CVS burglar caught red-handed with bag of prescription drugs

Chicago police caught a burglar red-handed as he tried to leave a Loop drugstore with thousands of dollars worth of inventory this weekend, prosecutors said.

"I'm really interested in this \$3,800 worth of stuff," Judge Arthur Willis said as he called Djaris Pierce before him in bond court on July 12.

A prosecutor told Willis that police who responded to a burglar alarm found the front revolving door broken at CVS, 105 S. Wabash, around 7:50 a.m. July 11.

Cops entered the store and encountered Pierce as he walked down a staircase from the secondfloor pharmacy, the prosecutor said. Inside Pierce's backpack, police allegedly found 20 bottles of various prescription drugs and prescription inhalers.

The pharmacy's roll-up security gate had been pried open. Surveillance video allegedly captured images of Pierce breaking through the store's front door and then heading toward the phar-

Willis, noting the 26-year-old's lack of criminal background, released Pierce on his own recogni-

Residents get chance to opine on proposed new 43-story tower plan

One of the North Side's most aggressive builders will be part of a community meeting tonight to discuss plans to build a new 43story high-rise at 125 W. Maple

Fifield Cos. wants to construct the 457-foot tall, 406-unit condo building on a parking lot at Maple St. and LaSalle Dr., along the west side of the Gold Coast Galleria condominium tower at 111 W. Maple St.

They are hosting a meeting 6 p.m. Wednesday night to introduce the project to the community and seek local backing.

The developer is set to make its pitch less than a month after residents of one nearby condo building vowed to oppose the project.

Fifield wants to start construction by early next year, despite uncertainty in the real estate industry brought on by changes in housing trends resulting from the COVID-19 driven economic shut down that has made building new residential high-rises difficult to

elevators and lobbies.

The virtual meeting tonight, hosted by Ald. Brian Hopkins [2nd] and the Gold Coast Neighbors Association, will be conducted virtually and follows informal discussions with several neighborhood groups and condominium associations.

The developers face a stiff test of their salesmanship as residents

of the nearby neighboring condo building, the Gold Coast Galleria, 111 W. Maple St., have already told the developer and alderman they oppose the proposed project because it is just 20' west of their own 34-story building, only separated by an alley, would block their own views, and add to con-

City brings contact tracing jobs to North Side

BY CASSIE AMUNDSON

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, millions of Americans have lost their jobs. After many months, the virus is finally creating new jobs with the help of federal funding given to both the City of Chicago, and the State of Illinois. The new jobs being created are for contact tracers. Chicago has allocated \$56 million to this program, hiring 600 new tracers. The state is hiring another 4000. This job requires only basic communications skills, and a willingness to help people.

The contract tracers will be pseudo-investigators. Their goal is to help find the contact point where people initially have contracted the virus, in hopes of containing it. They will be speaking with those who have been infected, to find a point of origin.

Since the beginning of the pandemic, high density central urban areas like Chicago's Loop, Near North and North sides have been at the forefront of trying to contain the spread of the virus. This

City successfully recruited in the past

This is not the city's first effort to try and recruit healthcare workers in a pandemic.

After suffering a severe nursing shortage during the Spanish Flu, on Feb. 18, 1919, a new nursing bill was introduced in the Illinois General Assembly that provided for a one-year course of training for practical nurses. It granted authority to the State Board of Registration to license those who passed the training, and made it illegal to pose as a registered nurse unless entitled to do so.

On July 21, 1919, Chicago's

Governor expected to lift evictions ban on Aug. 1

Landlords sue, claim state is taking their property

Chicago landlords who have been barred for months under an order from Gov. JB Pritzker from evicting tenants who either can't or won't pay rent will only suffer temporary harm, and shouldn't be allowed to sue the governor for allegedly illegally taking their property, attorneys for Pritzker have argued in a new court filing.

Pritzker asserted he has the authority under the state's so-called "police power" to take steps to prevent public health from suffering "devastation," should landlords begin evicting tenants too

"A resurgence of the deadly virus could undo the State's hardwon progress and waste the tremendous sacrifices all residents and business have made since March to fight the pandemic," lawyers from the Illinois Attorney General's office wrote.

"The Governor's continued suspension of residential evictions at this point, for just a few more weeks-is a modest requirement

imposed so Illinoisans can 'safely and conscientiously resume activities that were paused as COVID-19 cases rose exponentially and threatened to overwhelm our healthcare system,' while ensuring the State does 'not backslide on the progress we have made."

The eviction moratorium is scheduled to end on Aug. 1, when evictions proceedings could conceivable be started against thousands of people who for a variety of reasons have stopped paying rent.

