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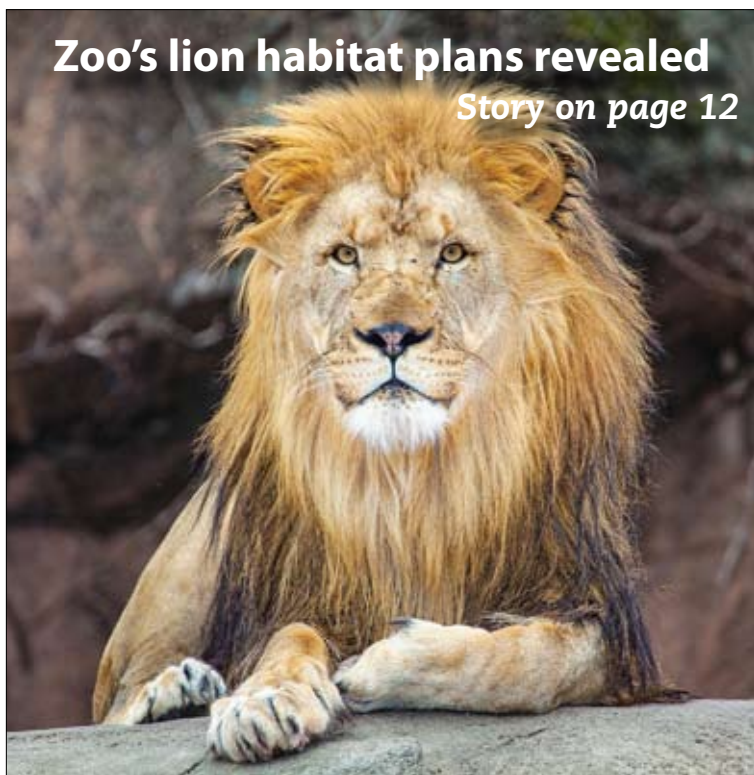

Police promise more arrests when “large groups” disrupt downtown

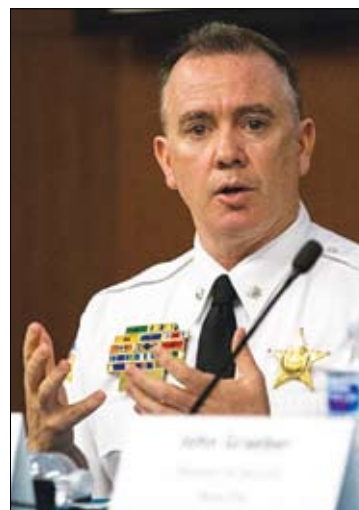
“We’ll take the heat all day long”

Although frustrated with a seemingly lenient court system, the commander of the Chicago Police Department’s 18th District says arrests will be made whenever large groups of young people travel downtown to stir up trouble.

“We’ll take the heat from it all day long,” said Cmdr. Daniel O’Shea at a forum on May 6 hosted by Streeterville Organization of Active Residents [SOAR]. “We monitor every... large group that comes down here and when we see criminal activity, we’re going to address it. We’re going to make the arrests.”

The most recent incidents happened on April 21 when 11 juveniles and two adults were arrested near the Magnificent Mile and in the Loop. On April 17, Chicago police estimated 500 teens and young adults moved through the

Loop, mainly on State St. between Randolph St. and Wacker Dr. Thirty one juveniles – 23 males and eight females, all of them 15 to 17 years old – were taken into custody along with six adults and charged with various offenses such as disorderly conduct, disorderly mob action, resisting arrest, and battery.

derly mob action, resisting arrest, and battery.

Young people fought among themselves and disrupted traffic. About 200 police officers were needed to deal with the crowd.

Of 21 people arrested near the Magnificent Mile on April 6, one was 11 years old. A 15-year-old girl was arrested for trying to punch a police officer. One teen brandished a realistic BB gun.

A real gun was pulled by a man, believed to be a security guard, on two younger men attacking him near McDonald’s at 10 E. Chicago Ave., next to the CTA Red Line station at Chicago & State.

According to O’Shea, police are monitoring social media, looking for signs that a large group is approaching downtown. If CTA personnel see groups jumping over turnstiles to get onto a train, O’Shea says they will be taken off the train at the next stop.

“Unfortunately, the Chicago Public Schools gives them [CTA] cards... to get to and from school,

River North’s OK Corral

Night club district becoming shooting gallery

At least 40 shots were fired between the occupants of two vehicles during an early-morning gunfight outside Cuvee nightclub, 308 W. Erie, in the River North neighborhood early on May 8.

Video posted online captures nearly 90 seconds of the action as the shots are fired and vehicles flee the scene. In less than a minute, police officers are on the scene with weapons drawn, telling the occupants of a white Rolls-Royce to put their hands up.

The Rolls continues driving forward even as an officer leans

on its hood with a weapon pointed at the driver.

The luxury car later crashed on the Ontario St. feeder ramp, and two occupants ran from the vehicle. One was arrested, the other is being sought, police said. The occupants of a black SUV that was involved in the incident are also still wanted by police.

Meanwhile, a man in a third vehicle became involved in a dispute with investigating officers and police arrested him as well, according to a police. Charges are pending against both men who are in custody, but CPD did not say if weapons charges were being sought against either man.

This incident took place just

Security plan announced for Millennium Park

This Summer season, Millennium Park will once again implement additional security measures designed to improve the visitor experience at the park and try to deal with the mobs of youth who have been descending on the downtown area to cause trouble.

Beginning this month, the City of Chicago will implement a security perimeter and bag check for all concerts and events that take place in Millennium Park. These strengthened security measures were developed with the City’s public safety officials, and will provide similar protections to other major events, trade shows, retail spaces and airports around the world.

Outside alcohol will also be prohibited at the six Jay Pritzker Pavilion events with the highest attendance, including the Chicago House Music Festival on

May 24-25; the Chicago Blues Festival from June 7-9; the Chicago Mariachi Festival on June 30; the Grant Park Music Festival Independence Day Salute on July 4; the Broadway In Chicago Summer Concert on Aug. 12; and the Chicago Jazz Festival from Aug. 29-Sept. 1. Outside alcohol will be allowed at the more than 70 public concerts and programs happening in Millennium Park this summer.

Visitors will have additional food and beverage options at various price points available for purchase inside the venue at the events where outside alcohol is restricted. Subject to bag search at the security perimeter, guests will continue to be allowed to bring their own food and non-alcoholic beverages to all events in Millennium Park.

Will ethics reform come soon enough to tame the most corrupt city in America?

Newly elected Mayor Lori Lightfoot promised that ethics reform will come to the City of Chicago and the old corrupt way of doing business will stop.

Her election win came amidst the recent scandal of an FBI investigation into Ald. Ed Burke [14th] for shaking down a business owner who wanted to do business in his ward, and disgraced former Ald. Danny Solis [25th], who wore a wire to get the goods on his buddies.

Several City Council election upsets, including ousting long-time North Side Ald. Pat O’Connor [40th], also tied to dubious real estate deals with his wife, and Lightfoot’s victory over political insider Toni Preckwinkle, showed voters are tired with the city’s Democrat political machine.

