Chocolate is transformative for me. I'm serious.



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# Elect Torrnick Ward? You be the judge

So often, the judges that we vote for in our elections are pretty much unknown to us. In the past, we've all voted for those we knew absolutely nothing about.

I admit that once upon a time, if they were a woman or their name sounded Jewish, OK, they got my vote.

The me of today no longer does that. Now I want to be educated as to whom I'm voting for. I want to know why someone deserves that prestigious job.

Torrnick Alan Ward wants to be elected judge of Cook County's 9th Subcircuit, which includes Chicago, Evanston, Niles, Lincolnwood and Wilmette. "I have fought for fairness and justice all my life," says Ward. "I will do the same as judge."

Ward grew up on the South Side, in Chatham, and attended Leo High School. After his father died, he transferred to Jones Commercial High School, followed by Northern Illinois Univ. and DePaul College of Law, where he graduated from in 1998. He is a first generation college graduate, who wants a fair court system that's "equitable to everyone, regardless of where you come from or who you are."

For the past 19 years, Ward has lived in Rogers Park with his wife, Stephanie, and their two boys, Franklin and Alan, who are high school students in the Chicago Public Schools. Oh yea, and we can't forget Ger-

aldine, the family pug!

Early voting starts May 19 and the primary election is June 28. Here's wishing Ward the very best of luck! And here's a little more info too.

**Q: What are the duties of a Cook County Subcircuit Court judge? What exactly is a Subcircuit court?**

**A:** Circuit Court Judges are elected officials who have an important role in our society. [They] can preside over many different cases including criminal cases and civil cases like landlord tenant, injury case, and family law.

In Cook County, Circuit Court judges can run in an election county-wide or in a smaller district called a subcircuit. Judges run for a specific vacancy created when a former judge retires or otherwise leaves the bench.

The subcircuit system was created in 1992 to increase minority representation on the bench. Once elected, judges elected from subcircuits have the same powers as judges elected county-wide and can be assigned to any division of the Circuit Court. I am running in the 9th Subcircuit, for the Jacobius vacancy.

**Q: Why do you want this position and what are your qualifications?**

**A:** Faith in our government and institutions has eroded. Too many people seem to feel the government doesn't work. I've seen that trust in the court system is greatly determined by how people are treated by judges. More than other elected officials, judges have daily interactions with people

affected by their decisions, and in my experience, even when a judge or jury makes a decision against a person, if the person feels they were treated fairly they can often respect the decision. [Being] a judge is the best way for me to serve in government and help rebuild trust.

I have practiced law for 23 years, and first-chaired numerous bench and jury trials. I am an adjunct professor at DePaul College of Law, where I teach litigation. The Chicago Bar Assoc. and the Alliance of Bar Associations for Judicial Screening, which are non-partisan groups that do judicial evaluations, found that I am qualified and recommended to serve as a judge.

**Q: What sort of work are you currently doing? You're a practicing attorney? What sort of law?**

**A:** I [am] the deputy director of Labor Relations, where I practice labor and employment law, and supervise the legal

staff.

**Q: Do you have opponents? If so, why are you the better person for this position? What makes you good for this job?**

**A:** There are four candidates for the Jacobius vacancy, including myself. All of us have been lawyers for more than 20 years. I am the best candidate for judge because I have experience improving the agencies I've worked with in the past, and I plan to bring those skills to the bench. Also, my life experiences tend to be more diverse than many Cook County judges.

As a government lawyer, I've represented government agencies and managers. In private practice my clients included wealthy business owners, single parents of limited means and employees who had their religious freedom rights violated.

If elected a judge, I pledge to look for ways to improve trust in the justice system and make it easier for litigants to understand the process. I intend to publish plain language FAQs to explain how the process works in my courtroom and to publish any written opinions I create on the Court's website. I intend to ensure to the extent that I can that I am transparent about the rulings I make.

**Q: What do you do for fun?**

**A:** I enjoy movies, reading about history and historical figures, political podcasts, playing with our dog, Geraldine, and video games.

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# Lawsuit claims 'cartel' of politically connected, wealthy Chicago families dominate local marijuana market

**Dope that sells for \$300 in California fetches more than \$4,000 in Illinois**

A new federal lawsuit accuses a "cartel" of influential large companies, including a company associated with the family of Gov. JB Pritzker, of exploiting political connections to improperly dominate Illinois' marijuana marketplace.

On April 18, an organization called True Social Equity in Cannabis filed suit in Chicago federal court against five corporate entities in the business of selling recreational marijuana under Illinois' cannabis dispensary licensing regime.

The complaint identifies defendants as Green Thumb Industries, Akerna Corp., Surterra Holdings Inc., Verano Holdings Corp. and ILDISP LLC, a group of companies the complaint labels collectively as the "Chicago Cartel."

The complaint asserts the "Chicago Cartel" have conspired to allegedly pretend to be competitors, when they have actually collectively monopolized the sale of recreational marijuana in Illinois, driving the price of marijuana to levels not seen in other states that have legalized and regulated the sale and use of recreational marijuana.

"The 'Chicago Cartel' charges supra-competitive prices for marijuana and charge the highest prices for marijuana in the United States in Illinois," the complaint states.

The complaint asserts a pound of mari-

juana that sells for \$300 in California can fetch more than \$4,000 in Illinois.

The complaint claims the companies are all connected to the Pritzker, Wrigley and Kovler families. The Pritzker family, including Gov. Pritzker, gained their fortunes largely from the Hyatt brand of hotels, among other interests; the Wrigley family from their chewing gum and candy companies; and the Kovler family from various business interests, including the "Jim Beam bourbon fortune."

All three families are also known for a range of philanthropic ventures in Chicago and elsewhere.

According to the complaint, Akerna is controlled by the Pritzker family; Surterra by the Wrigleys; and Green Thumb by the Kovlers.

The complaint accuses the various companies sell common products, share technology and information, use shell companies to operate Illinois marijuana dispensaries together, and "have interlocking directorates and managers."

The complaint asserts the "Cartel" has existed in various forms since it was allegedly conceived in the mid-2010s, allegedly through the machinations of one of former House Speaker Michael Madigan's friends and top associates, Mike McClain. Both McClain and Madigan stand indicted on different political corruption-related charges.

The complaint asserts the "Cartel's" actions amount to violations of federal anti-trust law.

True Social Equity in Cannabis identi-

fies itself in the complaint as "an unincorporated association," created by marijuana consumers and activists to oppose "cannabis monopolization by members of the 'Chicago Cartel' in Illinois and the United States."

They claim they have suffered legal injuries "in the form of prices paid by members, lost job opportunities for members, the inability of members to obtain licenses in state-protected marijuana markets and investment losses."

Outside of court, the group has lobbied and protested to increase the number of recreational marijuana dispensing licenses available specifically to Black people, and other people of color.

The complaint seeks court orders blocking the five companies from selling marijuana in Illinois and the U.S., and "divesting Defendants of all assets."



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# Does return of warm weather also mean a return of illegal bike racing?

As the warm weather returns, city officials and the Chicago Police are discussing the need for added enforcement regarding illegal motorcycle gatherings, stunt biking and drag racing in Chicago.

Those who drive Chicago streets know all about the crafty bikers who scoot in and out of traffic, do tricks on public plazas or race up and down Lake Shore Dr. at speeds up to 100 MPH.

Many who live along the North Lakefront long ago tired of the noisy bikes, that seem so impervious to police threats. Caravans of motorcycle riders across the city perform stunts in traffic and make a lot of noise.

The groups usually organize via social media and attract riders from the city, suburbs and over the border in Indiana and Wisconsin. N. Lake Shore Dr., Lower Wacker Dr., Wrigleyville and various neighborhood parks and plazas have long been a favored destination.

Ald. Brian Hopkins [2nd], says these caravans are lawless — but law enforcement's hands are tied. It's hard for police to go after offending riders because chases can turn deadly.

"Over this past year, I worked closely with city and state officials advocating for the enhancements needed to implement enforcement missions with more of an impact. I also reviewed what worked during last year's efforts; which included additionally trained officers, tow mission, additional vehicles and resources, and the use of police helicopters for tracking unsafe vehicles," said Hopkins.