Last month a group of rental housing owners filed a lawsuit accusing Pritzker of illegally seizing their property by forbidding them from evicting tenants under emergency executive orders Pritzker has issued and extended since March.

They said the governor's orders essentially force them to subsidize housing for tenants, including for those who use Pritzker's orders as a shield as they refuse to pay rent absent a credible threat of eviction.

Named plaintiffs in the action include JL Properties Group; Mark Dauenbaugh; and Steven Cole.

They are represented in the action by attorneys James V. Noonan and Solomon Maman, of the firm of Noonan & Lieberman Ltd., of Chicago, and attorney Jeffrey Grant Brown, of Chicago.

In the lawsuit, the landlords concede the COVID-19 pandemic presents a serious public health threat.

However, they assert the governor's continued enforcement of the eviction ban cannot be legally justified any longer.

In short, the landlords said, the public health emergency that was used to justify the eviction moratorium no longer exists, or at least has abated to the point that the moratorium should now be considered illegal.

Pritzker's orders, "as wellintentioned as they may be, have had an unlawful and disproportionate impact on landlords ... the point of jeopardizing their businesses and livelihoods," the

Of course the Bears' Walter Payton, as well as Papa Bear George Halas who practically invented pro football. The list of legends is endless.

Chicago is a town built by such legends. You don't have to dig very deep to unearth them in all their many shapes and sizes. To know our legends is to know us and what makes us who we are. The politicos, sports stars, religious heroes, great restauranteurs, actors, news anchors, great business leaders, neighborhood cooks, medical wonders and everyday larger than life pals.

It has never been so important to remember who they are. Our legends, I believe, increase our chances of sur-


Some legends define a place by their personality, character, decisions made or actions taken. And some legends define the place in which they live. The geography, the myths, the history, the size and contours of the local space.

Some of Chicago's most legendary heroes are easy to identify. They civilized the city. They harmonized town life. They're headline makers, charting the future, paving the streets and lighting the

Others are record holders or record breakers. They knock it out of park on a daily basis. They swoosh every basket. They're on the green in two. They can harness the wind to fill their sails. Their names are household words.

Chicago's most famous legends are a curious blend of high human ingredients. They're never very far away. That proximity is significant as it keeps those legends

Top on my list of Chicago legends is Mayor Richard J. Daley, (1903-1976), master politician, maker of presidents, urban genius, city builder, most importantly a man of power who was a man of his word. A product of a meat and potatoes Chicago neighborhood, Bridgeport, he carried the Chicago of everyday people in his heart. A deal maker, he saw prom-

ise written on the face of Chicago and had the guts to make it blossom. He's never been equaled. During the riots of 1968, he stood firm. Ensuring justice was for every Chicagoan. No faint-hearted loyalties. Looking back, 1955 to 1976 are glory years. A lifetime of valued clues to personal achievement on behalf of others. Faithfulness. Service to others. Acting with courage.

Also on the top of my list is Michael Jordan. His career with the Chicago Bulls was about more than basketball championships. He recreated the relationship between sports and new generations of Chicagoans. There is no place in the world you can go where the name Michael Jordan isn't revered. He lifted Chicago to new levels of self-awareness. Friendly, handsome, gentlemanly, skilled like no other player, he became the measure of a new Chicagoan. Elegant, poised, gracious. People were proud to share the city with him. And the wondrous notoriety he brought to Chicago life. Michael taught Chicagoans in everything he did on and off the court. Lessons to be learned about responsibility. Personal integrity. Being generous. And of caring for others.

You also can't tell anyone you're from Chicago without someone's moronic mention of Al Capone. Yeah, that's right, Big Al. The author of much mayhem and murder during Prohibition and the Roaring 20s. Capone is really an "Anti-Legend" I suppose. Guiding the criminal enterprises of gangland Chicago in its Mafiosa infancy, Capone and his crew orchestrated civic turmoil until the federal government set up their special task force to focus on his gang's enter-

He certainly added drama to local life. As well as powerful life lessons about crime and survival in a time of hardship for many.

Capone did go to prison and died after his release. While much of his physical presence has been erased from Chicago's memory, his strange place in our history is symbolized by his grave in Mt. Carmel Cemetery.

If anyone deserves to be a Chicago legend it is Catherine O'Leary, a simple, pious Irish immigrant whose life changed irrevocably in 1871 when a fire in her cow shed on DeKovan St. turned into the inferno we call "The Great Chicago Fire." Poor Catherine was neither to blame for that fire nor responsible for its taking away three-fifths of the city. A parishioner at Holy Family parish on Roosevelt Rd., Catherine was forced to endure the false accusations and untruths published in newspapers across America that she was to blame. She was the press's perfect patsy. A poor immigrant woman. A Roman Catholic. A powerless American, least among its citizens. Catherine had the comfort of her family, but she was broken-hearted by the falsehoods. Some believe she died of a broken heart.