According to federal records and several other sources, Chicago is the most corrupt city in America. Will that change?

“I’m sure there will be more changes coming as time moves on,” Board of Ethics Chairman

William Conlon told The Daily Line.

Those changes include expanding the inspector general’s powers, and tightening the city’s ethics ordinance, campaign finance regulations and City Council rules.

While the ethics board has not proposed banning side jobs completely, it has proposed a ban on aldermen from representing clients with tax issues, bankruptcy or environmental proceedings affecting city revenue, or health, safety or welfare of Chicagoans, according to The Daily Line.

O’Connor watered down earlier proposals in the City Council to better police councilmen.

The Ethics Board to the City Council has proposed requiring all aldermanic disclosures to be sent to the Board of Ethics and published on its website. One of the jokes for the last few decades was Ald. Burke participating in Council hearings concerning businesses tied to his property tax law firm which he would then,

at the last minute, recuse himself from voting on. He recused himself hundreds of times because the city’s ethics law requires aldermen to disclose and abstain from voting on matters in which they have a financial interest.

Many North Side aldermen told this newspaper that they only have one full-time job to represent their constituents as opposed to a councilman making over six figures. Ald. Michele Smith [43rd] was forced into a runoff with an opponent who raised the issue about having a side job that paid her \$72,000 per year from her biggest donor. She said she no longer has the side job and returned the money.

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Clarendon Park Fieldhouse saved

Kudos to all involved for saving the circa-1916 Clarendon Park Fieldhouse, which thankfully, will not see the wrecking ball and instead be renovated and remain in the Uptown community.

Also called the Clarendon Community Center Park located at 4501 N. Clarendon Ave., the park sits on 12.64 acres of land and its fieldhouse contains a fitness center, a gymnasium, and several clubrooms. But it's

more than just the park's physical assets that are imperative to its neighborhood. You see, once upon a time, I was a Clarendon Park kid. I lived across the street, and it was a place where teens could go and hang and know we were safe. And there was a lot going on there... I remember the excitement when the rock 'n' roll band REO Speedwagon played softball on one of the fields.

But that isn't really why Clarendon Park means something to me.

It was Dec., 1972, and there I was, mind-ing my own business, ice skating at Clarendon Park. It was back in the day when the parks froze water and created rinks. Clarendon's rink was huge, and living so near it was easy for me to throw on my skates and hit the ice.

I was busy skating around and in my own world, when suddenly someone yanked my

stocking cap off. I look around and there were two very adorable guys, one of whom had my hat. The pair -- who were brothers -- started tossing the hat back and forth between them, laughing and smiling and teasing me. By the end of the day, one of them was walking me home.

Chip Dennis became the first love of my life for the next four years, thanks to a chance Clarendon Park meeting. So I'll always cherish my memories from there.

Oops, I'm daydreaming. Back to the present.

There will be a limited renovation of the fieldhouse, which will bring it into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act. A new lobby and elevator will be added and ongoing issues like water leakage

will be addressed. There is supposed to be a community meeting in the future to show more detailed plans.

The projected cost for the renovation is \$22 million and hopefully, the renovation will be completed in phases for as little impact as possible on park programming. And please give a hand to the Clarendon Park Advisory Council, which worked diligently on the project.

The fieldhouse/community center plays an integral role in providing much-needed services such as after school programs, summer camps, basketball, and it is home to the Garfield Clarendon Model Railroad Club. I know first hand what a safe haven it is for kids.

According to Preservation Chicago, the

fieldhouse, originally called the Clarendon Municipal Bathing Beach, was designed by city architect C.W. Kallal in a Mediterranean Revival Style as a state-of-the-art facility once considered to be one of "the largest and best equipped of all of the beaches in the city." It could accommodate more than 9,000 swimmers and included a promenade for thousands of spectators. The building remained popular until the 1930s when landfill moved the shoreline further east and created Clarendon Park. It was further separated from the Lake Michigan shoreline by extensions of Lake Shore Dr. in the early 1950s.

Over time but especially during a 1972 "modernization" effort, the distinctive tall towers fronting Clarendon Ave. and the smaller towers fronting the beach, along with the entry colonnade, verandas, open-air loggias and tile roof were demolished and replaced with a massive flat roof. The modifications resulted in extensive water infiltration and roof issues.

At this time, full plans have not been shared, said Ward Miller, executive director of Preservation Chicago. Yet he assumes that code and water management issues would be the highest priority for the Chicago Park District and the community and this work would all be staged in phases, as to not interrupt programming.

Preservation Chicago is "very proud and pleased with the outcome and we've been working with the community and elected officials for more than five years towards this goal."

Small 'Ma and Pa' apartment owners cheering Assessor's Kaegi's efforts

Small "Ma and Pa" apartment owners—the backbone of Chicago's affordable rental market—are hoping and praying for a level playing field from reformer Fritz Kaegi, Cook County's newly elected assessor.

In a bold move, Kaegi recently went to bat for the little guys—the 2-flat, 3-flat and 4-flat owners across the city's 77 neighborhoods.

Kaegi urged the Illinois Legislature to pass a bill that would require large commercial property owners—those fat cats who developed, own and manage tens of thousands of units in brand-new apartment towers and thousands of square feet of space in office skyscrapers downtown—to disclose income and expenses.

The assessor was hoping to use the information to calculate more accurate property tax assessments, which are largely based on the level of income an apartment or office building generates.

Although the measure passed the Illinois Senate in April, unfortunately the bill was torpedoed by lobbyists representing wealthy real estate interests, and some trade unions who benefit from the downtown construction and de-

velopment business.

The bill was scheduled for a hearing at an Illinois House committee last week, but mysteriously was pulled from the agenda by Michael Madigan, the powerful Speaker of the House.

Ironically, Madigan also owns a property tax appeals law firm. Obviously, some of his wealthy clients likely would feel a financial pinch if the progressive Kaegi reform bill passed.

The Kaegi bill would require owners of big commercial properties each year to submit to the Cook County Assessor's office certain data, including federal tax returns, rent rolls and expenses for the prior year.

"Imagine if you were the Internal Revenue Service and you calculated people's taxes based on a guess of what they their income was," Kaegi said.

Under the Kaegi plan, owners of small apartments worth less than \$400,000, rental properties with six or fewer units and residential rental buildings with seven or more units worth less than \$1-million would be exempt from the new law if it introduced for a vote and passes the Illinois House.

After taking office, apparently Kaegi learned that former Cook County Assessor Joseph Berrios' crew used creative "multiple regression" computer models to assess many downtown commercial properties. Berrios bragged in press releases that he was "refining assessments" and completed his work on time for eight straight years.

Unfortunately, under this system big commercial properties were undervalued and some of the real estate tax burden was unfairly shifted to bungalow owners, small apartment and small

commercial properties, according to a Chicago Tribune and ProPublica Illinois investigation.

The Kaegi reform pledges to publish formulas used to calculate residential assessments and use new calculations to assess big commercial properties.

The rental-apartment market is tough on the little guys who own small buildings and don't have a roof-top swimming pool, a fancy workout salon and a doorman, landlords say.