On June 14, 2021, a new ordinance was enacted in Chicago to curb dangerous motorcycle drivers and drag racers in the city. The ordinance requires that the person operating a motorcycle keep at least one hand on a handlebar grip while in motion. Furthermore, the operator shall ride the motorcycle "only while sitting astride the seat, facing forward, with one leg on each side of the motorcycle."

He and other North Lakefront aldermen say their ward offices continue to receive complaints from residents asking what the Chicago Police Dept. [CPD] can do about motorcycle and drag racing enforcement. "I completely understand the concern behind these requests," said Hopkins. "Often, the noise, recklessness, and endangerment from this activity can be terrifying. At the very least, it damages our quality of life. At the most, this activity creates dangerous moments that are life-threatening - involving racing speeds well over 100 mph

The drag racers who flock to Lower Wacker Dr. on weekends raised their game to a new level May 1 when they surrounded a group of spectators with burning gasoline before a driver began doing donuts around the flames.

It happened around 2:30 a.m. on Lower Wacker Dr. at Columbus Dr., just south of the Chicago River.

Officers who monitor the local Chicago police district's surveillance cameras first report-

ed people with about 60 cars congregating in the area around 2:15 a.m. They quickly upped their estimate to 100 cars.

Then, at 2:30, the camera operator reported the crowd was blocking traffic in all directions while drivers did donuts in the intersection. Police stepped up their response upon hearing that the street was being lit on fire with people standing in the middle. Dispatchers sent EMS as a precaution, but no injuries were reported. Drag racing and donut-spinning have been an ongoing problem on Lower Wacker Dr. for several years.

Bike racers have been seen on the North Lakefront Trail, on the plaza fronting Wrigley Field, Downtown and in Lincoln Park. Residents say larger motorcycle groups assemble late at night, usually on weekends, and ride through neighborhoods with modified exhaust systems making them extra loud. Some residents have also reported reckless riding on sidewalks, and collisions or near-misses with pedestrians and other vehicles.

The recently installed noise monitoring program and analytic software will also

help the 911 operations center alert the CPD. Their video surveillance, Strategic

Decision Support Centers, then document when large-scale motorcycle activity or vehicle drag racing starts up. This documentation and technology use can help build a case for prosecution when the incident results in an arrest.

Past sting operations have led to ticketing for such offenses as illegally modified vehicles, illegal use of vehicles, illegal possession of weapons, and lack of identification or insurance. Some targeted operations have also discovered that the vehicle owner or passenger(s) were found to have outstanding warrants for their arrest or were on probation or parole.

"The CPD and City Hall are trying to send a message to illegal vehicle operators that Chicago is off limits. District Commanders, and area Deputy Chiefs, continue to review the most effective ways to conduct these types of operations," said Hopkins.

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# Two attorneys of failed Superior St. development withdraw from representing client as case continues

On April 27, two of the three attorneys representing Symmetry Property Development and its co-defendants Jeffrey Laytin and Forefront EB-5, filed a motion in federal court to withdraw as counsel of record for a group of defendants who failed in their bid to construct a 42-story mixed use tower at the northeast corner of Wabash Ave. and Superior St.

The defendants are being sued by a group of Chinese investors who are demanding their \$50 million investment be returned.

According to the motion, while Arthur Don and Aaron S. Klein, of the Chicago-based law firm Greenberg Traurig LLP, have been listed as the counsel of record, the pair “have had no substantive involvement with this case since 2019,” and the primary counsel for the defendants has been attorney Daniel Hildebrand, formerly also of Greenberg Traurig.

Hildebrand left the firm in January to join the Chicago-based firm of Lewitas Hyman.

According to the motion, Hildebrand did not oppose the pair leaving the case and would continue representing the defendants.

The Chinese investors were participating in the questionable EB-5 federal Visa program, which provides foreign investors with a fast-track to permanent U.S. residency status. Individually, these investors had invested up to \$550,000 for a total of nearly \$50 million to fund construction of the failed Carillon Towers project.

The defendants have long claimed they would be able to pay back the investors with a \$50 million loan they had secured from a group of investors in Bahrain. An investigation by a court-appointed investigator, however, recently determined that group had never existed.

Attorneys for Laytin, who is the principal of Symmetry, have claimed the Bahraini money would be used to pay back the group of Chinese investors. This newspaper has made numerous attempts to contact Laytin. So far, he has not responded to any questions.

More than a year ago, this newspaper first learned about the alleged Bahraini-investors. At the time, a quick visit to the website of the investment company showed it had a dummy website,

which cast suspicion on the company itself.

U.S. District Chief Judge Charles Kocoras had appointed a court official, designated as a special master, to sort through all the paperwork submitted by Sym-

metry’s Laytin and his attorneys. According to one of the attorneys representing a group of Chinese investors, what the special master uncovered was not simply messy paperwork but rather an elaborate fraud.

“The special master said that the supposed loan from the Middle East to pay off the Chinese investors was made up, fake, and that the lawyers were giving forged documents to the court,” said Douglas Eliot Litowitz, who along with attorney Glenn J. Dunn, is representing the Chinese investors.

Had Carillon Tower been built,

it would have replaced three Orange-rated 19th Century Superior St. rowhouses. Citing neighborhood opposition, Ald. Brendan Reilly [42nd] blocked the project from moving forward.

After spending years battling Laytin to have his clients’ money returned, Litowitz says he is especially disappointed by the conduct of his Laytin’s attorneys.

“The Greenberg Traurig law firm submitted forged and fake documents to a federal court, and they did it knowingly and recklessly to create the false impression that their clients would return some of the \$50 million they stole from my clients, who are the investors in the never-built project. We are talking about criminal behavior, lying to a federal judge, interacting with persons on scam watches and using offshore accounts with fake identities, and asserting the truth of documents that any idiot could see were phony,” Litowitz said in March.

Attempts have been made to contact the law firm of Greenberg Traurig, but they have not responded.

On March 21, 2019, the remaining plaintiffs had filed an amend-

ed complaint alleging that Laytin and other defendants had committed fraud and violated federal and state securities laws in connection with the project. According to the amended complaint, the plaintiffs had invested a combined \$49.5 million the project. Plaintiffs also alleged that despite their investment, defendants had never completed the project or even started it—that “no shovel was ever put into the ground.”

Three years later, the plaintiffs are still seeking the return of their investment along with accumulated interest, penalties, and fees.

Based in New York City, co-defendant Forefront EB-5 is also a mysterious entity. In a 2014 press release, the company described itself as one “which will serve to aid its non-U.S. clients in helping to stimulate the U.S. economy through U.S. job creation by capital investment.”

But that is the last public trace of their corporate activities that can be found.

No corporate website is associated with Forefront. Aside from the eight-year-old press release which announced its existence and stories about the failed Carillon Towers project, there are no other mentions of Forefront on the internet.

city. Hundreds of those unfortunate souls are sleeping in doorways and residing in tents under viaducts and in parks all over town.

The coalition estimates that the mansion tax could generate enough money to support 12,000 homeless families in its first decade.

In 2021, of the total 46,720 homes sold in Chicago, some 2,535 went for \$1-million or more, reported Midwest Real Estate Data. Last year, sales of million-dollar properties hit a new record high, up 19% from 2020.

“Buyers generally do not like the idea of a massive hike in the transfer tax,” said a luxury-home broker whose clients are targeting home and condominium purchases in Lincoln Park and the Gold Coast. “Because there is an under-supply of homes on the market, the bottom 10% might be deterred from purchasing.”

Another veteran North Side broker said in a normal market negotiation tactics may change.

“During a normal market, with

plenty of listings, buyers may ask the seller to split the cost of the transfer tax equally. Or, there will be an effect on price to compensate for the higher transfer tax. Buyers will look for discounts.”

This writer believes another wiser approach might be for Chicago and Cook County to earmark a percentage of the existing real estate tax bill to support the homeless.