Our Chicago legends are powerful spirits to recall. Memory of them and their accomplishments might just be what we need to bring some sanity again to American life, and encouragement to our willingness to step outside the fashionable left-wing mob of looters and social deconstructionists. The current cycle of blame that many use as a way to combat their own failures has stretched out of control. We'd all be better off if we had more people working in Chicago soup kitchens and food pantries than trying to topple a statue of Christopher Columbus. We'd be more successful participating in a national strategy for healing and hope than in letting

gangs of looters rampage Michigan Ave. shops, leaving broken glass and broken hopes in their path. Or the litany of murders on Chicago streets that are the highest in the nation. It's time for Chicago's failing political leadership to stop hiding what's really unfolding. Pick a legend. Learn a lesson. This isn't Sleepy Hollow. I'd settle for Capone.

A LITTLE HELP: Angelo

Pullum was murdered outside his home in the 1400 block of Lunt in Rogers Park, and video of his shooting death has now been shared tens of thousands of times on social media. He was shot on June 28 in a grisly, a broad-daylight murder caught on surveillance camera. But despite all the attention, his devastated family now struggles over how to pay for his funeral. Locals have banded together to help pitch in by creating a Go Fund Me campaign. You too can help them give Angelo a proper goodbye by adding to that fund. Having a loved-one's murder sensationalized on social media is a sad fact of our Internet era. It leaves little room for those closest to grieve as they intended and recover from the indignity of having a death sensationalized. It has been a very bad year for street violence here in Chicago.

THE RUMOR MILL: The story seems to have legs. Two former Israeli commando commanders, retired and living on the Gold Coast, are quietly putting together a "security business" comprised of former commandos, also living in the Chicago area, to strengthen

We're writing to inquire why [Inside Publications] only named seven men of European heritage in [the] list of 300 statues. Does anyone know how many statues in the city are of women, and how many are of Black, Indigenous, People of Color. Aside from the racially offensive statues of Native people, such as the Bowman and the Spearman at Ida B. Wells Dr. and Michigan Ave, how many of the 300 statues were created by women and people of color to honor their/our histories?

We hear the pain and fear in [the reporter's] language of "mobs" "threat" and "destroy." [You make] a specious and incendiary claim that, "many monuments, memorials, and statues have been defaced, burned or destroyed in the last month, in Chicago and nationwide" without providing any details on how many, which ones, located where, and his sources for this claim.

With regards to Columbus, both myself and Sarah were raised in the 1980s-1990s being spoon-fed the dominant narrative in St. Ignatius College Prep history classes. "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it" said Santayana in 1905. 



Man shot in Rogers Park drive-by July 9

A 29-year-old man is in good condition after someone fired shots at him from a car in Rogers Park July 9, according to CPD records.



The third man, Yoviel Gebre, had a replica firearm, 40 tablets of Xanax, and suspected amphetamine in a backpack along with a wallet and other items that belong to a different man, prosecutors said in bond court July 7.

The state dropped controlled substance charges during the hearing. Gebre remains charged with theft and possessing a replica firearm. Judge Lyke released him on his own recognizance.

The Sunday night gathering, which was organized via social media, marked the second weekend in a row that police had to intervene after big crowds overtook Halsted

On June 28, authorities allowed an even bigger crowd to overtake Halsted St., jump on police cars, and party until shortly before sunrise on the next day. The Chicago Pride Parade, which had been scheduled for earlier on June 28, was canceled this year due to concerns about the spread of COVID-19.

Citing preliminary information, CPD said a 22-year-old man was driving a 21-year-old woman eastbound in the 100 block of W. Superior when two white sedans boxed them in around 2:55 a.m. Friday. An armed man got out of one of the sedans and began shooting at the victims' car, striking the woman in her leg and arm, police

A 23-year-old man was then shot in the leg when the woman's driver — a concealed carry holder — returned fire, according to police.

The concealed carry holder then drove away with his passenger, but the two sedans reportedly chased them and caused their vehicle to crash into a building on the 100 block of W. Huron moments later.

An ambulance transported the woman to Northwestern Memorial Hospital. The injured man walked into Lurie Children's Hospital for treatment. He was subsequently transferred to Northwestern.

Police were working to determine who shot at the victims. Except for the man who was injured, all of the occupants of the white sedans fled the area, according to CPD.

Eleven people have been shot in River North so far this year — and nine of those happened since May 30, according to CPD records. Only 10 were shot in the neighborhood during all of last year.

Man murdered adjacent to Lathrop Homes

A 27-year-old man who was shot in the head while driving near Clybourn and Diversey on Saturday has died, according to the Cook County medical examiner's office.