Meanwhile, small apartment building owners in the city are still trying to digest the whopping 2018 property-tax assessments handed out as a parting shot by Berrios.

In 2018, the entire City of Chicago was reassessed and a spot survey by The Home Front column found assessment increases of 40% to 112% on a group of small North Side and Northwest Side Ma and Pa apartment buildings.

The rental-apartment market is tough on the little guys who own small buildings and don't have a roof-top swimming pool, a fancy workout salon and a doorman, landlords say.

Often the rent is lower in the walk-up, and the privacy can be a bonus, especially if there is a nice deck with barbeque and a garden out back.

However, the small apartment owner still has to be competitive when it comes to amenities upscale renters expect, such as a fireplace, granite and stainless-steel kitchen, in-unit washer/dryer and good security.

Here are some examples of upgrades made and vacancy issues

dealt with recently by four North Side landlords who are trying to keep up with the downtown high-rise apartment competition:

• **Old Town:** The owner of a vintage 3-flat invested more than \$3,000 in improvements in one 2-bedroom-plus-den, 2-bath, 1,000-square-foot apartment and only raised the rent \$55 a month.

Improvements included new under-cabinet kitchen lighting, two new ceiling fans, a dining room chandelier, new Levelor blinds, a deck barbeque and a complete repainting of the apartment. The owner currently is appealing an outrageous 93% assessment increase handed out by Berrios.

• **Lincoln Park:** The investment of \$3,000 in improvements by a landlord in a 1-bedroom, 1-bath 700-square-foot apartment in a historic Lincoln Park 6-flat only generated a rent increase of \$160 a month. Improvements include: wall-to-wall carpeting, a new appliance package, and Levelor blinds. The owner is appealing a 34% assessment increase she received from Berrios.

• **Logan Square:** The owner of a 4-flat near Logan Boulevard had a vacancy in a 1-bedroom-plus-den garden unit for 18 months and lost tens of thousands of dollars in rents. Part of the problem was competition from big commercial developers who built a batch of new apartment buildings on nearby Milwaukee Ave. in the super-hot Logan Square neighborhood.

Despite the financial hardship, Berrios jacked the owner's assessment up 72.8%. The owner is appealing the hefty assessment hike.

• **North Lincoln Square:** This year the 1920s era 4-flat building was battered with water infiltration issues caused by the record spring rains. The landlord fixed the water problem at a cost of about \$1,000, replaced two roof-top furnace and air condition units for \$8,600 and now is planning porch improvements and other investments.

The owner says he is holding the line on rents, but passing on modest rent increases to keep occupancy at 100%. The owner is appealing Berrios' 40.6% assessment hike.

The Kaegi bill is opposed in the Illinois Legislature by the Building Managers Assoc. of Chicago, the Illinois Retail Merchants Assoc., the Chicagoland Chamber of Commerce, and the Chicagoland Apartment Assoc.

Other opponents include some trade unions that have strong alliances with the office and apartment construction industry, and the Civic Federation, a budget watchdog group backed by corporate interests.

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Is intoxication lying in the weeds?

Marijuana is legal to some extent in over 30 states and counting — some for medicinal purposes, some fully decriminalized.

What are the implications for driving (including getting a DUI for marijuana intoxication), operating machinery, and driving through states where this herbaceous substance is not legal?

Most importantly, how can you tell when you are intoxicated?

Some states have decriminalized marijuana use for all purposes, or have made it illegal only to the extent of a minor municipal violation. Others allow medicinal use. Many allow both.

Meanwhile, the other states still hold marijuana to be illegal, for both recreational use and medicinal purposes.

To cast an even larger cloud over the room, the federal government still classifies marijuana as an illegal drug.

So it may be allowable to ingest mari-

juana in a state but not legal to operate a boat, motorcycle, or car while under its influence. It may be legal to ingest it in a state like Colorado, but illegal to take it from Colorado to a state where it is illegal, even if it was legal in the state from which it came. And if you drive with it into a state where it is illegal, it may get you in trouble in multiple ways.

If you think being stoned makes it hard to make sense of things, how about the fact that there is no uniformly accepted test for determining intoxication for marijuana use. In Illinois, it is illegal to drive while intoxicated, but it is very difficult without a contemporaneous medical test to even determine what level of pot use yields intoxication. Nor is there a standard for how to test this.

Saliva tests are invasive and costly, while breath tests are being developed but are not yet reliable.

There is no scientific consensus on what constitutes intoxication or impairment due

to marijuana.

Making matters even foggier is that pot stays in your system in the fat cells for around 30 days, meaning you could test positive for marijuana and its active ingredient, THC, yet not be remotely impaired.

Workers' compensation in Illinois makes things even more difficult. An employer can claim that an employee who was injured was intoxicated and thus is not entitled to workers' comp benefits. But the employer has to prove actual impairment at the time of the injury, meaning they would have to test the employee contemporaneously and have someone trained to testify about levels of intoxication.

What if your car insurance company ask if you use marijuana? Auto insurers already ask insureds to voluntarily exchange personal information in exchange for lower rates. This comes in the form of personal

tracking devices placed in vehicles.

It is certainly conceivable that insurers will ask people to volunteer information about legal drug use when applying for a policy of insurance, such as:

- Do you or a member of your household currently hold a valid medical marijuana card?
- Do you currently use marijuana regularly (defined as daily? Weekly? Monthly?)?
- Do you drive within (x # hours/days) after using marijuana?

Whether you live in a state where marijuana is legal could also be analyzed algorithmically to adjust auto insurance rates.

Where does data collection, ostensibly for public safety purposes, intersect with rights of privacy? You can expect these companies will be checking social media posts and sharing information with other insurance companies too.

Responsible people can indulge in a few beers, glasses of wine, or sips of whiskey and drive later on that day without any legal or medical impairment. There are also plenty of people able to use marijuana or medical products mimicking its effects and benefits who can still drive without impairment. Yet others cannot.

In short, the effect of marijuana and its companion substances can differ widely upon different people.

How the law should handle this is still open for debate whether you are a user for medical reasons or a stoner who just wants to embrace the hash pipe?

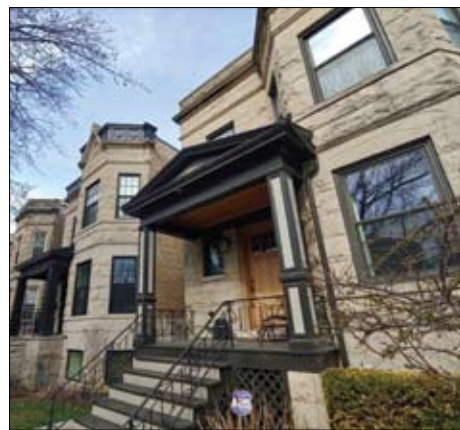
Meeting on preserving dwindling supply of two-flats, three-flats May 30 at Sulzer

How to preserve Chicago's dwindling supply of two-flat and three-flat apartment buildings will be the topic of a public forum from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. May 30 at the Sulzer Regional Library, 4455 N. Lincoln Ave.