A study by the Illinois Policy Institute, a nonpartisan research

organization, found that Chicago property taxes rose 92.3% between 2010 and 2020.

Two years ago, Mayor Lori Lightfoot oversaw passage of a new city ordinance that promised beleaguered property owners a ticking time bomb—guaranteed annual real estate tax increases of up to 5%.

“The mayor has all but guaranteed an increase in property taxes by some \$1 billion over the next four years,” said Paul Vallas, former budget director for the city,

and former CEO of Chicago Public Schools.

“Chicago taxpayers already pay the highest property taxes among all but two Midwestern cities, and the highest among large cities,” Vallas noted.

Despite the pandemic, Assessor Kaegi said that the Near North Side—bounded by Fullerton Ave. on the north, Lake Shore Dr. on the east, and the Chicago River on the south and west—posted “surprisingly robust” real estate values in 2021.

In 2021, most Near North Side single-family homes ranged in market value from \$920,000 to \$1.59 million. Condo values ranged from \$270,000 to \$420,000.

The entire city of Chicago was reassessed in 2021. The assessment level is 10% of market value for residential property.

The tax bite goes on.

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# Alderman, city try to address homeless camps, propane tank explosions on North Lakefront

## Cappleman: 'not opposed to viaduct camping'

In the April 28 edition of Ald. James Cappleman's weekly newsletter he addressed the problem of homeless camping in Lincoln Park and under the viaducts along N. Lake Shore Dr. in Uptown.

The newsletter was released after he had hosted a virtual meeting on April 26 to address homeless camping and the two recent explosions of propane tanks under N. Lake Shore Dr.

On April 13 there was an explosion within a homelessness encampment on Chicago Park District property between Wilson and Lawrence avenues. No injuries were reported. The fire occurred at a tent that belonged to someone who had died in early April.

It was the second explosion in two months in the tent camps occupying the Uptown viaducts. The first was on March 22. A similar explosion, fire and fatality occurred in 2021.

The alderman says that the best way the public can help is by supporting the City's role of being the lead support for the homeless campers. "Instead of providing food and other items directly, it's much better to donate items or money to the person's assigned social service agency."

The alderman said he has asked the City to have the viaducts cleared and has been denied. "I fear it's only a matter of time when an injury will lead to a needless death. Along with the safety risk, it's my opinion this will lead to a lawsuit and your tax dollars will pay for it."

Indeed, the Mayor's office, Chicago Park District and Chicago Police Dept. have flatly refused to enforce existing federal, state and city laws against public vagrancy,

and the rights of all citizens to have access to public streets, sidewalks and parks. That refusal to follow the law is not exclusive to Uptown, it's city-wide.

The problem in Uptown came to a head due to the irresponsible use and handling of propane tanks by the homeless campers in a confined area. Propane gas is heavier than air, and will settle into low areas rather than dispersing, making it quite dangerous in a confined space such as a viaduct.

Storing tanks of highly explosive fuels in the midst of people

living in flammable tents, directly underneath a heavily traveled U.S. highway and on the public sidewalk, has created a very dangerous situation.

Cappleman says that he recently met with the Mayor's Office, and the departments of Law, Family and Support Services, Public Health, CFD, Transportation, and Streets and Sanitation to discuss the explosions.

Cappleman reported that the City will be passing out fliers to people camping under the viaducts to warn them about the dangers of propane tanks.

He said that the viaduct explosions were caused by people under the influence of alcohol or other drugs. "People under the influence, or those experiencing mental distress, are not capable of making [good] decisions about [safety], so it doesn't make sense that fliers would discourage them from using propane tanks, especially when they fear they could freeze to death without using one. Explosions always come with the risk of injury and death, and we

have been very lucky so far that this has not yet been the case."

Many nearby residents are fed up with the City's general disregard for laws, policies and common decency like trash disposal, the proper use and handling of flammable materials, and disposal of human waste.

But those people's concerns have apparently not moved Cappleman's public support of the

homeless camping on sidewalks and other public spaces, stating "I am not opposed to people living in encampments."

"Many have very valid reasons to not trust others, and forcing them to move to another part of town damages what little trust and community they might have, thus slowing down efforts to get them housed. I support requiring the viaduct encampments to move to the nearby open space where some other tents are already located to reduce the safety risks for those currently living under the viaducts. I believe that this community has the right to stay together and to stay in Uptown but it is also our responsibility to ensure that those individuals and other neighbors remain safe."

"While it may sometimes appear that very little is being done

to tackle this problem, there continues to be a lot of work done by different City departments and social service agencies that's not often seen by the general public," said Cappleman.

"People mean well when they give propane tanks to [the campers], but the Chicago Fire Dept. [CFD] is strongly opposed to anyone issuing these tanks to people living in the streets given the safety risk to both those living under and passing through the viaducts."

He says the City will create legislation that would issue fines to those who are giving out propane tanks to homeless campers under the viaducts, and create a task force to discourage the use of propane tanks and anything else that could lead to explosions and fires.

He claims the City uses a Homelessness Management In-

formation System to track every single homeless person citywide. And that "each person is assigned a case manager from a social service agency."

The alderman said single homeless persons camping outdoors have been offered one of the following options: "a shelter bed, a hotel room, an apartment, or a nursing home to keep them safe and out of the elements. Those with a substance use disorder who are not yet ready to stop using are also offered either a low barrier shelter or an apartment with wrap-around services to motivate them to address their addictions."

"People who refuse shelter and continue to live outdoors are experiencing a severe lack of trust. The assigned case manager's first task is to build trust so that they will later accept a roof over their heads."

"People stuck in the state of chronic homelessness move more quickly into permanent housing when they primarily interact with their assigned case manager and others who are coordinating their efforts with them. When well-meaning residents step in to help, it can slow down efforts of the case manager who is building trust with their client, and that ultimately slows down efforts to get them into permanent housing."

The alderman said he will continue to work toward coming up with a solution that he hopes will protect pedestrians, cyclists, motorists, "and most especially, those who live under the viaducts."

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# For 55 years, barber brings service, style to downtown Chicago

Over the course of his five decades in Chicago, Frank La Fronza has become a staple of the city thanks to his skill as a barber and history of catering to celebrity clients. Today, he runs a spa and salon in Illinois Center, offering a wide range of services. La Fronza sat down with our reporter to discuss his formative years in Bari, Italy, his career and the current state of his work.

“The reason I’m successful is because a lot of my clients follow me for a long time. I’ve got a clientele, follow me for 50 years. I don’t want to give up my age, but for 50 years,” said La Fronza, who said he was just a kid when he started working in hair salons.

“You can’t say no to the clientele you build up over the years. You know, when they call and say, ‘I want a haircut, Frank,’ you know, you become a friend with the customers. They’re not just customers after a while.”

Born in Italy, La Fronza followed family tradition by becoming a barber, taking up the same profession as his late uncle whom he was named after. He has worked in the United States for more than 55 years.

Frank’s famous clients and friends smile out from under framed photos on his walls. The likes of Sophia Loren, Frank Sinatra and celebrity clients like Steve Guttenberg, John Ratzenberger, Jack Brickhouse and

Harry Caray have all sat in his chair over the years.

His secret he says is that “you’ve got to keep steady every day. You know, it’s memorable all the time. I get up in the morning and I come to work. That’s a good memory, you know? Every day is — if you really like what you’re doing, you like your customers, then you build that business up.”

“I want to please the customers, but sometimes, when they’re vain, you’ve got

to read between the lines of what they want, and so you’ve got to be very careful and then you can see the smile on the customers. Then I say, ‘Oh, he probably likes what I’m doing.’ ”

“He cuts my hair better than anybody ever has,” says longtime client John Mann. “And we’ve become friends and we are on the same page when it comes to my hair.

And now I bring my son here — who’s 17 — and he’s been coming here for the last three years and gets exactly what he wants.”

## Small accessible repairs for seniors

The Chicago Dept. of Housing's Small Accessible Repairs for Seniors Program provides small repairs that increase home safety, security, and accessibility for seniors who are 60 years of age and older, and earn no more than 80% of the area medium income.

