of their current craziness.

It's remarkable from a cultural and political standpoint. Portland is one of those American cities that snobbish Chicagoans tend to disregard.

Tucked way in the far upper-left-hand corner of our national map, too far from San Francisco to catch our attention.

Too trendy. Too left-of-center. Too politically correct. Too wacky, as you can imagine, like whistling in church.

Too hipster, too much weed. The land of vegan voters and timeless protesters.

I recall conservative columnist George Will disparaging progressive Portland as out of touch with the rest of the country.

Perhaps this all has its roots in the relative remoteness of the state. Oregon had just a small population of 4.2 million village folk back in 2021.

And just when you thought things could not find more comic entente or ludicrous inanity, the Portland Art Museum [PAM] announced a radical shakeup in the middle of the night.

That's right. All 175 docents were fired by e-mail in the middle of the night.

Headlines have appeared attempting to widen discussion of the issues in this heinous treatment of "valued volunteers." But to no avail. The headlines say it all. The glaring complexity of the emotions equals the politics involved.

"The Portland Art Museum Ditches Its Docents, Raising Questions About Race, Class and Especially Age."

Sound familiar? Race, class and age? What's an old Wellesley girl to do?

In an artless move, at the Art Institute of Chicago [AIC], the sadly educated protagonists of fatalist Woke philosophy in Portland, OR, America's oatmeal city, demonstrated their skill at surprise attack and seizure when the sun goes down.

But of course, as we have seen before in several other national museums holding prominent artistic treasures, when the institution "lets the dogs loose," as it were, there is no rational or cultural pedagogy that really embraces the radical decision to toss out the docents.

Museum Directors are forced to engage the reality of their actions within the context of their need for more stable safety for museum holdings.

Of course they appeal to their Trustees. You know, the descendants of people who invented glue, soap, the automobile and the shoe-lace. Their fortunes still keep the lights on. Also the people who hated Picasso, tolerated Dali, and sang the praises of Pierre Bonnard.

In Chicago you'd like to believe the heirs of the meat-packers were made of sterner stuff.

The AIC sent shockwaves across the Windy City when they dismissed its docents and replaced them with what was believed to be a fleet of younger, more diverse "paid educators" in Fall 2021. But at no time did the museum attempt to deflect criticism with the truth behind their actions. The AIC might have once enjoyed a "freedom of the realm" with regard to issues of safety and security for their collection. But these gals were just too white.

But consensus on the street rejected how the secret actions of the institution were viewed by other institutions. Universities and colleges could smell the stench of the wokists at the Univ. of Chicago coming for them. And they knew what was to follow. Better to cut everyone off at the pass.

And all that abruptness and lack

The AIC appears to be dropping back to its role in 1893 when it was a provincial museum of limited abilities. Back then it was supposed to show the rest of the country successful Chicagoans purchase paintings. I, for one, feel the flatfoot of MOMA just about to squash the aesthetic heirs of Bertha Palmer. Can't you feel woke folk lining up to attack Edward Kemeys' metal lions, "On the prowl!" and "Stands in an Attitude of Defiance," out on Michigan Ave.?

Now citing a need to diversify their force of volunteers, the Oakland Museum of California followed other museums and disbanded their volunteer corps in Dec. 2022. CO, where volunteer programs have been changed to student paid guides from local colleges.

But one thing is becoming artistically clear. Art museums have become experts at obfuscating the truth. It is a very emotional set of policy issues. Long-serving, well-educated volunteers of refinement and polished artistic educations are dispensable when evaluated against the misguided institutional philosophy of wokism. Often hiding behind the financial muscle and reheated outdated political liberalism of the past century.

Museums in general are counting on the good manners and the stately bearing of their former volunteers to maintain a sense of public decorum over their treatment by second rate museum personnel who believe that only in the bending over backwards can their policies of the past attract non-whites as visitors, volunteers in the future, members and endowers.

Sadly this misguided set of institutional policy endeavors is not woking. Not if billionaire, and former benefactor, Ken Griffin is any judge. Surely they know wiping out the assemblage of docents was long the practice on scenic walks over the waters of the Arno.

Only instead of lying about diversity, they'd just pick you up and drop you in from the upper reaches

of the Ponte Vecchio.

Perhaps AIC President James Rondeau could just start refining his wokist goals for famous splash-downs from the Michigan Ave. Bridge, and take out a few more Vassar grads and Brown alum from his Board of Trustees who are just too white but never learned how to swim. We could use the chairs for watching more TV at the front

desk. I think that's the next goal on the PAM list for a rainy day.

Could someone just call Shirley Ryan? Wobbly geography is nearer than we think.

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# Sometimes a mass shooting or two is not enough to close a nightclub in Chicago, will this one be different?

Television news crews wandered about the sidewalk Oct. 9 near Blüm, the River North nightclub that the local alderman blamed for a mass shooting that left eight people injured on the street Oct. 8. Orange stickers on the club's door and front window announced the "summary closure" of the business by Chicago Police Supt. Larry Snelling, who deemed the operation a public safety threat.

Whether that closure will become permanent remains to be seen. Businesses have the right to appeal summary closures, and the city has been reticent to force clubs to close down even after a mass shooting. Or two.