Two-flat and three-flat apartment buildings built between 1880 and 1970 have been identified as key sources of affordable housing in Chicago, but thousands of rental units in these buildings have been lost in the last 30 years due to a variety of factors, including neglect and abandonment, conversion to condominiums or single-family homes, or demolition for redevelopment.

Event organizers say that the idea behind this forum is to explore alternative approaches to preserving those rental units. The forum hopes to consider a range of ideas for how to achieve that goal, either through incentives or restrictions. The public meeting will feature a panel that includes: Ald. Matt Martin [47th]; Sarah Duda, Deputy Director of the Institute for Housing Studies at DePaul Univ.; Paul Shadle, of DLA Piper, with a law practice focusing on development, land use and government affairs; Steven Vance, CEO of Chicago Cityscape, a website offering detailed information about development in Chicago, and John Zachar, a Northside architect with experience in two-flat renovation and conversion.

"The importance of preserving two-flats and three-flats received considerable attention during the recent citywide elections,"

said Lynsey Sorrell, an architect who is one of the meeting organizers. "We want to maintain the focus on that topic and give our neighbors an opportunity to learn more about various approaches to preserving those units and the challenges involved in achieving that goal. It touches on so many important topics, such as zoning, building codes, historic preservation, sustainability and affordability. It's a citywide issue, but one with special relevance" on the North Side.

The forum will include brief presentations by the panelists, a discussion of issues and a question and answer session during which panelists will respond to written questions from audience members.

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Quigley on same page as president over China tariffs

China is a threat for several reasons the U.S. can no longer afford to ignore, U.S. Rep. Mike Quigley [5th] warned a May 13 standing-room-only luncheon at the Chicago City Club, 111 W. Grand Ave.

And President Donald Trump's recently-imposed tariff hike isn't going to help anyone – including local businesses like the Northwest Side industrial plant in Quigley's district that will have to go hunting for other, perhaps more expensive raw materials.

Nobody is really sure what the impact may be short and long term but most recognize that if this challenge was ever to be undertaken, now - with the U.S. economy booming - is the right time.

Ultimately, the cost of the tariff hike will be passed on to that plant, and eventually its' American customers, Quigley pointed out, unless alternate vendors and suppliers can be found outside of China.

On Monday, the day after that tariff was imposed, the Dow Jones Industrial Average did a 611 point nosedive. Still the S&P 500 up over 13% year to date and the DOW Jones 9.4%. So it is no time for jumping off buildings.

The question now, he added, is which country is going to be hurt more – China or the U.S.

Right now most economists think the U.S. has more leverage, and China more to lose.

Once an isolated, impoverished country considered fair game for all the bigger countries, China is now the world's second largest economy next to the United States, said Quigley, noting that “when I was in high school, 90% of the Chinese population lived in abject poverty. Today it's about two percent.”

Their GDP has grown by 24 times since then, he added, noting that China has been funneling much of the proceeds into an extremely powerful military machine that could someday challenge even the United States.

China's goal, Quigley added, is to have a world class military establishment by mid-century.

But that's only part of the problem, Quigley warned, adding that China's enrichment came at least partly from “aggressively” stealing civilian patents from the West as well as American military secrets.

Chinese law, in fact, requires that country's businesses to steal whatever they can from foreign companies, some American business people familiar with Chinese ways claim. And as 70% of the nation's economy is owned or controlled by the Chinese government, or communist party political players, that seems understandable. After all, who benefits, and who would arrest them?

Security concerns about Chi-

nese business practices are already so serious that the Pentagon reportedly doesn't want Chinese-made railroad cars bought by local transit companies to travel anywhere near the Pentagon because some of those railroad cars

the People's Liberation Army. Huawei denies it poses any such risk.

So what do we do?

“We need a ‘moon shot’ strategy, a focused program as intense as the one that eventually got the United States on the Moon,” said Quigley.

And that means involving as many allies as we can, he added, noting that America's security problem is never going to be solved by going it alone.

“We're always stronger as a country with allies. We're in much greater danger of being isolationists,” Quigley said.

Unfortunately, he added, “America has been fighting with everyone, even Canada, which has been an ally for more than a century. How many of you think our NATO allies trust us on anything anymore?”

FDR said it best some 85 years ago, when he noted that “to have a friend you have to be a friend,” Quigley said.

It's time to start mending fences, he added.

One time Lerner writer Pat Pastin dead at 81

Services were held last week for longtime Rogers Park resident Pat Pastin, 86, Lerner Newspapers political reporter and theater critic, cartoon and haiku creator, freelance political consultant, Korean War veteran, chess master, and karate black belt.

Born in Canada, he had originally planned on following in the footsteps of his father, Anchel Pastinky, a prominent rabbi. He eventually emigrated to the United States, and got the name “Pat” by accident during his service in Korea when – not wanting to run out of ammunition – he carried extra bandoliers, which got him nicknamed “Pancho” after Mexican revolutionary Pancho Villa, who also took care never to run dry.

“Pancho” soon became “Pat.” The name stuck on his return stateside, where he became a newspaper reporter in Texas. There

he covered statewide politics and made the acquaintance of then-rising figures including Lyndon Johnson, then a U.S. Congressman.

Pastin eventually made his way to Chicago where he joined the Lerner Newspapers, then reportedly the country’s largest chain of community newspapers.

During his years at Lerner, Pastin not only racked up numerous awards and honors of his own, but served as a mentor to numerous reporters who were just starting out and eventually married one of them, Sue, his wife of more than 45 years.

He is survived by his wife Sue Pastin and son Joshua. Three brothers, Alex, Max and Benny preceded him in death.

Pastin’s burial was at Waldheim Cemetery, Forest Park.

Newspaper staffer dead at 56

Those who may have visited this newspaper’s offices over the last decade likely met Inside Publications office manager Karen Sonnefeldt. She died suddenly on May 1, at age 56, while on the job.

2-Flats not gone...

The caption, “Two-flats going, going... gone?” [May 8] greatly overstates what is happening.

There has been considerable confusion on this issue, a confusion between loss of affordable units and the physical loss of the units themselves. For two-flats, the majority are owner-occupied, so when we are talking about affordable rental units, we are talking about just one unit per two-flat. And for those units, they can be lost as affordable units if the rent rises above the annual amount that is calculated as not more than a certain percentage of gross income (currently 30%) for those households whose gross income is below a certain amount. In certain North Side neighborhoods, this is the principal reason for the loss.

The other situation is the physical loss of the units themselves. This can occur when the two-flat is abandoned, demolished, or converted to single-family units. Abandonment is something that is extremely rare on

the North Side, but does occur on the South and West Sides. A two-flat can be demolished for construction of a single-family home or for the construction of a larger building. The former is very rare for most North Side neighborhoods. Most demolitions are for the construction of buildings with more units, and these occur only if the zoning is RT-4 or higher. In Edgewater there have been only six two-flats demolished for this reason. The other way rental units (affordable and not affordable) can be lost is through the conversion of the two-flat to a single-family unit. In Edgewater, since 1999, there have been 55 conversions. This represents not more than 6% of the two-flats in Edgewater. Twenty-seven of those two-flat conversions have been in the Lakewood Balmoral neighborhood.