Once city officials make an on-site assessment to determine service needs, they may provide limited home improvements at no cost to the applicant.

Repair services are limited to minor improvements that may include: installation of grab bars, lever faucets, door repairs, smoke and carbon monoxide detector installations, and construction of wheelchair ramps.

Due to the high volume of requests and difficulty finding laborers, wait times for wheelchair ramp installations

have greatly increased. The program provides free ramp installations on the exterior of the home.

# Your tax dollars up in smoke, mayor's gas card initiative squeaks by

During [the April 27] City Council meeting, Mayor Lori Lightfoot sought to move forward her Chicago Moves initiative - a prepaid debit card lottery to be spent on gas or public transportation, in response to Willie Wilson's gas giveaway. It passed 26-23. I voted against it.


My opposition was based on [the idea] that it incentivizes more carbon emissions and subsidizes gas spending - the 40th Ward is comprised of neighbors who are clear about the importance of putting our environment first. Neighbors here have worked with our office to double the tree trim crews, to plant more trees, to inoculate our Ash Tree canopy, and were just as clear in their opposition to this initiative.

It would [also] be a waste of government resource and taxpayer dollars. When Willie Wilson spends millions of dollars to court voters by giving away gas at the pump, he is paying out of his own pocket.

When Mayor Lightfoot spends \$12.5 million to give out gas cards - it's coming out of your pocket. With our deficits being what they have been and the city betting on Casino revenue that has yet to pass, that deficit increases and the other way to pay it is by increasing your taxes.

As many of us have been fighting to provide resources to those that need it (for affordable housing, mental health services, substance abuse support, for Ash Tree inoculation), we are told time and time again that the funds aren't available. [But] when Willie Wilson starts giving out gas, we suddenly find the money as a city to do the same? It doesn't add up.

Finally, it isn't equitable - the threshold for being able to enter the lottery is 100% of the average median income. If this was truly about equity, it would go to those who need it the most, and the threshold would have been lower than that of the average median income.

# Pulp fiction celebrating 100 years of Fiction House, Windy City Pulp and Paper Convention starts May 6

You may have heard of Spider-Man, Batman, and Luke Skywalker but much of their inspirations go back to the days of "pulp" which included characters like Doc Savage, The Shadow, and Flash Gordon, respectively.

These earlier icons will be honored along with all the other larger than life heroes of the pulps at the 21st Windy City Pulp and Paper Convention which will be held May 6-8, at the Westin Lombard Yorktown Center in Lombard.

The three-day event draws hundreds of aficionados from all across the country to celebrate this uniquely American form of popular literature. Attendees hear from pulp-fiction historians, see original vintage pulp art displays, watch films adapted from the great pulp stories, bid on rare pulps and pop culture artifacts and peruse over 150 tables of hard-to-find collectibles including rare issues of such publications as Adventure, Astounding, Black Mask, Doc Savage, The Shadow, Spicy Detective, Weird Tales, and thousands more. In addition, pulps, paperbacks, and other vintage material will be for sale in the

dealer's room.

Pulp magazines are inexpensive fiction magazines that were published from 1896 through the 1950s, which thrived in the years between the two World Wars, vied with radio and the movies as the era's most popular form of mass entertainment. These periodicals, printed on coarse pulpwood paper and boasting eye-grabbing, often lurid cover paintings, introduced to the

American reading public such immortal writers as Dashiell Hammett, Zane Grey, Raymond Chandler, Ray Bradbury, L. Ron Hubbard, Robert E. Howard, H. P. Lovecraft, and Robert Heinlein.

The term "pulp" derives from the cheap wood pulp paper on which the magazines were printed; in contrast, magazines printed on higher quality paper were called "glossies" or "slicks."

In their first decades, pulps were most often priced at 10¢ per magazine, while competing slicks cost 25¢ a piece. Pulps were the successors to the penny dreadfuls, dime-novels and short fiction magazines of the 19th century.

Modern superhero comic books are sometimes considered descendants of "hero pulps" and widely recognized as the inspirations for such pop-culture mainstays as Star Trek, Star Wars, and virtually every comic-book hero from Batman to Spider-Man to Zorro (who originated in the pulps).

The Friday night auction features 200 lots of material from the estate of famed collector Robert Weinberg, while the Saturday night auction begins with 111 lots from the estate of Glenn Lord, literary executor for the Robert E. Howard estate, followed by nearly 70 more lots from other consignors. And additional lots will be added to the Saturday night auction at the convention, to include material consigned there by convention attendees.

Among the highlights in this year's auctions are numerous issues of Weird Tales,

including several Conan issues, many in good condition (likely publisher file copies); Robert E. Howard's incredibly scarce first book, "A Gent from Bear Creek"; fewer than 20 copies are known to exist; handwritten postcard from H.P. Lovecraft to Robert E. Howard; several letters to Robert E. Howard; a rare letter from Weird Tales editor Farnsworth Wright to one of Weird Tales' artists, James Napoli, from 1935;

other signed items by H.P. Lovecraft, Clark Ashton Smith, August Derleth, Otis Adelbert Kline, Virgil Finlay, Andre Norton, Max Brand, Manly Wade Wellman, Upton Sinclair, Spider author Norvell Page and many others.

There will also be complete runs of the pulps Planet Stories, Captain Future, Amazing Stories Quarterly, Strange Tales, Golden Fleece, Tales of Wonder and Fantastic Story; many rare U.K. and Australian science fiction pulps and books; numerous Robert E. Howard and H.P. Lovecraft items; rare items by Clark Ashton Smith, including "Ebony and Crystal," "The Black Book of Clark Ashton Smith," "The Double Shadow and Other Fantasies," and many early Arkham House books.

Friday through Sunday, the massive dealer room will be buzzing, bursting with 180 six-foot-long tables, with roughly 100 dealers from the U.S., Canada and the U.K. displaying pulps, vintage paperbacks, science fiction, fantasy and mystery hardcovers, golden and silver age comics, original illustration art, and movie memorabilia.

The art show will feature a great display of art from the pulps published by Fiction House. ## The new liquor license would expand options for outdoor entertainment

A measure was introduced to City Council April 27 to expand outdoor entertainment options for businesses, residents, and visitors by creating an Outdoor Entertainment Venue liquor license.

The Morton Salt Shed at 1357 N. Elston Ave., is the first prospective Outdoor Entertainment Venue recipient.

This new license permits the operation of outdoor concert/entertainment venues by allowing the sale of alcohol and permitting amplified sound outside.

These outdoor venues may host entertainment on private property and have an outdoor capacity of at least 3,000 people. Sports stadiums are exempt from the new license. An outdoor entertainment venue would be required to obtain one of these liquor licenses, as well as a Public Place of Amusement License.

The Chicago Department of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection [BACP], would require that Outdoor Entertainment Venues also be licensed in accordance with the liquor and amusement codes outlined in the Municipal Code of Chicago. In addition to BACP reviewing the applications, the City will review the zoning requirements of proposed locations.

In the past, Chicago has offered visitors and residents some of the best live music and events in unique and historical entertainment venues. The addition of the new outdoor entertainment venue liquor license may aid Chicago’s entertainment industry.

“The creation of this new liquor license provides a framework for the City’s future cultural and economic growth,” said BACP Cmsr. Kenneth J. Meyer. “This is an opportunity for music venue operators to expand into new and historic locations across the city.”

Loevy and his business partners have filed an application to open a 6,585-square foot marijuana shop in The Square Shopping Center, 2301 W. Lawrence Ave.

The space is currently not zoned for such a business and Loevy has requested a zoning change from Ald. Martin.

The recreational pot shop would operate under a state-issued license and would be open from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. To operate, the shop will need a Special Use permit from the city’s zoning board of appeals. The strip mall includes 38 parking spaces, according to an application filed by

Loevy with Martin’s 47th Ward Zoning Advisory Council.

On Feb. 24, Loevy held a virtual community meeting with Martin’s office, and it is expected the alderman will soon announce his decision.