Ald. Brendan Reilly's [42nd] frustration with the commissioner of business affairs and the city's liquor commissioner boiled

over after the shooting. The alderman fired off a statement calling on city "bureaucrats" to "do their jobs, stop catering to these bad actors and start revoking liquor licenses."

The mass shooting was the second this year and the third since

Sept. 2021 that officials have said was linked to Blüm or its previous incarnation as Clutch Bar. Despite those allegations, the club continued to operate.

But Blüm wasn't singled out for

## State announces long list of new grant recipients

The state of Illinois on Oct. 6 let loose with \$156 million in Back to Business [B2B] grants to a who's who list of restaurants, hotels and artists. The list of recipients was long and chocked-full of North Side centric arts, hotel and restaurant awardees.

Through the state's B2B and Business Interruption Grant [BIG] Programs, Illinois Dept. of Commerce and Economic Opportunity [DCEO] has provided more than \$535 million to more than 15,000 businesses since the start of the pandemic.

Chances are, the average North Side resident will know many of the grant recipients.

Eligible restaurants, hotels and arts businesses were eligible to

apply for \$175 million in available grant funding as part of our efforts to support ongoing recovery from the government-imposed pandemic economic lockdowns. All applicants received a grant as long as they meet eligibility requirements, and properly filled out the paperwork.

The list of winners was extensive. A total of 3,951 businesses were provided grant awards, including 72 hotels, 996 restaurants, and 2,235 artists and arts groups. The lists are much too long to publish here. The art grant list is 34-pages long, the restaurant grant list is 15-pages long and the hotel list is 12-pages.

B2B Arts and B2B Restaurants grant award amounts were de-

termined based on a percentage of revenue declines, and funding for the B2B Hotels awards was allocated based on the number of rooms. Grants had an average award amount of \$39,484, with different ranges of funding available depending on the business type. The grant program utilized American Rescue Plan Act funding and was designed to offset losses and support job retention in the industries hard-hit by the pandemic lockdown.

In order to determine who was to get the money, DCEO enlisted a network of approximately 100 community navigators to conduct outreach and provide technical

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# Illinois Lottery virgin takes the \$1.765B plunge

In the movie “Raiders of the Lost Ark,” a greedy Indiana Jones snatched the solid-gold idol off of the pedestal in the cave. Then, all hell broke loose.

Indy, chased by a giant rolling 20-ton stone “power ball,” barely made it out of the cave to the jungle.

That’s the same greedy itch this “lotto virgin” felt last week while purchasing three Powerball tickets in the Illinois Lottery.

Unfortunately for me and millions of others, a player in California won the \$1.765 billion jackpot on Oct. 11. Winning numbers were: 22, 24, 40, 52, 64 and the Powerball 10. The victory ended a drought of 35 consecutive drawings without a big winner stretching back to July 19 when another player in California matched all six numbers and won \$1.08 billion. What are they smoking on the West Coast?

The biggest Powerball jackpot on record was worth \$2.04 billion and was won by a single ticket holder—of course, from California—on Nov. 7, 2022. The jackpot had rolled over for 40 straight drawings and the cash option was worth a whopping \$997 million.

Edwin Castro was revealed to be the \$2.04 billion winner when he recovered from shock and came forward three months after the drawing. The previous record

had been worth \$1.58 billion and was split between three ticket holders on Jan. 13, 2016.

There have been 405 Powerball winners nationwide since 2003. Here is a list by state of the number of winners: Indiana, 39; Missouri, 31; Minnesota, 22; Pennsylvania and Wisconsin, 19; Kentucky, and Louisiana, 18; Florida, 16; and California, 14. What about Illinois? Sorry. There were only two winners in two decades.

Like we needed another argument for moving to Indiana.

Powerball’s outrageous odds of 1 in 292.2 million are designed to generate a big jackpot, with prizes becoming ever larger as they repeatedly roll over when no one wins. In 45 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, and the U.S. Virgin Islands, a Powerball ticket costs \$2 and players can select their own numbers or leave that task to a computer.

Here are the options for the Powerball payout. The winner can take payment though an annuity, doled out over 30 years, or take the cash option, which last week was estimated as \$774.1 million. Half of that would go to Uncle Sam in federal income taxes.

With all those millions dancing in my head, I briefly held “lotto

court” in the ticket line on Oct. 9 at the BP service station at Peterson Ave. and Pulaski Rd. in the Sauganash neighborhood.

Why was I there? You could say that my Bohemian grandmother’s psychogypsy blood made me do it. This writer really sensed that the \$1.765 billion lotto jackpot was going to be won—last week. Why couldn’t my family be the lucky winners?

While managing a line of ticket buyers that snaked out of the door, the patient manager of the Northwest Side BP station literally had to explain to this rookie how the Powerball lottery works.

“You can multiply your non-jackpot winnings by adding an additional ‘Power Play,’ or ‘multiplier’ number, for an extra \$1 per game,” he said. So, the play amounted to \$2 for each ticket plus \$1 for the Power Play—three tickets cost \$9.