Robbers force women to ground, pistol-whip each in the face

Two women were forced to the ground, pistol-whipped in their faces, and robbed May 12 in the Lakeview neighborhood, according to Chicago police. No one is in custody.

The victims, both 26, said they were walking in the 1200 block of W. Roscoe around midnight Sunday when two men wearing ski masks ran toward them and ordered them to lie down while threatening them with a handgun.

Both women were then struck in the face with the gun—one strike was so powerful, it broke the barrel off of the weapon, according to a police officer who was at the scene.

The robbers then took a phone and a purse from the women before running from the area, police said.

Police described the offenders as men wearing black hoodies, blue jeans, and ski masks. They both stood about 5'-8" tall and were last seen running westbound on Roscoe and possibly northbound from there, according to witnesses.

One of the victims was transported to Advocate Illinois Masonic Medical Center for treatment.

Police recovered a spring and a gun barrel from the 1200 block of W. Roscoe.

Medical Examiner: Loyola student's death was suicide

The Loyola Univ. graduate student who was found dead in his dorm room on the school's downtown campus this month committed suicide, according to the Cook County Medical Examiner.

Police launched a death investigation after the 26-year-old man was found with multiple lacerations on his neck in the 22nd-floor room of Baumhart Hall, 26 E. Pearson, around 4:15 p.m. May 1.

The medical examiner has ruled that the man died of self-inflicted stab wounds, according to newly-released information.

A CPD spokesperson said at the time of the man's discovery that the department did not believe that there was any threat to the community.

The man was pursuing a master's degree in social work, according to a university source.

Burglary alert issued for multi-unit storage rooms

Storage areas of two apartment buildings in southeast Lakeview have been targeted by burglars over the past month, according to a community alert issued by Chicago police.

Investigators typically issue alerts when they believe a series of crimes have been committed by the same person or group.

Police said the offenders in the Lakeview pattern entered two multi-unit buildings through front or side doors and then targeted residential storage areas.

The offenders struck sometime after 7 p.m. April 14 in the 300 block of W. Barry and again at 1:13 a.m. in the 400 block of W. Barry on May 3.

Police are advising residents to tell family and friends about the pattern and to ensure that their doors are secure at all times.

Woman fends off sexual assault on Lakefront Trail

A woman was targeted in an attempted criminal sexual assault on the Lakefront Trail near Grant Park late Friday night, police said.

The 27-year-old victim was walking just south of Balbo Dr. when an unknown man approached her from behind. Police said she struggled with the man and tried to fight him off with pepper spray. An approaching cyclist scared the attacker, and the assailant fled the scene, allowing the woman to escape and flag down passing patrol officers, CPD said.

The victim described the offender as a black male in his late 20's with a medium complexion and no facial hair. He stands 5'-10" to 6-feet tall, has a thin, athletic build, and was wearing a black jacket with black pants.

Police are advising the public to avoid traveling alone during late night hours and to report any suspicious persons, vehicles or activity in parks.

Teen freed without supervision, 14-year-old charged with Argyle Red Line shooting

A 14-year-old boy charged with the May 6 double-shooting at the Argyle Red Line station was released without supervision by a judge after an initial hearing in juvenile court.

A spokesperson for Cook County State's Attorney Kim Foxx told this newspaper on Friday afternoon that

Prosecutors asked Judge Linda Pael to put the teen on electronic monitoring if he was going to be released, but she denied the request.

"Over our objections, the minor was released to the custody of a parent," Foxx's office said.

Felony attempted first-degree murder and felony aggravated battery charges remain in place against the teen, whose next court date was May 13, Foxx's spokesperson said.

The spokesman for Chief Judge Timothy Evans was unable to comment on the case because it is pending. A CPD spokesperson was not immediately available.

Seven people have been shot in Uptown since a local gang war was reignited by a double-shooting in the 1000 block of W. Argyle on March 19. At least a dozen "shots fired" incidents that did not result in injuries have also been reported during that time.

Two charged in connection with shoot-out in River North

Two men have been charged in connection with a shots fired incident that saw more than 40 rounds unloaded outside of a River North nightclub early May 8. The charges stem from the individuals' alleged conduct against investigating officers and not with the shooting itself.

Arriving police officers tried to stop a white Rolls-Royce driven by Antione Davis, 36, of Hanover Park. But Davis "continued to drive and disregarded

officers' verbal orders to stop," according to a CPD statement.

Video of the incident appears to show the white vehicle pulling out of a parking lot while officers approach and lean on the moving car. One officer is seen leaning on the hood of the car directly in front of the driver.

Davis was taken into custody a few minutes after the video was made when the Rolls-Royce crashed on the Ontario feeder ramp.

He is charged with felony aggravated assault of a police officer and misdemeanor counts of driving on a suspended license and reckless conduct.

Also arrested that evening was Levertise Hewing, 32. Police said overnight that Hewing struck a police sergeant who responded to the incident. Hewing is charged with felony aggravated battery of a police officer and misdemeanor counts of resisting arrest and reckless conduct.

Judge Susana Ortiz ordered Davis held without bail and set bail for Hewing at \$5,000. So far, police have announced no arrests in connection with the actual shooting.

Cop faces felonies for "inappropriate physical contact" with women while on-duty

A 14-year veteran Chicago cop assigned to the 19th (Town Hall) District in Lakeview is facing multiple felony charges after three women accused him of inappropriate physical contact in separate incidents while he was on duty. Now, this reporter has reviewed police dispatch records that indicate the accused officer was working with a partner when at least two of the alleged incidents took place.

Officer Corey Deanes, 47, was charged with three felony counts of official misconduct - forbidden act; felony aggravated battery in a public place; and two counts of misdemeanor battery. Judge John Lyke ordered him held in lieu of \$200,000 bail. Deanes will be required to go on electronic monitoring if he's able to post a 10% deposit bond.

A Bloomingdale's security guard told police that he saw then-21-year-old Washington Park resident slip a \$365 purse into a shopping bag and head for the exit at 900 N. Michigan around 4:30 p.m. Dec. 22, 2017.

When the guard stopped Copeland and started walking her back toward the loss prevention office, the pint-sized perp unleashed a nasty surprise: She pulled a tire iron from her sleeve and repeatedly cracked the guard in the head with it, police said.

The security guard received stitches for his wounds, police said.

Police also determined that Copeland pepper-sprayed a security guard who tried to detain her at TJ Maxx's Loop location, 1 N. State St., in Jan. 2017.

Deanes was identified in photo arrays as the offending officer, prosecutors said. But questions remain unanswered about what role Deanes' partners played—or did not play—in exposing his alleged behavior.

Around 11:30 p.m. Aug. 28, 2017, Deanes pulled over a 23-year-old woman for a traffic violation in the 2500 block of N. Clark St. Prosecutors said Deanes directed the woman to a less busy location and began hugging and touching her back and buttocks, prosecutors said. Deanes told the woman that he would write her a traffic ticket if she did not give him her phone number, according to allegations.

CPD records show that Deanes did not follow standard traffic stop procedures, such as checking the woman's license number against a database. And police dispatch records show that Deanes did not announce the traffic stop via radio. It is not clear if Deanes was working with a partner on the night in question.