Old Town School of Folk Music, Davis Theater, Gene’s Sausage, Merz Apothecary and dozens of other businesses. That parking lot has also served as space for

Lincoln Square’s annual festivals, including German Day, Maifest and AppleFest. It also serves as much-needed parking for those who attend the weekly Lincoln Square Farmers Market, which annually ranks among the city’s best-attended.

In addition to Martin and Dordek, Loevy has also contributed \$500 to 47th Ward Committeeman Paul Rosenfeld and \$1,000 to Jon Stromsta, a judicial candidate supported by Rosenfeld.

Loevy’s company currently operates 11 marijuana shops in Pennsylvania, Missouri and Utah. Another location is planned for Benton Harbor, MI. The company plans to open 10 stores throughout Illinois.

## Driver who intentionally hit bicyclist in Uptown gets 2-year sentence

A Chicago man has pleaded guilty to aggravated battery with a deadly weapon for intentionally driving into a bicyclist during a road rage dispute in Uptown last year, according to court records. Lenard Cribbs, 21, also pleaded guilty to a separate misdemeanor gun violation, which was plead down from a felony.

Cribbs will not spend any time in prison after receiving credit for the year he spent on electronic monitoring.

On April 7, 2021, the victim was riding in the bike lane on the 1000 block of W. Wilson when he came upon several cars at a stoplight. As he slowed down to pass the cars, a red Ford sedan drove into the bike lane and nearly struck him, Assistant State's Attorney Brian Burkhardt said during a bond hearing last year.

The bicyclist threw his hands up, asked the driver what he was doing, and then continued riding westbound. Suddenly, the Ford came speeding up in the bike lane behind the cyclist, striking the back end of the bike with enough force to "crush" it, according to Burkhardt. A CPD surveillance camera recorded the incident.

Two witnesses in another car called 911 and followed the Ford until police caught up with them and pulled Cribbs over.

EMS took the victim to Swedish Hospital with a mild concussion and injuries to his right elbow and lower back, Burkhardt said.

Less than a month earlier, Cribbs was released on a recognizance bond after prosecutors charged him with aggravated unlawful use of a weapon. Police said he admitted that a gun they found in a backpack during a traffic stop belonged to him.

Cribbs reached a deal with prosecutors and pleaded guilty to the aggravated battery charge and the reduced gun count this month.

Judge Thomas Byrne sentenced him to two years for striking the bicyclist and 364 days for the gun offense. The two-year sentence was reduced by 50% per state law. Electronic monitoring credits offset both jail sentences, records show.

Cribbs reported to Stateville Correctional Center on April 14 and was released the same day, according to the Illinois Dept. of Corrections website.

## Two charged with driving vehicle hijacked in Lakeview

Prosecutors charged two men with driving a car after it was taken from a 77-year-old Lincolnwood man during a carjacking in Lakeview on April 23. Lawrence Dear and Dashawn Bowman are both charged with felony possession of a stolen motor vehicle. Neither man is accused of participating in the hijacking.

The victim was sitting in the back seat of his white Toyota Camry on the 3400 block of N. Ashland around 2:52 p.m. when a man opened the back door, stuck a hard object in his back, and demanded his property, a CPD spokesperson said. After the victim stepped out of the car, two carjackers climbed in and drove away westbound on Roscoe St., according to the spokesperson.

About 90 minutes later, a CPD li-

cense plate reader spotted the stolen car in traffic and cops began tracking it via POD cameras, Assistant State's Attorney Loukas Kalliantasis said.

The camera operators saw the vehicle park on the 5500 block of S. Loomis. Bowman stepped out of the driver's seat and three other men, including Dear, exited the other seats and they all walked into a nearby home, according to Kalliantasis.

Minutes later, Dear allegedly returned to the car and drove away. He pulled over for police down the street, but he backed into their car and drove away as they walked up to the vehicle.

Cops arrested him after he allegedly crashed into a cement post and ran from the scene.

Meanwhile, other officers knocked on the door of the home that the men entered. A woman who owns the building allowed police to come inside and arrest Bowman, according to a CPD report.

Prosecutors charged Dear with aggravated assault in addition to the stolen vehicle count for allegedly backing into the police squad car.

They said Bowman has a pending possession of a stolen motor vehicle case in juvenile court.

Judge Barbara Dawkins said the men could go home on electronic monitoring by posting \$3,000 toward their \$30,000 bail amounts.

## Man sexually attacked Streeterville woman as she walked home from House of Blues

On April 26, Prosecutors charged a man with sexually attacking a Streeterville woman who was walking home from a show at the House of Blues over the weekend. Police arrested Joshua Almore, 31, after a man called

911 upon seeing the attack while walking his dog, said Assistant State's Attorney James Murphy. The alleged victim, 57, walked home from the House of Blues at Marina City around 1:30 a.m. April 24, because she could not find a cab. Somewhere along the way, Almore approached her and started talking to the woman, but she told him to go away, Murphy said. Instead, Almore continued to follow her.

About a block from her home, the woman tripped. Almore "jumped on her and took her to the ground," Murphy said. He allegedly straddled the woman, lifted her shirt, kissed her breasts and licked her nipple.

At that point, the man who was walking a dog heard the woman screaming for help and say, "rape," according to Murphy. The witness confronted Almore and told him to get off, but he didn't, Murphy said.

Police arrived within a minute of the witness' 911 call while Almore was still standing over the woman, Murphy continued.

Almore allegedly told police he had been drinking and approached the woman for a "consensual encounter" and put his hand up her shirt.

The woman suffered a broken wrist and significant bruising on her legs and head because of the attack, Mur-

phy said.

Almore faces one felony count of criminal sexual abuse.

His defense attorney, who called the allegations "clearly out of character," said he lives with three roommates and buses tables for a restaurant at Trump Tower.

Judge Kelly McCarthy set bail at \$250,000 with electronic monitoring. Almore must post 10% of that amount to go home on an ankle monitor.

## Two men shot in Lincoln Square

Police are investigating a double-shooting in the Bowmanville neighborhood of Lincoln Square April 28.

The two men arrived at Swedish Hospital in a van around 1:15 a.m. They told officers they were sitting in the van on the 1900 block of W. Balmoral when a gunman approached and began shooting at them about 15 minutes earlier.

Investigators found shell casings and broken glass on Balmoral. The men's van had bullet holes in it and broken windows, according to an officer at the hospital.

A 43-year-old man suffered a gunshot wound to his right arm. Police said he was in fair condition. Online records show he has a home address on the same block where the shooting occurred.

The other man, age 27, is in serious condition with gunshot wounds to his right hand and back, police said.

Area Three detectives are investigating.

According to the city's Violence Reduction Dashboard, the victims are the third and fourth persons shot in Lincoln Square this year. That's up from three victims at this point last year.

On April 20, a 24-year-old woman was critically injured after someone shot her in the backyard of a home on the 2400 block of W. Eastwood. Some witnesses reported that she was shot in an exchange of gunfire between at least two men.

## Red Line robber arrested when cops spot him outside Lakeview police station

It's pretty easy to get away with robbery in Chicago. But your odds diminish slightly if you hang out in front of the local police station while cops are actively looking for you.

Just ask the 17-year-old cops arrested outside the Town Hall (19th) Police District station — about 30 minutes after two robbers attacked a 64-year-old man a block away at the Addison Red Line CTA station on April 26.

The victim told police the offenders approached him inside the CTA station, 940 W. Addison, and demanded his property around 8:45 p.m., CPD said. One robber punched him in the face, which caused him to fall and hit his head on the station wall. EMS took the victim to Advocate Illinois Masonic Medical Center in good condition.

Officers in the CTA's security operations center provided street cops with descriptions of two robbers, including one said to be between 17- and 20-years-old and wearing a blue hoodie that said "Just Do It" on the front.

The same offenders were wanted for another robbery that happened about 45 minutes earlier at the Thornedale station.

At least two Town Hall cops remembered seeing the "Just Do It" guy walking toward the district station before the Addison robbery call came out, according to radio transmissions. And, at 9:19 p.m., a district tactical unit spotted the 17-year-old wearing the same sweatshirt directly outside the police station. They took him into custody.