Sensing ticket-buying angst in the shop, this novice gambler apologized to the crowd, and announced: “I’m a lottery virgin!” Everyone laughed. A middle-aged Asian woman winked at me. One young man cracked up and walked out the door without his ticket. The BP manager chased after him. Non-gamblers just stood there bug-eyed waiting to pay for gasoline, soda pop and potato chips.

My clairvoyant wife and I have been talking about the billion-dollar lottery for weeks. Believe it or not, we both are “lottery virgins” despite our ages. I’m a

World War II baby, and the blond is a 1960s Baby Boomer.

My late father-in-law, Herbert L. Benson, Jr.—a self-made oil man and World War II veteran from South Carolina—may have been the thrichest man on the planet. My wife inherited that trait.

On the other hand, my cab-driver father, the late Chester Louis DeBat, picked the long-shot winner of the Kentucky Derby in 1921, won money, and never missed a chance to bet on a big thoroughbred-horse race at Arlington Park when he moved to Chicago.

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# Property tax bills will soon be due, are you getting all your exemptions?

If you own a home or other real estate in Cook County, chances are you will have a property tax bill due soon.

Property taxes in Illinois are billed in two installments yearly. For the 2022 tax year, First Installment bills were mailed at the beginning of March and were due April 3.

Second Installment bills are expected to be available Oct. 17 to be viewed, downloaded and paid at [cookcountytreasurer.com](http://cookcountytreasurer.com). The bills will be mailed on or about Nov. 1 and are due Dec. 1.

To pay online, visit the website and click on the blue "Pay Online for Free" box on the home page. Enter your address or Property Index Number (PIN) and follow the steps to pay electronically.

You can also pay your property

taxes at any Chase Bank location, at more than 100 community bank branches where you have an account or at the Treasurer's Office on the first floor of the County Building, 118 N. Clark St., Chicago.

Paying taxes on time saves money by avoiding interest charges on late, or delinquent, tax bills. For many years my office has accepted partial payments. Many homeowners struggle to come up with two lump sum payments every year. People with home loans typically avoid this by paying monthly installments toward their tax bills as part of their mortgage payments, called paying by escrow.

Those without mortgage escrows can make partial payments toward their tax bills at any time. Taxpayers who make partial payments can search their address or

The property tax system is complex and can be confusing.

Most property owners are entitled to tax breaks called exemptions. I talk to people all the time who tell me they didn't know about exemptions or that they had to apply for them.

The Homeowner Exemption is the most common. People who live in a home that is their primary residence qualify for this

tax break. Once they apply and receive the Homeowner Exemption, it automatically renews each year.

Another common tax break is the Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption. People qualify the year after they turn 65, since payments you make at a due date cover taxes billed for the previous calendar year.

Older taxpayers may also be entitled to the Low-Income Senior Citizens Assessment Freeze Exemption. Senior citizens whose total household income is \$65,000 a year or less qualify for this exemption, which requires an application every year.

## "Redefine The Drive" unveils revamped website for constituents

The N. Lake Shore Dr. [NLS] project team recently released their updated website, attempting to make their "Redefine the Drive" [RTD] initiatives more accessible for Chicago residents.

RTD is a study-based initiative that is being conducted by the Illinois and Chicago departments of Transportation. The study focuses on the stretch of NLS

between Grand and Hollywood avenues. Much of RTD's proposed developments aim to incorporate additional green space, improved traffic lanes/corridors, revetment walls, expanded beaches, and offshore breakwaters.

RTD uses "phase studies" to conduct research to make recommendations to communities on potential improvements to NLS, which was first developed in the 1930s. The lakefront is used by

100,000 vehicles, 69,000 CTA riders, and 31,000 trail users on an average weekend.

The new website was updated in recent weeks, to enhance the "user experience." The biggest improvements include a new navigation menu, including a search bar for users to search projects and information that the planners think is much more transparent. The new "blog system" allows users to see the timeline of proj-

ect plan links according to most recent neighborhood community meetings, designs, and study screenings.

"Study Spotlights" gives users another way to see project updates on NLS, including proposed alternatives that were considered or dismissed, as well as transportation modeling.

Ultimately, giving more data

**Cops seek two men who robbed group of women in Lakeview**

Chicago police detectives released surveillance images on Oct. 12 of two men suspected of robbing a group of women in Lakeview.

The women, all 23 years old, were in the 3400 block of N. Bosworth when two robbers approached them from behind at 9:28 p.m. on Sept. 29, police said.

After pushing the women to the ground, the robbers held the victims at gunpoint and took their property, according to CPD.

We reported the following day that investigators believed the robbers jumped the turnstile at the Southport Brown Line CTA station and escaped on a train.

That hunch apparently panned out, as the surveillance images police released today were taken at the station.

Detectives noted the "New York" sweatshirt one robber wore and the unusual design displayed on the back of the other robber's hoodie.

**Man charged with starting fire inside Loop Target store**

Prosecutors have charged a Decatur man with starting a fire in the bedding department of a Target store in downtown Chicago. Ronald Langley, 36, will be jailed to await trial after Judge Charles Beach found him to be a threat to public safety on Tuesday afternoon.

Officials said that Langley entered the store at 1 S. State Street around 7 p.m. Sept. 28 and made his way to the second floor. He grabbed a can of WD40 and then used it to set a blanket on fire on a display shelf, according to allegations made in court filings. No injuries were reported.