The man, whose name has not been released by authorities, was shot as he sat in traffic on the 2900 block of N. Leavitt around 1 a.m. July 11. He was pronounced dead at Advocate Illinois Masonic Medical Center at 4:20 p.m. the same day, medical examiner records show.

No arrests have been made. Area Three detectives are investigating.

Ambulance stolen

Never leave your unattended vehicle running in Chicago. Not even if your vehicle is an ambulance.

That's one lesson to be learned from a weird incident that unfolded near the Magnificent Mile on July 11.

Another lesson: Don't give your car keys to a guy who gets out of an ambulance and claims to be a fireman.

Around 10 a.m., a Lifeline ambulance crew left their rig running outside the Warren Barr Living and Rehab

Center at 66 W. Oak, according to a CPD report. The medics were later stunned to discover that their ride had disappeared.

Lifeline tracked the stolen ambulance via GPS, and cops located it on the 200 block of E. Lake Shore D., just steps from Michigan Ave. No one was inside.

As police stood near the stolen rig, a man walked up to report that a fireman had stolen his car a few minutes earlier. Or, more accurately, someone who claimed to be a fireman had stolen his car.

The 47-vear-old man said the thief got out of the Lifeline ambulance, walked up to him, and said he needed the man's car keys so he could move the car for an emer-

The "fireman" and the victim's white Ford Fusion, bearing Blackhawks plate PAWS1, haven't been

Police said the man believed the thief was wearing a fireman's uniform, but officers also said the thief was wearing clothes that more closely resembled a construction worker, including a yellow hat and vellow vest.

Some contents of the ambulance were also stolen, police said.



gestion in the area.

"We're shocked that it's 20 feet away, which is obnoxiously close," Wolfgang Suess, treasurer of the condo board and a spokesman for residents in the 34-story Galleria, told the Council on Tall Buildings. "They would be making money at the expense of well over 100 units that would have to look directly into their building. We have every

intention to fight this every step of the process to be sure it does not receive the multiple approvals it would need from City Hall. We will fight this."

Training School for Home and Public Health Nursing opened its doors.

Nearly 800 women completed the

inaugural class, and within two years some 3,000 women had passed the course. When influenza returned in 1920, 600 of these graduates answered the call for volunteers, exactly as Health Commissioner Robertson had hoped they would. The program worked so well that Robertson instituted a second similar program in connection with the Municipal Tuberculosis Sanitarium in 1920.

Never again would Chicago be faced with a critical shortage of healthcare workers during a time of need. Well, until 2020 that is.

lawsuit said.

"Protecting economically needy citizens such as tenants ... is sound and proper policy. But compelled subsidization by landlords is an improper and unconstitutional method of solving that problem."

Pritzker and Illinois Attorney General Kwame Raoul responded to the lawsuit in filings on July 5 and July 7. The lawsuit asks the courts to bar Pritzker from enforcing his eviction moratorium any longer. Pritzker and Raoul argued the landlords have no legal legs on which to rest their case.

The state officials said the governor's actions are legal under the state's so-called "police power," a legal principle which can empower the state in times of disaster and emergency to bend or suspend constitutional rights to protect the health and welfare of the state's residents.

"While (the property owners) allege they have been deprived of rental income from their proper-

ties and otherwise rendered unable to use those properties as they see fit, the suspension constitutes a legitimate, temporary exercise of the State's police power to address an unprecedented public health emergency," Pritzker's lawyers wrote in their July 5 brief.

They argued the evictions ban "has played a crucial role" in fighting COVID-19, because it has allowed tenants to remain in their homes throughout the emergency period, and has minimized their need for "in-person interactions" that would follow an eviction and search for new housing.

"And beyond limiting the spread of COVID-19, the suspension of residential evictions protects vulnerable individuals whose access to housing and other critical resources have been threatened by the widespread economic losses resulting from the pandemic," Pritzker's lawyers wrote.

The state argued Pritzker's evictions orders also don't amount to an unconstitutional taking of the rental housing owners' property, or even a violation of their contract rights, because the landlords are only temporarily prohibited from enforcing the terms of their leases

The state pointed to language in Pritzker's orders which they insist shows the governor did not give license to any tenants to simply refuse to pay rent.

"The Governor's orders merely put a temporary hold on one means to enforce Plaintiffs' contracts," Pritzker's lawyers argued. "Plaintiffs are still entitled to pursue delinquent tenants based on the breach of payment terms and may initiate eviction proceedings as soon as the suspension of evictions ends..."

The state's brief asserts the governor intends to lift the evictions ban on Aug. 1, as the state expects to then have in place a new rental assistance program, which they said would send assistance payments directly to landlords on behalf of tenants.