So far, though, he is not charged with the Addison Red Line attack. He is, however, charged with the Thornedale crime, according to a CPD

spokesperson.

In that case, a 28-year-old woman said she was riding a southbound train when two men took her phone and fled the train. She was not injured.

Prosecutors charged the 17-year-old with felony robbery and misdemeanor theft of lost or mislaid property. Detectives are still investigating the Addison Red Line attack.

The second suspect remains at large. He was described as Black male between 17- and 20-years-old wearing a gray hoodie, black pants, black shoes, and a black mask.

## Man found dead inside downtown Chicago police station

A 46-year-old man was found dead inside a Chicago Police Department station on April 26, according to internal communications provided to this reporter by a source.

An officer at the Central 1st Police District station, 1718 S. State, requested an ambulance for an unresponsive man in the lobby at 8 a.m., according to police dispatch records.

CPD's internal notification said they found the man in a lobby bathroom, which is accessible to the public. He was subsequently pronounced dead.

Detectives are conducting a death investigation and a medical examiner's case has been opened. A source familiar with the situation said no unusual circumstances were apparent.

A CPD spokesperson said the police report was not yet finalized and they could not provide any information about the incident at mid-morning.

The Central District encompasses most of the area between the Chicago River, Lake Michigan, 31st Street, and the expressways. It includes Grant and Millennium Parks, neighborhoods like the Loop and South Loop, and parts of Bronzeville and the West Loop.

## Two-time felon fired a gun during a wild shootout on the Near North Side, but only charged with a misdemeanor

All was well April 24 on the Near North Side. The weather was pretty nice. People were playing with their dogs in Durso Park. Then, all hell broke loose.

"As a witness, I would estimate that greater than 50 shots were fired — perhaps 100," a reader told this reporter April 26. "Automatic weapons were clearly in use and shots were randomly fired throughout the neighborhood — hitting cars and buildings, but fortunately no people."

"Given the weather, it was very busy and I saw many terrified people running for cover. The firepower was so intense that at least three condo buildings in River North more than five blocks away had windows shot out. It truly is a miracle that no one was hit."

The shootout unfolded around 6:10 p.m. on the 800 block of N. Sedgwick, according to CPD records. Police dispatchers told cops the 911 switchboard was blowing up with calls of shots fired from the area.

"I have 23 tickets on the board for shots fired," a dispatcher said as the calls rolled in.

Moody Bible Institute reportedly put its campus on lockdown.

And, yes, bullets really did hit high-rise residential windows blocks away.

As it turns out, police arrested a man who allegedly admitted that he fired some of the shots. Officers also recovered a gun that he reportedly said was his. He's a twice-convicted felon who is barred by law from possessing a firearm.

He's charged with a misdemeanor.

When cops arrived at the scene, they found shell casings in the intersection of Sedgwick and Locust streets. Witnesses provided cops with descriptions of two suspects — a man

and a woman — who ran from a shot-up silver Chevy Equinox that was sitting in the street, said Assistant State's Attorney Zebulon Black.

Helpfully, two people told cops that a man and woman had just run into the woman's restroom of a nearby "ghost kitchen."

Black said police found Anthony Newman, 20, inside the restroom. There was a handgun in the garbage bin next to him, according to Black. There were no bullets in it.

After being advised of his right to remain silent, Newman told police he put the gun in the trash can and admitted he shot at some other people "to protect himself and his wife," according to Black. He allegedly said he ran into the bathroom to see if he had been shot.

Newman also told police he carries a gun for protection and he would be dead if he didn't shoot back, Black alleged.

The prosecutor also told Judge David Navarro that Newman was convicted of aggravated robbery in 2019 and possession of a stolen motor vehicle in 2020, both of which are felonies.

Yet, Newman is only charged with a misdemeanor count of possessing a firearm without a valid Firearm Owner's ID card.

Navarro pointed out that, as a convicted felon, Newman couldn't get an FOID card if he wanted to.

"This is charged as a misdemeanor," Navarro said, with a bit of wonder in his voice.

Newman's public defender said he has two children and works part-time as an Uber Eats delivery driver.

Navarro set bail at \$10,000. Newman must post 10% of that to get out of jail.

Chicago police took at least three reports for criminal damage to condo and apartment windows after the shootout: on the 400 block of W. Huron, the 300 block of W. Superior, and the 300 block of W. Erie. They also took a report for a car that was hit by gunfire at Huron and Orleans.

"This truly was a terrifying event for those present," the witness said. "Just another example of a complete disregard for the safety and quality of life of city residents."

## Prosecutors cut a sweet deal with man accused of sexually assaulting two women and robbing a third while on parole

Tyrone Robinson worked out a sweet deal with prosecutors.

In Feb. 2018, prosecutors charged him with sexually assaulting a woman in Wrigleyville, sexually assaulting another woman in the South Loop, and robbing yet another woman in the South Loop. It all allegedly happened during a six-week period while he was on parole for burglary and aggravated battery of a peace officer.

Prosecutors this month agreed to reduce the South Loop sexual assault to Class 1 kidnapping and dropped the Wrigleyville allegations all together. As a bonus, he'll serve the kidnapping and robbery sentences concurrently.

Robinson, now 30, was accused of grabbing a 26-year-old woman from behind, covering her mouth with his hand, and dragging her into an alley on the 900 block of W. Cornelia at 1:10 a.m. Feb. 3, 2018. Police said the attacker asked the victim if

## Death of man attacked in Wrigleyville was a homicide, medical examiner rules

Sergio Ontiveros, the California man who died eight days after being punched and falling to the ground outside a Wrigleyville bar in January, succumbed to head and brain injuries he suffered in an assault, according to the Cook County medical examiner's office. His death has been ruled a homicide.

Ontiveros, 51, lived in Beverly Hills and is the father of a child with Tamla Robinson, the daughter of Motown singing legend Smokey Robinson, according to online tributes by his family and friends. The medical examiner previously listed his hometown as Victorville, Calif.

Police responded to a call of a person down and found Ontiveros lying in the 3500 block of N. Clark around 1:20 a.m. Jan. 17, Officer Steve Rusanov told this reporter on the day of the incident. A witness told the officers that an offender punched Ontiveros, according to Rusanov.

Officers in the Town Hall 19th Police District's surveillance operations center located footage that showed an apparent fight breaking out and Ontiveros being pushed to the ground, according to CPD radio traffic. The offenders then ran from the scene, the camera operators said.

After Ontiveros was down, other people came by, picked through his pockets, and left the

area before cops arrived, the officers said.

Ontiveros was taken to Advocate Illinois Masonic Medical Center, where he succumbed to his injuries on Jan. 25, according to the medical examiner.

"He easily lit up any room he walked into and his presence never went unnoticed," said a GoFundMe established by a family friend to offset hospital bills and other expenses. "His big personality touched the hearts of many people, from his humor to the love he had for his kids."

Ontiveros' daughter with Tamla Robinson, Lyric Ontiveros, posted a tribute to her father on Insta-

## Prolific fitness center burglar tells cops he's been breaking into several lockers a week for five years

Hector Roman has been arrested again. You may remember Roman, a prolific burglar who is on parole for 10 felonies related to fitness center locker room break-ins across Chicagoland. Prosecutors say he used stolen credit cards to fund a financial crime enterprise.

We reported last month that Roman, 21, had been charged with breaking into another fitness center locker and using the victim's credit cards to buy gift cards just a few weeks after he got out of prison for 10 locker break-ins. The state did not revoke his parole last month and Judge Barbara Dawkins allowed him to go home on electronic monitoring by posting a \$1,000 bail deposit.

Guess what happened three days after he got out of jail?

He cut off his electronic monitoring band and escaped, prosecutors said. He was allegedly

burglarizing lockers, until cops caught up with him April 16.

But a record in his latest court file contains a lot of information about how and why Roman does what he does. It also says he told investigators he's been breaking into several lockers a week for five years as a source of income.