The judge's detention order said Langley admitted to the crime, which the store's surveillance cameras recorded.

Police arrested Langley at a different Target store last week. A loss prevention officer at the company's 1154 S. Clark St. location called 911 upon recognizing Langley in his store on Oct. 8, according to a CPD arrest report.

The security officer directed cops to Langley, who was still in the store.

Langley has no previous criminal cases in Cook County court records, but the judge's detention notes said he has "multiple prior offenses."

**Migrant got arrested on his first day in Chicago**

A Venezuelan migrant living at the Near North 18th District Police station managed to get arrested on his first day in Chicago, according to a CPD report documenting the incident.

The report said a sergeant was driving in the 1200 block of N. Burling, about a half block from the Near North Side station, around noon on Oct. 3, when he saw Angel Alberto Tarra-Gic, 20, standing in the middle of the street and refusing to move.

Noting the area "has seen an increase of narcotics solicitation," the sergeant got out of his car to see what Tarra-Gic was up to, the report continued.

Tarra-Gic clenched an "unknown blue object" in his hand and ran, causing drivers to swerve and stop to avoid hitting him, but was quickly apprehended, according to the report.

It said Tarra-Gic told officers he "arrived in the city yesterday from El Paso."

Cops never found the blue object he allegedly clenched in his hand, but they did charge him with reckless conduct.

**Lincoln Park carjacker in custody, but robbery crew claims 11 victims in 40 minutes**

A suspect is in custody after a Lincoln Park man was carjacked Oct. 10, Chicago police say. But armed robbery crews continue to plague West Town neighborhoods, where 11 people were robbed in about 45 minutes on Oct. 10.

In Lincoln Park, police said a gunman confronted a 31-year-old man as the victim stepped out of a black 2021 Audi in the 2200 block of N. Seminary around 6:52 p.m.

The robber took the victim's property and drove away with the Audi.

But he picked a bad night to go carjacking because a law enforcement task force comprised of a high-tech federal helicopter, an Illinois State Police airplane, and a dedicated team of ground units was operating in the city.

The task force located and tracked the Audi and arrested its driver near 47th Street and Martin Luther King Dr. Charges were pending.

"Major assist on this one from IL State Police, who used their pursuit capability to follow these fleeing, violent armed robbers down the Dan Ryan," Ald. Brian Hopkins [2nd] tweeted Oct. 10.

Within minutes of the Lincoln Park carjacking, another robbery spree unfolded in West Town, where robbery reports are up 43% from last year and up 107% versus 2019, according to the city.

The crimes began just before 7 p.m. when a masked gunman robbed a woman of her purse in the 800 block of N. Hoyne. A similar holdup quickly followed that in the 900 block of N. Winchester.

Another woman was robbed shortly after 7 p.m. near Elizabeth and Fry.

A 25-year-old man was robbed as he stood outside his car at a carwash in the 2300 block of W. Grand at 7:12 p.m., according to police.

CPD reports show that two armed men jumped out of a black SUV and robbed a woman at Huron and Campbell at about 7:15 p.m.

Similar crimes occurred in the 1400 block of W. Division, the 800 block of N. Fairfield, and the 1500 block of W. Erie.

Four armed men put guns to a man's head near Wabansia and Rockwell during a robbery. Again, they arrived and departed in a dark-colored SUV.

More robberies were reported in the 1500 block of West Erie, the 600

**Man accused of stalking JB Pritzker, throwing rocks at his mansion released on electronic monitoring**

On Oct. 10, a Cook County judge rejected a prosecutor's request to have a man who allegedly stalked and threw rocks at the home of Illinois Gov. JB Pritzker jailed as a safety threat. Judge William Fahy decided that the public's safety could be assured by releasing Adam Dabash, 38, on electronic monitoring instead, according to court records.

Assistant State's Attorney Anne McCord Rodgers told Fahy that surveillance video showed Dabash walking outside the governor's home in the 1400 block of N. Astor at 9:45 a.m. Oct. 9. Dabash allegedly stopped twice to throw baseball-sized rocks at the mansion's windows, then returned to throw another rock at the windows. She said three of the governor's windows were damaged, with one rock recovered from inside the mansion and two found outside.

Rodgers estimated the governor's

**Man was shot during robbery in River North last month, prosecutors say, but Chicago police never told public about it**

A man was shot during a robbery in River North last month, prosecutors say, but the Chicago Police Dept. never told the public about it. After discovering the details in court filings, we started digging. Here's what we found.

Cops responded to calls of shots fired and a person shot near State and Hubbard streets around 5:35 a.m. on Sept. 23. The officers didn't find anyone injured, but they did find shell casings and broken glass on the ground outside a Subway restaurant at 447 N. State.

As it turned out, a 29-year-old man did get shot, but he left the scene. Officers and paramedics found him after receiving a 911 call about a man with a gunshot wound to the leg in the 1500 block of W. 80th Place about two hours later.

Prosecutors now say the man was shot while he and another victim were robbed outside a convenience store in the 400 block of N. State.

They were standing outside the store when Eric Purdis, 31, and two men who remain at large engaged them in a conversation, prosecutors said in a court filing.