Then, dispatch records show that another woman asked for police assistance after she returned home and found a homeless man sleeping on her porch in the 600 block of W. Barry around 3:30 a.m. July 1, 2018. Deanes accepted the assignment about 12 minutes later with a radio code that officers use to indicate that they are working with a partner.

During a conversation with the 29-year-old woman, Deanes complimented her clothing and grabbed her by the wrist to expose shorts and a tank top that she was wearing under an outer layer, prosecutors said. The woman told Deanes that she was out late working to pay her rent, which prompted Deanes to begin searching her for money, "putting his finger in the front right pocket of her shorts and pulling it open," according to allegations.

Exactly where Deanes' partner was during his alleged behavior is not clear. And Chicago police today did not respond to inquiries about the matter.

Finally, around 12:15 a.m. July 13, 2018, Deanes allegedly rolled up in his squad car as a 22-year-old woman was walking near Clark and Fullerton, about a block from where the first incident had been reported.

Deanes called the woman a "pretty little thing," then got out of his police vehicle to hug her and ask her out on a date, according to prosecutors.

Police dispatch records indicate that Deanes worked with a partner that night. Again, a CPD spokesman did not respond to our inquiries about what action, if any, Deanes partner took during or after the alleged incident.

Prosecutors said all three women reported their allegations to authorities promptly and private video footage corroborated at least one of the victims' claims. Deanes was pulled from

the 19th District eleven days after the third incident, stripped of his police powers, and assigned to a unit that takes police reports over the phone. The city will suspend Deanes' pay effective immediately because he is now facing felony charges, the department said. Deanes was regularly assigned to the overnight shift on beat 1934, which encompasses the area from Belmont to Diversey and Halsted to Lake Michigan.

UPDATE: A CPD spokesperson said in an email that the department "wouldn't comment" on what actions Deanes' partners took "as it speaks to what could be classified as witness information." Nonetheless, the department also did not say if any of Deanes' partners on the night of reported incidents were being investigated for failure to report his alleged conduct.

4 charged after man carjacked in Uptown

Two juveniles and two adults have been charged after a suburban man reported being carjacked at gunpoint in the Uptown neighborhood on May 6.

The victim, 25, told police that a young male offender displayed a handgun and ordered him out of his 2007 Jeep Grand Cherokee in the 900 block of W. Agatite at 6:57 p.m., police said.

Officers in the South Side's Chatham neighborhood located the vehicle about two hours later in the 300 block of West 79th Street with assistance from CPD's license plate reading technology, according to a police spokesperson and a department source.

Four people who were in the stolen SUV have been charged:

- A 15-year-old male juvenile is charged with vehicular hijacking
- A 17-year-old female juvenile is charged with vehicular hijacking
- 19-year-old Liliana Murillo is charged with misdemeanor criminal trespass to vehicle
- 19-year-old Tiara Moore is charged with misdemeanor criminal trespass to vehicle

No further information was available about the juveniles.

Man pleads guilty to attempted murder outside Boystown nightclub

A Calumet City man has pleaded guilty to attempted murder for severely beating a man with a metal baseball bat outside a Boystown nightclub two summers ago.

Cory Fulton-Miles was sentenced to 10 years in prison by Judge Earl Hoffenberg. State law requires Fulton-Miles to serve at least 85% of his sentence. Three felony aggravated battery charges were dropped as part of Fulton-Miles' deal with prosecutors.

Around 3:45 a.m. June 13, 2017, police officers on routine patrol saw Fulton-Miles carrying a 28-inch bat outside of Hydrate Nightclub, 3458 N. Halsted, which was preparing to close for the night.

The officers intervened after seeing Fulton-Miles strike a 28-year-old man in the head several times, causing the victim to fall to the ground with "massive head trauma," according to prosecutors.

A bystander sprayed Fulton-Miles with pepper-spray as he ran from the scene and dumped the bat Cornelia Ave., police said. He was quickly caught and arrested nearby.

The victim suffered blunt force trauma, a depressed skull fracture, brain hemorrhage, and a lacerated forehead. He was taken to Advocate Illinois Masonic Medical Center in critical condition.

Senate proposes raising gas tax to fund transportation infrastructure

More than 200 government and business leaders met at the Union League Club this month to discuss Illinois transportation investments of over \$20 billion in infrastructure over the next 10 years.

The panel discussed topics such as O'Hare Airport, Illinois Tollway's Capital Program, and CTA's Red Purple Modernization projects.

State Sens. Martin A. Sandoval and Don DeWitte were recently joined by leaders from commerce, organized labor and the construction industry as they advocated for a 25¢ increase to the state's gasoline tax, which they say is needed to address years of neglect.

The bill calls for raising the motor fuel tax from 19¢ to 44¢, which would generate an estimated \$1.2 billion in revenue. The bill would also hike the tax on special fuels, which includes diesel and biodiesel, from 21.5¢ to 52¢, bringing in an estimated \$478 million. Those increases would be indexed to increase with the rate of inflation.

Sandoval also proposed in HB 3233 to double the driver's license fee to \$60 and raise the registration fee to \$148 in order to help pay for repairs to crumbling bridges and roads that have been neglected for decades due to the state's dire finances, according to the Chicago Tribune.

Today a driver's license costs \$30 and vehicle registration is \$98.

The proposal would also increase electric vehicle registration from \$17.50 to \$1,000. Take that, you green people!

While DeWitte spoke in favor of a gas tax increase, he said he would advocate for a removal of the sales tax the state levies on motor fuel. Thanks to a 2016 "lock box" amendment to the Illinois Constitution, motor fuel taxes are mandated for use on road and bridge safety, while sales

taxes are not.

"These funding increases currently being debated in this Legislature will provide a steady stream of funding for years to come," DeWitte said. "And they're guaranteed, most importantly for taxpayers, they are guaranteed to go

where promised as they are strictly dedicated to transportation-related issues."

"Greater fuel efficiency and an increasing number of electric vehicles on the road has cut into the revenue available to the state to fix transportation infrastructure," many statehouse politicians report.

Sandoval said his plan would

raise about \$2.4 billion in yearly transportation funding for the state.

The state has had various plans to fund aging infrastructure, including a proposal to tax vehicles on the number of miles driven, but nothing has passed so far.

"We have fallen behind. Our continued investment in our Illinois infrastructure is key in creating jobs, promoting full economic recovery," Sandoval said. "Investment will boost productivity, support business growth, create jobs, provide a healthier environment and improve opportunity for Illinoisans. It is about time. Doing nothing is not a solution."

Gov. J.B. Pritzker has expressed support to fund transportation infrastructure but hasn't said how to fund it. He's also asking legislators to legalize and tax sports betting and recreational marijuana, increase taxes on cigarettes and plastic bags and implement a graduated income tax that would tax wealthier people at higher rates if voters approve an amendment in the Nov. 2020 ballot. Yes, many tax increases are now in play in Springfield.