On March 29, exactly a week after he got out of jail on electronic monitoring, Roman walked into XSport, 3030 N. Broadway,

and broke into a locker, according to prosecutors and police records. Video cameras recorded him entering and leaving.

He allegedly stole credit cards from inside, then went to the

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# Irish-American Hall of Fame 2022 inductees

Two noted local priests, a pair of Kennedys, a Presidential Medal of Freedom recipient, a "Residential Hometown Hero," and a Chicago-raised Irish fiddler, composer and recording artist

were among the recipients of the 2011-2020 Irish American Hall of Fame April 30 at the Irish American Heritage Center, 4626 N. Knox.

Msgr. John "Jack" Egan was well-known for his challenges against racial discrimination, unfair housing, predatory lending and unfair labor practices, he also worked on promoting lay leadership in the Church.

Father Egan, who died in 2001, was awarded this year's Hall of Religious work.

Another well-noted priest, Fr. James Mage's Maguire, who received this year's Education Award, was Loyola University's 20th president during a period of memorable expansion.

By 1970, Loyola had become the largest Catholic university in the U.S., with 14,000 students. After retiring in 1976, he continued lining up donors. He died in 2000 at age 95.

This year's Art's and Humanities recipient was another Chicagoan, Liz Carrol, noted for her fiddling, and compositions who had already received a National Heritage Fellowship Award for her great influence on Irish music in the U.S.

Another Kennedy, Ambassador


McDonough is also credited with the practice of singing "Take Me Out to the Ball Game" during the Seventh Inning Stretch.

Mariano's downstairs to buy a \$400 gift card.

Investigators also linked him to another XSport locker room burglary from Feb. 24, prosecutors said. That was at the chain's 5515 W. Irving Park Rd. location.

He allegedly used a stolen membership card to get inside, then used freshly-stolen credit cards to buy a \$400 gift card at Walgreens.

Prosecutors said investigators identified Roman through a "Critical Reach" bulletin. That's an all-points bulletin network that shares information across jurisdictions. The network identified seven suburban police departments stretching from Glenview to St. Charles with fitness center burglaries to Roman, according

to a court record.

After cops arrested Roman last week on the 1200 block of N. Pulaski, he allegedly pushed past an aide in the police station lockup and tried to run out the front door. Prosecutors said cops arrested him as he reached the station's front desk.

On April 27, prosecutors charged him with felony burglary, felony escape from a peace officer, escape from electronic monitoring, and misdemeanor battery.

Judge Kelly McCarthy ordered him held on \$150,000 bail for the burglary and another \$150,000 for the escape from electronic monitoring charge. He will also be held without bail for violating the terms of bond in the burglary case he picked up last month.

A document in Roman's latest

court file said he told investigators this week that he has broken in to several lockers every week for five years to support himself. (Quick math: If he scored a \$400 gift card after each break-in, he would be making over \$100,000 a year.)

"Roman stated it is easy to sneak into XSport and LA Fitness locations when the staff is not watching," the document said. "Roman states he has never been challenged by staff when entering these locations."

Roman also allegedly told police he thinks fitness centers are a good place to commit crime because the facilities cannot put surveillance cameras inside locker rooms.

He allegedly told cops, "opening locks is very easy to do with his hands and his strength ...

using the leverage of the locker to assist."


gram shortly after his death.

she had any money on her and the woman gave him about \$20.

CPD issued an unusually detailed account of what happened next:

The offender pushed the victim up against a garbage can and pulled down [the] victim's pants. The victim was able to pull her pants back

up. The offender pulled the victim down steps onto the porch of the garden apartment at the 3500 block of N. Wilton. The offender pushed the victim down, pulled out his penis and put his penis in the victim's face. The victim stated the offender had a condom on.

The victim was made to touch the offender's penis.

Nearby residents interrupted the attack, police said. Cops, aided by video from several Lakeview bars, arrested Robinson a few days later.

Investigators then linked him to another attack in the South Loop from a few weeks earlier. In that case, prosecutors said, he grabbed a 19-year-old woman from behind on the 300 block of West Roosevelt. He allegedly forced her into a stairwell, then robbed and sexually assaulted her.

A few weeks later, he allegedly robbed a 33-year-old woman of her purse on the 1400 block of S. Federal.

Cops reportedly connected him to all three crimes through video footage.

Prosecutors dropped the Wrigleyville case entirely during a court hearing this month, court records show. That included 19 felonies, including kidnapping, aggravated criminal sexual assault, aggravated criminal sexual abuse, rob-

bery, and aggravated battery – strangulation.

During the same court session, Robinson pleaded guilty to kidnapping-secretly confining in exchange for a six-year sentence for the South Loop sexual assault and robbery case. Prosecutors dropped 12 other felonies in the deal, including multiple counts of aggravated criminal sexual assault, kidnapping, and robbery.

He received 14 years for mugging the other woman in the South Loop.

Judge Domenica Stephenson oversaw the case and sentenced Robinson. She gave him credit for 1,524 days that he spent in custody before pleading and ordered the prison terms to be served concurrently. Officials will reduce his sentence by 50% for good behavior. His parole date is set for Jan. 17, 2025.

**Dead 18-year-old in a shootout at Streeterville hotel**

Chicago police have released new details about a shooting that left a man dead inside a Streeterville hotel May 1. More than a dozen shots were fired during the incident around 5 a.m. in a second-floor hallway at Sonesta ES Suites, 201 E. Walton.

Chief of Detectives Brendan Deenihan said a group of women rented a hotel room and then went down an emergency exit to allow several men inside. Portions of this were captured on video, Deenihan said.

A confrontation began when the men arrived on the second floor, leading to a shootout in the hallway. Officers at the scene said they found at least 16 shell casings throughout the second-floor hallway with bullet holes along the walls.

An 18-year-old man was killed. He has not been publicly identified. Police found a handgun next to him, according to Deenihan.

He said investigators are trying to track down

**Dozens of rounds fired in Loop shooting, four injured**

Four people were shot when two gunmen opened fire on an SUV in the Loop May 3, according to police. It happened at the intersection of Wells St. and Ida B. Wells at 1:37 a.m.

Police said three of the victims were riding in a blue Dodge Durango when it stopped for a red light. Two gunmen on the sidewalk then began shooting at the vehicle.

Cops said they found between 30 and 40 shell casings at the scene, including some rifle rounds.

A 26-year-old woman who was crossing the street suffered a gunshot wound to her leg. EMS took her to Stroger Hospital in good condition.

The other three victims arrived at Stroger in the Durango a few minutes after the shooting. According to CPD,

a 38-year-old man suffered a gunshot wound to his back. He was in critical condition; a 31-year-old woman was shot in her legs and back. She was also in critical condition, and a 28-year-old woman received gunshot wounds to her left leg.

The driver of the Durango fled from the hospital after dropping the victims off. Illinois State Police later located it on the Eisenhower Expy. and detained its driver near the Cook County Courthouse in Maywood.

Tuesday's victims are the sixth, seventh, eighth, and ninth persons shot in the Loop this year. There were five shooting victims in the Loop at this time last year, including one that was self-inflicted. At this point in 2020, the Loop had three shooting victims from a single incident in a subway tunnel. In 2019, there were three shooting victims for the full year, two of which were determined to be self-defense.

**Carjacker arrested after sending Northwestern's Chicago campus into brief lockdown**

An armed carjacking on the North Side ended with an arrest in Streeter-ville on May 2 — but not until Northwestern Univ. briefly put one of its buildings on lockdown. No injuries were reported.

It all started at 12:48 p.m. on the 2000 block of W. Arthur in West Rogers Park when a hijacker confronted a driver with a black handgun and took their red Mazda 6, according to a CPD report.

The carjacker drove away with the Mazda, followed by a silver car that was driven by an accomplice.

CPD license plate readers quickly located the Mazda on southbound Lake Shore Dr. Cops intercepted it at Chicago Ave. just after 1 p.m. and a 19-year-old man ran from the vehicle. Northwestern transmitted an active threat for its Chicago campus,

advising people to "Run, Hide, Fight. Take proper shelter. Lock and/or barricade doors" while CPD and Northwestern Univ. Police searched for the hijacker.