Purdis and one accomplice walked away. But Purdis stopped, adjusted his waistband, and walked back toward the victims while brandishing a firearm, according to the prosecutor's pretrial detention motion.

Officials said that Purdis took the 29-year-old's iPhone, watch, and jewelry and took a phone from the second victim.

At that point, one of the other robbers fired a gun, striking the 29-year-old in the right thigh. Purdis also fired shots toward both victims but missed, according to the filing.

Chicago police arrested Purdis on Sept. 30 after they responded to calls about 10 people drinking, smoking, and making noise outside a hotel near State and Hubbard, according to Purdis' arrest report.

An officer recognized Purdis as one of the robbers, and cops arrested him as he walked away from the disturbance.

Purdis was carrying a digital scale in his pocket along with a baggie of suspected crack cocaine, according to the arrest report, which claimed Purdis was a member of the Gangster Disciples street gang.

Pritzker and "several other individuals" were inside his home at the time of the incident, but no injuries were reported.

Chicago police responded to assist Illinois State Police troopers at the scene. Officers located Dabash about ten minutes later in the 1200 block of N. Clark St., a CPD arrest report said. The report listed his home address in Villa Park.

He's charged with armed robbery with a firearm and possession of a controlled substance. Judge William Fahy granted the state's request to detain him before trial as a safety threat.

Purdus was acquitted of armed robbery charges after a bench trial before Judge William Hooks in Feb. 2022, according to court records.

His previous felony convictions include being a felon in possession of a firearm in 2015, possessing a stolen motor vehicle in 2013, and possessing a controlled substance in 2012, the court records show.

Four of the 23 people shot in River North this year were shot during robberies.

Five days before the robbery Purdis is charged with, a 50-year-old man was shot when he failed to comply with an armed robber on Hubbard St., just west of State St.

Police said the robber confronted the victim, who was walking on Hubbard St., and demanded his valuables. Instead, the victim began fighting with the offender.

During the struggle, the victim "heard shots and felt pain and sustained a gunshot wound to the left buttock," a CPD media statement said.

Someone drove him to MacNeal Hospital in Berwyn for treatment, according to police.

On February 12, two people were shot during a robbery in a parking lot in the 300 block of W. Ontario.

More than 15 shell casings were found in the area after a gunman opened fire. A 46-year-old man was struck in the shoulder, and police said a man in his 20s was shot in the abdomen.

No arrests have been announced in either of those cases.

**Loop bank robber busted after cops find him walking barefoot with \$5,400 cash in his pockets**

A man faces federal bank robbery charges after he was allegedly found walking barefoot in the Loop along the same path being taken by a GPS tracker buried in the bank's stolen cash, according to an FBI agent's criminal complaint.

The robber walked up to a counter at U.S. Bank at 25 E. Washington around 2 p.m. Oct. 5, and handed the teller a folded piece of paper, the complaint said.

When the teller asked the man if he wanted to make a withdrawal, he told them to read the note, which said, "I NEED \$8,000 NOW! Hand it to me."

Once again, the teller asked if he wanted to make a withdrawal but realized the bank was being robbed after the man pointed to the note again, said the complaint.

The teller handed the man two bricks of \$20 bills, one of which con-

According to Rodgers, investigators determined that Dabash also tossed notes over the governor's fence on August 26 and August 28. She said his face is visible on surveillance video from both days, and his name was written on both notes. No other details about the content of those notes were included in a copy of the written proffer provided by the Cook County state's attorney's office.

Dabash destroyed the mattress in his police holding cell and told officers at the police station that Illinois has a "m\*\*\*\*r f\*\*\*\*r for a governor."

He's charged with two counts of felony stalking, felony criminal damage to property, and misdemeanor criminal damage to property. Rodgers said he has no criminal background.

tained a GPS tracker, and some loose cash.

Chicago police officers followed the tracker's movements through Millennium Park and eventually spotted Deion Nantwi strolling barefoot in the 300 block of S. Columbus. The cops stopped Nantwi because he resembled the robber's description, except he wasn't wearing shoes and he wore a black hoodie instead of the robber's gray one, the complaint said.

Officers found two stacks of \$20 bills, the GPS tracker, and assorted cash totaling \$5,400 in his pants pocket, according to the FBI agent's report.

Investigators traced the GPS tracker's path and found a gray sweatshirt and the robber's distinctive sneakers lying on a curb.

**North Side garage burglars caught on camera**

Two residential garage burglars were caught on camera in Edgewater recently, and one of their victims believes they're the same prowlers that Chicago police recently warned



North Side homeowners about.

CPD issued a community alert Sunday to warn residents about two men who have been burglarizing garages from Lincoln Park to North Center.

The alert said that the pair entered garages through side doors and took property from inside the garages and vehicles parked within them.

It described the suspects as one Hispanic man and one Black man wearing black ski masks, gray sweatshirts, and gloves.

One of our readers thought that description sounded familiar when he read our story. It sounded just like the two guys who burglarized his garage in Edgewater around 2 a.m. Sept. 28.

He sent videos showing the men strolling up and down the alley, ducking between buildings, and emerging with things in their hands. The footage also shows a vehicle that the men used.