Zoo’s lion habitat plans revealed

Kovler Lion House due to be renovated this Fall

The Lincoln Park Zoo is bringing back the “roaring ‘20s” with an updated lion habitat opening in the 2020s. Construction is slated to begin by fall 2019 with an opening date to be determined.

The zoo shared its renovation plans on May 9 for the iconic Kovler Lion House. The building, originally opened in 1912, is a historic landmark and the last project of The Pride of Chicago, the zoo’s \$135 million capital campaign.

The \$35 million renovation includes a state-of-the-art habitat for a pride of lions, including potential future offspring. For the last few years, the zoo’s animal welfare scientists have been monitoring the current lion prides’ behavior, habitat use, and preferences. Data collected has been used to design and create a scientifically-driven habitat with animal welfare at the forefront.

The new design will accommodate various needs and preferences determined by the lions themselves. With these new features, the lion habitat will span the full northern side of Kovler Lion House. The savanna-style habitat will include intricate rockwork to increase vertical complexity and environmental options to the lions while providing embedded heating and cooling elements for a climate controlled habitat. Tree structures and deadfall will be made from Forest Stewardship Council-certified trees and a food zipline, simulating prey, will be installed for lion feeding as an enrichment opportunity.

Guests will have viewing opportunities from both inside and outside the lion house with a unique design enabling guests to be in the center of the habitat. The theme of the building’s interpretive will focus on the zoo’s ongoing conservation efforts in the Serengeti ecosystem. The habitat will also be built to include a demonstration training wall where guests can view the lions par-

icipating in their own healthcare.

In preparation for the building renovation, the current pride of lions, including 9-year-old male Sahar and 5-year-old female littermates Kamali and Zalika, will be leaving Lincoln Park Zoo in the coming weeks.

Dozens of tires slashed, leaving Lakeview residents frustrated

At least 10 vehicles—and likely many, many more—had their tires punctured by a man who wandered the streets and alleys of Lakeview East early May 5, according to police and neighbors. Now, video of the perpetrator has been sent to this reporter.

Surveillance video shows a man walking through a Boystown alley at 3:34 a.m. He approaches a vehicle on a home’s carport and swiftly punctures the rear driver’s side tire.

He then moves to the front tire and does it again before casually walking away, letting off a whistling sound of his own to mock the wheezing tires.

Chicago police on May 7 did not have a final tally on the number of vehicles and tires that were struck. Local social media group

posts indicate that at least three residents counted 10 or more cars with tires slashed on different blocks in the area. Many of the vehicles had multiple flats, according to commenters.

“This guy slashed 3 tires on my neighbor’s car,” said one Boystown resident.

Another asks, “Anyone else on N. Wilton between Belmont and School wake up yesterday to slashed tires? I noticed this morning that many cars are still sitting with flats.”

The video shows a slender man wearing distinctive jeans that have bleach stains on the front and back of the legs. He’s wearing boots and what appears to be a green jacket with a wide white or cream-colored stripe on its sleeves.

Arriving officers were directed toward two men who were walking away from the beach, one of whom was Sarong Gonzalez, 26. A handgun was recovered, police said.

Gonzalez is charged with one felony count of aggravated unlawful use of a weapon. He is currently being held in lieu of \$2,000 bail.

Man gets probation for burglarizing apartment building while on probation for stealing car

Most logical folks probably think that if you violate felony probation by committing another felony, you’re probably heading to jail. But this is Chicago, you can leave your logic at the city limits.

A Lincoln Park man who burglarized a bike storage room just two weeks after being given probation for possessing a stolen motor vehicle has pleaded guilty to the bike thefts—and he’s been sentenced to probation. Again.

On Aug. 15 2018, Munkhnasan Baatarjav, 29, was given two year’s probation for possessing a stolen motor vehicle. Two weeks later, on Sept. 2, police arrested Baatarjav in Lincoln Square for burglarizing an apartment building’s bike storage room.

Prosecutors said Baatarjav was seen on video removing two bikes from a secured storage area in the 1800 block of W. Argyle. He placed one bike in a car and rode away on the second one, according to allegations in court records. He was arrested when he returned for his car and the second bike.

Police said they found some items inside his vehicle, too: a Visa card belonging to another man; another credit card that belongs to yet a different man; a debit card belonging to a woman; and, conveniently, Baatarjav’s Cook County probation card.

Baatarjav was charged with two felony counts of residential burglary.

Baatarjav pleaded guilty May 8 to one count of theft in a plea deal that required prosecutors to drop burglary charges. Judge Earl Hoffenberg, who approved the plea deal, sentenced Baatarjav to another two years of probation.

In 2012, Fulton-Miles received a three-year prison term for committing an armed robbery in the Loop.

With credit for 694 days time served while awaiting trial and his anticipated 15% sentence reduction, Fulton-Miles will be released from prison in about 6-1/2 years.

Two men, including troubled ex-cop, charged with beating outside Andersonville gay bar

Two men, including a now-resigned Chicago police sergeant with a checkered past, have been charged in connection with beating three men after an argument at an Andersonville gay bar in September.

Former cop Eric Elkins, 45, was charged May 6 with two felony counts of aggravated battery causing great bodily harm. And Giovanni Rodriguez, 34, is charged with two felony counts aggravated battery causing great bodily harm and one count felony aggravated battery in a public place.

Both men are due in bond court today.

Police said the pair were involved in an argument with three other men inside Atmosphere, 5355 N. Clark, around 11:25 p.m. on Sept. 29. The altercation continued outside the bar, and a fight broke out on the sidewalk that resulted in the three other men being transported to hospitals for injuries that were not life-threatening,

according to a police statement.

Edgewater resident Rodriguez and Elkins, who lists a home in Ft. Lauderdale, FL, turned themselves in at Area North police headquarters on Monday.

A civil lawsuit filed last year alleges that Elkins, Rodriguez, and two other defendants caused one victim to suffer a compound fracture of his leg while another was treated for a perforated trachea and broken facial bones.

The victims claim that the argument began when members of Elkins’ group threw limes at them.

Police records show that Elkins was already under investigation at the time of the Andersonville attack for allegedly sexually abusing a teenage boy at a party in Michigan in 2015. He pleaded guilty to battery in the criminal case and received probation. Separately, Elkins was acquitted of charges that he sexually abused a male student while working security at a city high school in 2003.

Elkins “resigned under investigation” from the Chicago Police Dept. in February after nearly 20 years on the job, according to a police spokesperson. He had been relegated to desk duty for three years at a salary of over \$100,000 due to an on-going disciplinary investigation of the Michigan incident.

Records collected by the Chicago Police Data Project show 35 com-

plaints filed against Elkins during his career—more claims than 96% of other officers. None of the complaints was sustained, according to CPDP.

Judge John Lyke set bail for Elkins at \$250,000 with electronic monitoring and a prohibition on travel, including to Florida. Gonzalez’s bail was set at \$50,000.

Woman attacked by group of teens Monday night; Cubs’ violent “candy kids” eyed

Police are investigating after a Boystown woman was attacked by a group of teenagers May 6. Some of the offenders may have been as young as 13, police said. Now, authorities are facing the very real prospect that the “candy kids” who have been raising havoc during Chicago Cubs’ home games may be launching violent attacks on neighborhood side streets.