A subsequent all-clear message said police apprehended the suspect in the basement of the Ward Building, which is part of Northwestern's medical school.

Chicago later tweeted a photo of a firearm lying on the car's floorboard. Charges are pending as detectives investigate.

**Victims of Loop double-shooting were not the intended targets**

The two men who were shot in an alley near the Chicago Theatre on May 1 were not the intended targets of the gunfire, Chicago police said Monday.

CPD Chief of Detectives Brendan Deenihan said the events leading up to the shooting began moments earlier when three men robbed or stole property from three other men inside

a Taco Bell on the 100 block of N. Wabash, said CPD Supt. David Brown.

The three robbery victims chased the three thieves outside and then began shooting at the offenders, Deenihan said. Those rounds traveled down Benton Place and struck two men who were standing outside the theater's back entrance.

A 55-year-old man, who was on break from his job as a stagehand at the theater, suffered a gunshot wound to his ear. Deenihan said the bullet exited the back of the man's neck. Another bullet struck a 27-year-old man in the right hand. Both men are in good condition.

Deenihan said CPD may release video or still images of the shooting suspects.

A source with knowledge of the investigation said the Taco Bell incident involved a stick-up crew that targeted some local drug dealers.

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

## Did Gold Coast 'home invasion victim' actually shoot himself?

Police now believe that a man who said home invaders shot him inside his Gold Coast apartment April 29 actually shot himself, according to sources familiar with the investigation.

"It's one of those that is not what it seems like," one source said, characterizing the incident as a "drug deal gone wrong."

The 34-year-old man originally told police three men blasted him with pepper spray and shot him in the hand after he answered a knock on his 15th floor apartment door a round 11:37 a.m., according to a CPD statement that was issued shortly after the incident.

He went on to say the masked men took some of his property. Witnesses saw a white box truck fleeing the scene and cops went to the vehicle's registered address in Cicero to ask questions.

But sources now say police believe the so-called home invaders may have been conducting a drug transaction when the man shot himself in the hand.

"They took his gun and ran," after the shooting one source said.

Chicago police confirmed that their investigation is now leaning toward a self-inflicted injury, but the department declined to provide further specifics about what detectives believe transpired.

second on April 5 at Truman College, 1145 W. Wilson Ave., Mayor Lightfoot was pressed by residents over safety and violence issues in the city.

She told the assembled crowds that, "We know that 2021 was not a year that any of us can feel proud of when it comes to public safety, and the superintendent [Brown] and I, and others here, have really re-committed ourselves to hold ourselves more accountable."

As police staffing has fallen over the last two mayoral administrations, City Hall has started to lean hard on other institutions to provide policing for their communities. Private security affiliated with Northwestern Hosp., the Univ. of Chicago, Loyola, DePaul and the Chicago Cubs all have been given police powers. And several North Side business groups and chambers of commerce, from the Gold Coast up to Lakeview, are funding private sector efforts as well.

In Lakeview, Ald. Tom Tunney [44th] openly criticized former Mayor Rahm Emanuel over the loss of officers in the Townhall 19th District that serves his community. He frequently demanded Emanuel place more police officers at Townhall. And he was not the only public official making those requests.

Over the last few years, this newspaper has frequently reported on dozens of instances when North Side alderman have said, "So-and-so' commander has agreed to increase patrols in the [fill in the bank] area' when commenting on a particularly egregious criminal incident that had just occurred. Every alderman now wants more police in their ward, but for a variety of mostly cultural and political reasons, the city can no longer adequately staff CPD district stations.

If hired by the Lincoln Park organizers, P4 Security would set up a channel on an instant messaging app, so all neighbors can communicate with the officer and "live stream to the Chicago Police Department," according to the flier.

suburbs," said Dart. "We're here in River North to bolster police presence, and we will continue to collaborate with CPD to create a safer downtown for everyone who works, visits, and lives here."

Sheriff Dart was joined by Deputy Mayor John O'Malley, CPD Supt. David O. Brown, Ald. Brian Hopkins [2nd], Cook County Cmsr. Bridget Degnen and Scott Britton, of the River North Residents Assoc., and the Magnificent Mile Assoc.

"The CPD and the Cook County Sheriff's Office share a long history of collaboration," said Supt. Brown. "This new office location in the city's central business district is just the latest example of our shared commitment to making our city and our county safer for all."

"I welcome Sheriff Dart's satellite office, and his partnership with our other law enforcement agencies," Ald. Hopkins said. "This office will provide additional resources to combat crime and mayhem in the Central Business District."

On April 23, massive crowds of rowdy youths created a chaotic scene at Millennium Park, leading to shootings and 19 arrests. And downtown workers and residents now fear that this spring and summer may provide repeated mob actions over and over again, since youth no longer fear the police and arrest. They know that nobody goes to jail anymore, and that many offenders are freed by Cook County Courts with no cash bail. Those Cook County deputies may now help step in and assist CPD officers manage the mob actions. They'll also focus on retail theft and looting incidents, helping CPD with evidence gathering and working to reduce the number of thefts at downtown stores.

### Lincoln Park 5-oh

In mid-April a flier started being circulated in Lincoln Park in which organizers said that they are planning to hire the private security patrol, and asking neighbors to chip in \$1,200 per household each year to help fund the effort.

It's not clear who all comprises the group behind the flier. But in a story published in Block Club, the flier was reportedly distributed to residents along Burling and Orchard streets, Arlington Pl. and Fullerton Ave.

The flier goes on to list rises in multiple quality of life crimes in Lincoln Park and crime statistics posted by one of this newspaper's reporters, CWBChicago. Those statistics, which this newspaper supports and publishes, frequently are at odds with 'official' stats, offered by City Hall and police brass.

According to Block Club's coverage, the group's flier said it hopes to address these crimes by partnering with P4 Security Solutions, a private security firm with offices in Downtown Chicago and Downers Grove, to deploy one officer in a marked vehicle to

patrol their streets for eight hours a day, every day of the year. Hours will vary and the patrol car will be parked in the area when not in use.

P4 Security already patrols another area of Lincoln Park, and the firm was hired in December to patrol a section of Bucktown. It advertises itself as "a trusted advisor for uncertain times."

The Bucktown Neighbors Assoc. hired P4 Security for \$190,000 a year, to have an armed off-duty or recently retired law enforcement officer supplement CPD after an increase in violent crime in the area. The program would aim to curb a rise in area violence, including carjackings, sexual assaults, strong-armed robberies and muggings.

During two recent community townhall meetings, the first on April 4 at Richard J. Daley College, 7500 S. Pulaski Rd., and

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The effort is expected to cost \$175,000 a year in addition to some one-time fees for setting the service up, according to the flier. Block Club reports that so far, neighbors claim to have raised 35% of that cost.

"If you are able to contribute more or less, that's fine," the flier states. "If 75% of the funds are raised by April 30, patrols could start May 15."

For many North Siders, political and social justice rhetoric will no longer salve the wounds. The virtue signaling ends quickly after your wife, mother or daughter gets carjacked. The problems are real and have become systemic. Those with the resources are now resorting to putting their money where their wounds are.

own a car.

High density buildings are designed to draw heavily on the used of shared car services, food delivery vehicles, delivery trucks from Amazon, US Postal, UPS, FedEx and other delivery services for residents who do not have their own vehicles.

As proposed, this buildings will rise 125', it will include 129 luxury apartments, while offering 80 bike parking spaces. On the ground floor at the corner of the building will be a residential lobby and small retail space fronting N. Orleans St. The parking lot would be located at the rear along the alley.

The facade is planned for a mix of metal and glass windows, metal paneling, brick, and stucco. Balconies will be incorporated at the corner of the building along the east facade overlooking the CTA L tracks, and should be quite noisy.

The developers are seeking to rezone the site from C1-5 to DX-5 and designate it as a planned development. The proposal will require approvals from the Chicago Plan Commission, Committee on Zoning, and full City Council. The project may also go before the Committee on Design. No timeline for construction has been announced.