In one clip, they stop walking within range of a security camera so one guy can tuck something into the other guy's backpack. You can get a pretty good look at their faces during those moments.

# Carjackings reported

Police are investigating several carjackings that have been reported recently. They include one where three masked men carjacked a driver of his BMW at the intersection of Chicago and Ashland around 1:50 a.m. Oct. 15. The group exited a black Chevy Impala, threatened the driver with guns, and drove away with his car.

At 6:40 a.m. Oct. 15, two armed men carjacked a woman at the Shell service station, 2801 N. Ashland. The woman was on her way to work when the men took her cream-colored 2011 Infinity G37X at gunpoint, according to a CPD report. It described the

hijackers as Black men between 20 and 25 years old who weighed 125 to 150 pounds. They wore ski masks and dark clothing.

In the Loop, two armed men walked up behind a woman in the Target parking garage, 1154 S. Clark, around 3:30 p.m. Wednesday. They robbed her and drove away with her Black Volvo, a CPD report said. They were described as Black men between 17 and 25 years old who stood 6 feet to 6'-5" tall. One wore a surgical mask with a black jacket, and the other wore a mask with a gray hoodie pulled over his head, according to initial information from the scene.

## Two men robbed and burglarized Loop stores almost weekly since August

Chicago police have arrested two men for allegedly committing a string of robberies and burglaries at two stores in the Loop.

Tim Jones, 43, and Cody Lloyd, 31, were in court for detention hearings on Oct. 13.

The men are accused of stealing liquor and cigarettes from Walgreens, 200 W. Adams, and 7-Eleven, 191 W. Adams, repeatedly since Aug. 8, according to a CPD charging statement and police reports.

Last week, Chicago police issued a community alert about the incidents. In it, Area Three detectives said each of the crimes involved two men.

During one robbery, an offender implied he had a gun. During another, an offender displayed a knife and threatened to stab a

store employee. And the suspects sprayed mace on store employees during two of the crimes, the alert said.

The Walgreens was targeted on Aug. 8 at 11:35 p.m.; Aug. 14 at 5:38 a.m.; Aug. 20 at 12:30 p.m.; Aug. 30 at 6:45 a.m.; and Sept. 11 at 11:30 p.m., according to a CPD media statement.

Three more incidents occurred at the 7-Eleven: on Sept. 16 at 12:15 a.m.; on Sept. 26 at 1 a.m.; and on Oct. 4 at 4:31 a.m.

Police said weapons were used during the two most recent robberies at the convenience store.

Jones is charged with three counts of armed robbery, four counts of burglary, and one count of felony retail theft. Lloyd is charged with three counts of armed robbery and four counts of burglary.

## Federal helicopter, AirTags helped snare Lincoln Park carjacker

A federal helicopter crew teamed up with Illinois State Police troopers, Chicago police, and two Apple AirTags to lasso a hijacker who took a man's car at gunpoint in Lincoln Park last week, officials say.

Judge Maryam Ahmad ordered 18-year-old Noah Sidney held in custody as a public safety threat during a detention hearing on Oct. 12.

The carjacking occurred shortly before 7 p.m. Oct. 10 as a 31-year-old man unloaded groceries from his Audi Q3 in the 2200 block of N. Seminary, according to Sidney's arrest report.

The report said Sidney walked up to the victim, displayed a pistol, and forced him to turn over his keys, wallet, and phone. The victim complied, and Sidney drove away with his car.

But a multi-jurisdictional law enforcement task force was working in Chicago that night, including a high-tech helicopter operated by U.S. Customs and Border

Protection.

After the victim told Chicago cops that two AirTags were in his hijacked car, the police started tracking the devices and shared their location with the helicopter, the CPD report said.

The helicopter located the Audi a few minutes later and began radioing "step-by-step location updates" to ground units, according to the report.

When the Audi parked in the 4700 block of S. Martin Luther King Dr., an Illinois State Police trooper moved in and chased Sidney down, the report continued.

The police returned the Audi to its owner.

Rumors circulated on social media that the hijacking victim had been abducted and forced to withdraw money from an ATM, but no such allegations were made in court records or CPD's reports.

Sidney is charged with aggravated vehicular hijacking with a firearm, armed robbery with a firearm, and misdemeanor resisting police.

## Cellular store employees zip-tied, robbed downtown

Armed robbers restrained employees of a downtown cellular store and got away with over \$50,000 worth of iPhones on Oct. 14, according to a preliminary Chicago police report.

Police arrested a man Oct. 13 after another cellular store was robbed in Lincoln Square, but his accomplice escaped from cops with a pair of handcuffs dangling from his wrist.

Saturday's robbery occurred at T-Mobile, 600 W. Roosevelt, shortly after 10 a.m.

Two men armed with at least one gun entered the store and restrained the employees with zip ties. They took phones and cash from the store's safe and escaped in a black Jeep Compass that was last seen heading west on Roosevelt Rd.

An officer at the scene said the rob-

bers were two Black men wearing ski masks, one about 5'-6" tall and the other about 6'-2" tall. Both were about 20 years old.