A motorist called 911 at 11:15 p.m. after seeing a woman trying to get away from four males near the intersection of Halsted St. and Waveland Ave. The caller said it “looked like something bad was about to happen.” A few moments later, the victim also called for help, saying that she had been attacked by four or five juveniles in an apparent robbery attempt.

Police said the 21-year-old victim was walking westbound on Waveland from Halsted after visiting a nearby convenience store when four offenders approached her, and one began striking her in the face with his fist. Three others jumped and beat the woman from behind, a police spokesman said. Officers requested EMS to look at the woman’s injuries.

The group did not take any of the woman’s property, but her clothes

were ripped and she was struck repeatedly in the head, according to one of several local residents who chased the teens away.

The offenders were four black males between 13- and 18-years-old who stand about 5’-5” tall, police said. The leader of the group was taller than the others, and he wore a red hoodie with a backpack. All of the teens were last seen heading west on Waveland after the attack.

It is not yet clear if the offenders are related to the Wrigley Field “candy kids,” a violent group of teens and pre-teens who have attacked people near the stadium over the past two years. The “candy kids” have already attacked at least four people on home game days this season, including a Cubs security guard who was knocked unconscious by one of the kids last Friday. That night’s Cubs’ home game ended around 10:40 p.m., roughly 35 minutes before the woman was attacked.

The group will set out to attract a startup community in the neighborhood through development programs, partnerships as well as run projects that provide entrepreneurs with the tools they need to build successful, sustainable businesses.

In 2018, the WRCC won funding from the City of Chicago, Dept. of Business Affairs and Consumer Protection, in order to establish this center. They were awarded a \$25,000 contract to provide seed money to launch the NBOC. While an innovation center can mean many things, the backers say that "NBOC will be a co-working space with programming to support aspiring entrepreneurs in all business segments. The WRCC firmly believes that this center will help spur economic growth in the West Ridge Community. We will promote and grow the startup community in Chicago through development programs, partnerships, and help run projects that provide entrepreneurs with the tools they need to build successful, sustainable businesses."

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Two new plans in play, debate over sports gambling continues

Lawmakers now must pick winner from 7 options

There are now almost as many different plans to legalize sports betting in Illinois as there are states that have legalized it in any fashion.

Indiana Gov. Eric Holcomb signed a sports betting bill on May 8 – making it the ninth state to do so since a U.S. Supreme Court ruling last year allowed the practice. Lawmakers in Illinois unleashed two more plans for people to consider, bringing the total number of plans in Illinois to seven.

The two plans were filed just hours before a House subcommittee MET to discuss sports gambling in Illinois, leaving testifiers the difficult task of deciding their stance on the new plans without having had much time to review them.

State Rep. Michael Zalewski, who has taken the charge on legalizing sports betting in Illinois, filed the two amendments to House Bill 1260 on May 8.

Each amendment outlines yet another system by which lawmakers hope to support Gov. J.B. Pritzker’s goal of bringing more than \$200 million in sports wagering revenues to Illinois in the next fiscal year, much of it coming from Chicago-area residents.

According to Crain’s, in New Jersey bettors have wagered more than \$2.3 billion on sports through the end of March—less than a year after the state legalized the practice—and around 80% of those bets have been made on smartphones or online, according to online betting advocacy

site PlayNJ.com. Some gambling industry experts estimate that about \$10 billion is already illegally being wagered on sports annually in Illinois.

So the industry is expected to boom in Chicago, and fantasy sports giant FanDuel has already told Illinois lawmakers that if they legalize sports betting, they plan to bring hundreds of jobs to Chicago, their first expansion in the Midwest.

The first plan would allow both online sports gambling and brick-and-mortar betting at the state’s casinos, race tracks, betting parlors and video gambling terminals. Licensing fees would range from \$5 million to \$10 million, while wagering would be taxed at 25%.

Under that plan, the Illinois Lottery could also allow wagering in 2,500 retail

locations, with a \$30 million initial license fee and a 100% tax.

The second plan limits the number of licenses to seven for brick-and-mortar locations and three for online operators. Licensing fees in this plan range from \$5 million to \$20 million, but the 25% tax on wagering stays the same.

Also under the second plan, professional sports leagues would be paid a 0.2% royalty in exchange for official league data. Representatives from Major League Baseball and the National Basketball Assoc. said their data is the speediest and most accurate available, and that they could boost the sports betting industry in Illinois if they were the sole providers of data.

“If we are being compensated by the

casinos, we have a financial incentive to drive up the amount of money bet in Illinois,” said Bryan Seeley of MLB.

State Rep. Jonathan Carroll questioned whether third-party data providers don’t already supply speedy data to operators, and wondered what the leagues would do to increase betting in the state.

“If our state is looking to generate revenue, ... what is the return on investment,” Carroll asked, referring to the league royalty fees.

Representatives from the state’s race tracks and horsemen’s associations were also present, and made arguments that sports betting should be coupled with expanded gambling at race tracks to bring

back business.

Josh Whitman, the director of athletics at the Univ. of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, spoke on behalf of 12 of the state’s 13 Division I schools – all except Chicago State Univ. – when he opposed allowing sports betting on collegiate athletics.

Both plans introduced Wednesday include restrictions on betting on Illinois collegiate teams.

Zalewski, the amendments’ sponsor, encouraged stakeholders at the end of the hearing to figure out exactly what parts of each plan they support, and how many votes the provisions would garner in the General Assembly.

North Center software developer sentenced to prison for Federal grant scam

A North Center software developer has been sentenced to three months in federal prison for fraudulently obtaining \$200,000 in grant funds from the National Aeronautics and Space Administration [NASA] and the National Science Foundation [NSF].

Miroslav Velev, a mathematician with a doctorate in electrical and computer engineering, operated the software development and consulting company Aries Design Automation LLC, 2705 W. Byron St., which developed methods to solve electronic design automation problems.

Velev sought and obtained federal grant funds for his company through the Small Business Innovation Research program, which provides opportunities for

small businesses to participate in federally-sponsored research and development.

Aries was awarded a total of \$200,000 in grants from NASA and the NSF after Velev made materially false representations about the company’s financial condition.

Velev, 50, pleaded guilty last year to one count of conversion of government funds, a misdemeanor. U.S. District Judge Gary Feinerman sentenced Velev to three months in federal prison on May 8. Velev previously paid restitution of \$150,000 to NASA and \$50,000 to the NSF.

The SBIR program required applicant companies to show inde-

pendent, third-party investments or commitments of investments in their projects. Velev admitted

in a plea agreement that he falsely represented to NASA and the NSF that Aries had received the required independent investment from an individual investor. Velev fraudulently submitted in his

grant proposals a screenshot of his company’s bank account that reflected a funds transfer from the purported investor. In reality, the investor did not exist, and Velev had routed his own money into the account to support the false appearance of an investment.

Velev also submitted in his grant proposals an “investment letter” that identified a Chief Financial Officer for the purported investor. The alleged CFO turned out to be an acquaintance of Velev’s wife and had no connection with an investment in Aries.

Cell phone thefts in Lincoln Park