In Lincoln Square, two men robbed the Verizon store, 4752 N. Lincoln, around 12:30 p.m. Oct. 13. After getting phones from the store, they escaped on an inbound Brown Line train from the Western station.

Chicago cops followed GPS trackers inside the phones to intercept the train at Belmont. Officers arrested one man there and recovered items stolen from the store, police said.

But the second offender broke away from officers as they tried to arrest him. Witnesses said he jumped onto the roof of a building west of the Brown Line tracks, hopped onto a dumpster, and ran north on Sheffield Ave.

He was described as Black, heavy-set, 5'-6" to 5'-9" tall, with handcuffs on one wrist. He had long dreadlocks and wore a gray and brown top with red stripes, police at the scene reported.

Charges were pending.

CPD warned cellular stores late last month about armed robbers who had targeted businesses in Lincoln Park and Roscoe Village. Some of those stores' employees were also zip-tied.

Police said the robbers walked into the stores and asked about phones until customers left. Once they were alone with the employees, the robbers pulled out handguns and forced the workers to retrieve Apple products from the store's safe.

The alert described the suspects as two Black men between 20 and 30 years old who wore black hoodies,

black pants, and surgical or ski masks.

One of the Roscoe Village robbers had a cross-shaped tattoo between his eyes, and the other had a large gap between his front teeth, according to an officer who responded to the store's 911 call.

# It's peak time of year for crashes involving deer

Fall in Illinois includes the arrival of deer mating season.

Illinois officials are reminding motorists to be alert for deer, which are entering their peak active season, especially at dawn and dusk now through December.

While a drivers' natural instinct is to steer quickly out of the way when you see a deer, remember to not veer suddenly because you

could lose control of your vehicle and swerve into another lane or off the road. Always prepare for the unexpected. A deer might stop in the middle of the road or double back. They also frequently travel in groups so when you see one there likely are others nearby.

In 2022, there were 14,524 crashes involving deer in Illinois. Of those, 13,892 resulted in damage to property or vehicles, while 629 caused injuries. Four of the crashes resulted in fatalities.

special treatment. Just last year, Loop residents blamed two mass shootings on patrons of a single bar in the Loop. But it continued to operate until, prosecutors say, its doorman shot and killed one of the bouncers.

**River North problems**

On a sunny evening in mid-June, dozens of shots were fired during a shocking ambush that left a man critically injured in the 300 block of W. Erie.

Surveillance video showed the victim walking on the sidewalk when a group of gunmen emerged from a parked car and began shooting at him. He fell, got up, and ran down the street. One of the gunmen chased him down the block, firing rounds at the victim until he fell to the ground.

Reilly, the alderman, linked that crime to Blüm, which is located on the same block.

“Based on preliminary findings, the victim of the shooting was a patron of Blüm [nightclub],

and the shooter(s) came downtown to seek him out,” Ald. Reilly wrote in a letter to neighbors.

“I have asked the local police commander and liquor commissioner to investigate the nightclub Blüm and, if witness reports are substantiated, initiate the license revocation process to shut them down,” he continued.

The club continued to operate until Sunday.

“It should not require a mass shooting to result in the closure of a problem nightclub,” said Reilly. “River North residents and I have been sounding the alarm to the city about Blüm for years – yet the city has done nothing to discipline the club.”

“How many more people need to get shot before the city steps up to the plate and starts shutting down these bad operators? Downtown residents should not be forced to suffer because city bureaucrats refuse to do their jobs.”

In fact, a mass shooting or two may not be enough for the city to close a business permanently.

**Wells St. shootings**

Of the 38 people shot in the Loop last year, a number that eclipses any other year since at least 2001, 11 of them were shot in the 400 block of S. Wells. And three more were shot a block over in the 400 block of S. Clark.

The shootings began early on May 3.

Two gunmen on the sidewalk began shooting at an SUV stopped for a red light, Chicago police said at the time. More than 30 shell casings, including some rifle rounds, were found at the scene. Three people in the SUV were injured, as was a woman crossing the street.

Neighbors immediately pointed the finger at patrons of PER.SO.NA nightclub, 408 S. Wells.

Fingerpointing and proving responsibility are two different things, of course, and PER.SO.NA continued to operate.

A second mass shooting occurred on the block two months later, around 1:44 a.m. July 1.

Police said the victims got into an argument with someone as

they left an unnamed business in the 400 block of S. Wells. That “someone” started shooting. He killed two and wounded three more.

Personnel stationed at Chicago Fire Dept. Engine Company 1, 419 S. Wells, were the first to call in the gunfire. Video tweeted by a nearby resident shows an ambulance stationed at the firehouse leaving on a run as gunfire erupted.

A month later, at 3:20 a.m. Aug. 6, three people were shot during an argument in a parking lot in the 400 block of S. Clark. Two of them died. Surveillance video of the shooting spread online. Residents again blamed the club, but no links were proven.

Only after prosecutors accused PER.SO. NA’s doorman of murdering another of the club’s security guards did the city finally force the business to close.

Officials said Devontrell Turnipseed shot and killed 38-year-old Artemis Harris on Oct. 9 after Harris complained that Turnipseed was not properly searching

incoming customers for guns.

The two men decided to take their disagreement outside, where they squared up on the sidewalk, officials said. Turnipseed, a licensed concealed carry holder, allegedly removed a gun from a holster on his waistband and appeared to be passing it off to another guard when Harris punched him in the face.

Turnipseed fired three shots as he fell to the ground, striking Harris twice in the chest, prosecutors said. Harris, who was not armed, died a short time later.

The murder case is still pending.

PER.SO. NA’s owner announced on Oct. 14 that she would surrender her license to the city.

One week later, a 55-year-old man was shot as he sat in a car across the street from the nightclub, which had been shuttered. There have been no shootings on the block since then.

## Chicago's Great Fire, library talk on Oct. 28 at Edgewater Library

The great Chicago fire of 1871 devastated the city and shaped architecture, politics and social programs for years to come.

The Edgewater Branch of the Chicago Public Library, 6000 N. Broadway, will be hosting an open discussion on the book "Chicago's Great Fire," by Carl Smith, 10 a.m. Saturday, Oct. 28.

Chicago was transformed into a hellish inferno. For two days the city burned as firefighters struggled to get control of the blaze. By the time a sudden rain helped extinguish the flames, 300 people were dead, 100,000 more were homeless, and \$200 million in damage—the equivalent of nearly \$4.5 billion today—had been done.

The discussion will review how the city was able to rebuild itself and rise from its ashes. Books will be available at the first floor circulation desk.

greenhouse gas emissions."

The ecological restoration process creates habitats for pollinators and resting stops for migratory birds, absorbs and filters stormwater, stores carbon in the soil, and establishes a place for nature observation and respite in a section of the Uptown community area that is densely populated and highly urbanized.

Park patrons are asked to stay within the designated pathways and off the plantings to allow for seedlings to grow, and to obey the interpretative signage on site. It will take a few seasons for native plantings to thrive.

In 2021, the CPD received a \$116,110 grant federally funded by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and administered through the Illinois Coastal Management Program of the Illinois Dept. of Natural Resources. The grant was matched by taxpayers for a total cost of \$232,220 in the development of this public project.

The restoration project that replaced the existing turf lawn began with the removal of invasive plant species in Fall 2022, and the installation of native shrubs and seed installation, and the development of interpretive signage.

warned in July about four North Side gang hot spots the department had identified as ripe for retaliatory shootings between Gangster Disciples in Rogers Park and the Wicked City faction of the Black P Stones street gang to the south.

Scholastica in the 1990s and were used again by Ramirez and Culver.

"We are currently 20 sisters with a median age of 84. Our costs continue to rise, especially as our number of sisters and sources of income continue to decline. Given these realities, we have determined that our best course of action is to prepare for the sale of our entire 14-acre campus. Our lease responsibilities with Acero Charter School will be completed in July, 2026, giving us time to plan our exit from the property," wrote Remsgar.

Opened in 2012, Acero's Cruz campus serves approximately 700 students from Kindergarten through 12th Grade. Cruz is an arts academy and offers classes in music, visual art, theater and dance. Its high school offers Honors and AP courses. Students for whom English is a second language receive additional support, according to the website of Acero Schools.

In 2020, the nuns had announced their initial plan in which they would sell a portion of their campus for redevelopment as a senior-living center. Their plan had received approval from Ald. Maria Hadden [49th].

"Respondents expressed support for allowing the Sisters to age in place and expanding senior housing opportunities in the area. Concerns were expressed about losing green space on the site and the potential for increased traffic in the area. We will work closely with the Benedictine Sisters, and their selected developer to address these issues when finalizing plans," wrote Hadden, after she had hosted public meetings about the proposed zoning change.

According to Remsgar, the Benedictine Sisters were not able to find anyone interested in their plan to redevelop the three northernmost acres of their campus as an age-restricted, independent and assisted-living residence, open to the public.



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Saint Scholastica was the twin sister of St. Benedict. She established a women's monastery south of Rome as a home for female members of the Order of Saint Benedict, founded by her brother in AD 549.

"It was our preference that our sisters would move into that new senior community when it was completed. A senior-living

market study that we had commissioned indicated an identifiable demand for such a development, but an offering memorandum sent to several hundred local, regional, and national senior living development firms received [only] marginal response," added Remsgar.

The religious order had made its first attempt to sell part of the property prior to the outbreak of COVID-19 pandemic. It tried once again in early 2022 but had found less interest and a changing real estate market.

"The three-acre senior-living development offering package was again presented to the market early in 2022, post-COVID and in a rising interest rate market. Again, there was very limited response and developers' recurring comments were that the area could not support a new market-rate senior community," wrote Remsgar.

In the email, Remsgar thanked the religious order's supporters and said leaving its longtime home will not be easy.

"As with any heavy decision, it has been made easier knowing that we do so with the loving support of friends like you, as well as with guidance from our gracious God who always sees us through. While leaving this beautiful property that we - and you - have loved will not be easy, we take comfort in knowing that our Benedictine charism transcends any physical property. If we are able to sell the property, we still envision a future where our Benedictine charism continues in the prayers of our entire community that prays twice daily, in the ministries that our younger sisters will continue to do, in the lives of our alumnae/alumni, and in the hearts of each of the friends of our monastery," wrote Remsgar.



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
